From the March 4, 1965 Quincy Herald:

"20 YEARS AGO: Reynolds Grocery has purchased a new electric meat slicing machine and a new display cold counter. Quincy Dairy has installed automatic bottling machinery. Wilcox & Son and the Quincy Cooperative are sporting new Dodge trucks."

"40 YEARS AGO: Quincy Hotel operated by Mrs. Glenn Fillmore since the death of her husband a year ago, was given honorable mention in the Michigan Tradesman as an ideal place for the traveling public. Ralph Denham one of two village mail carriers, has been observed recently running on his route in order to expedite delivery. This is real service. An earth tremor was felt last Saturday here in the village. Dr. Farr reported pictures shook loose at his residence and a bunch of brooms hanging in G.P. McClellan's grocery were caused to sway like a pendulum."



Interesting Facts About Libraries

- Melvil Dewey. As library collections grew in size and scope, it became necessary to catalog and organize these collections in a systematic manner. In 1876, Melvil Dewey invented a method of library classification, known as the Dewey Decimal System or Dewey Decimal Classification. Dewey served as the head librarian for Columbia University for five years, and went on to become the director of the New York State Library until 1906.
- Giacomo Casanova. Often he was referred to as "the world's greatest lover", but did you know that Casanova spent the latter part of his life as a librarian for Count Waldstein of Bohemia.
- Boston. The Boston Public Library became one of the first, if not the first library, of significant size to open it doors to the public in 1895. Any resident of the state of Massachusetts may borrow materials or conduct research at this library. This is inscribed on the wall of the main branch of the BPL "The Commonwealth requires the education of the people as the safeguard of order and liberty."
- Library of Congress. Founded on April 24, 1800, this library is listed by "The Guinness Book of World Records" as the "World's Largest Library". It is the primary source of research requests by the United States Congress. The Library of Congress hosts a website as well as an online catalog of its holdings.
