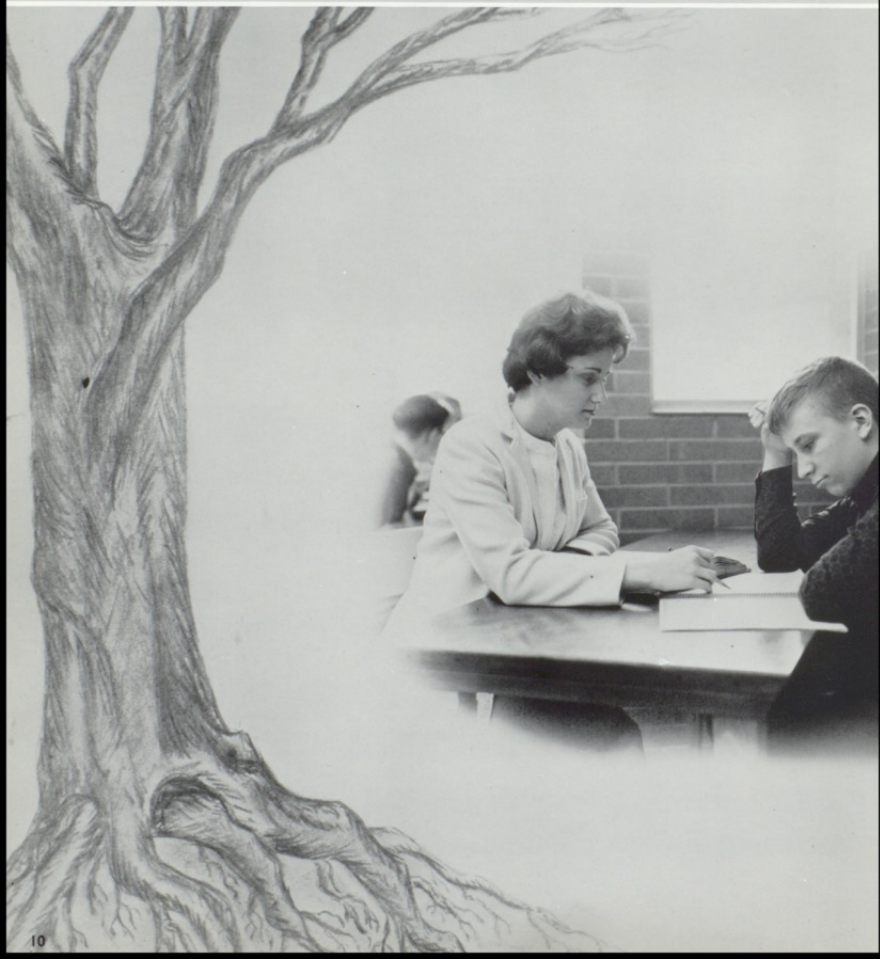

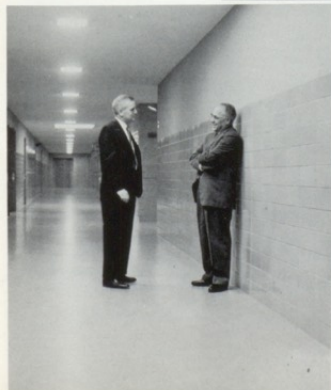
As we enter the main doors of Coldwater High School and look ahead of us, we see the school office. There we find a very important man, our principal, Mr. Kermit Dennis.

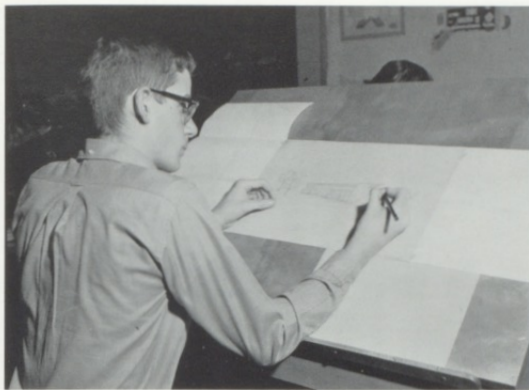

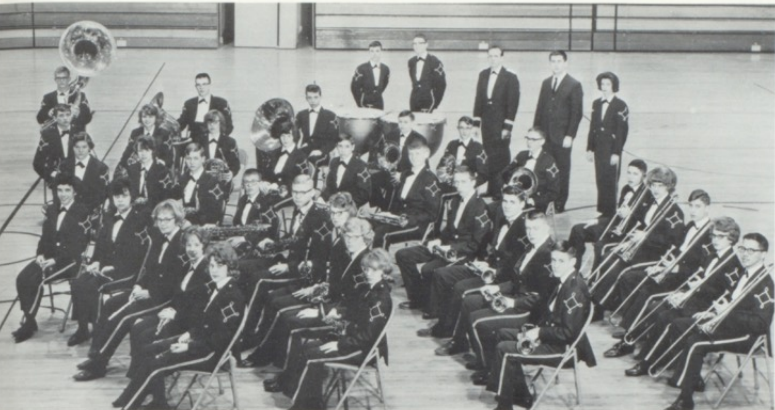

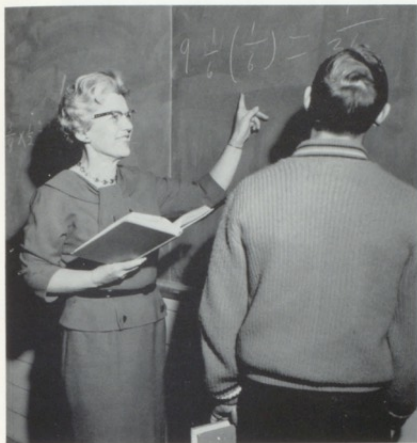

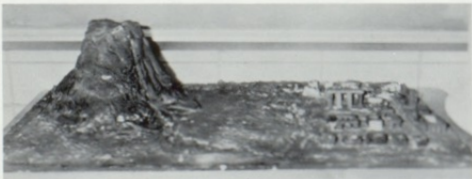

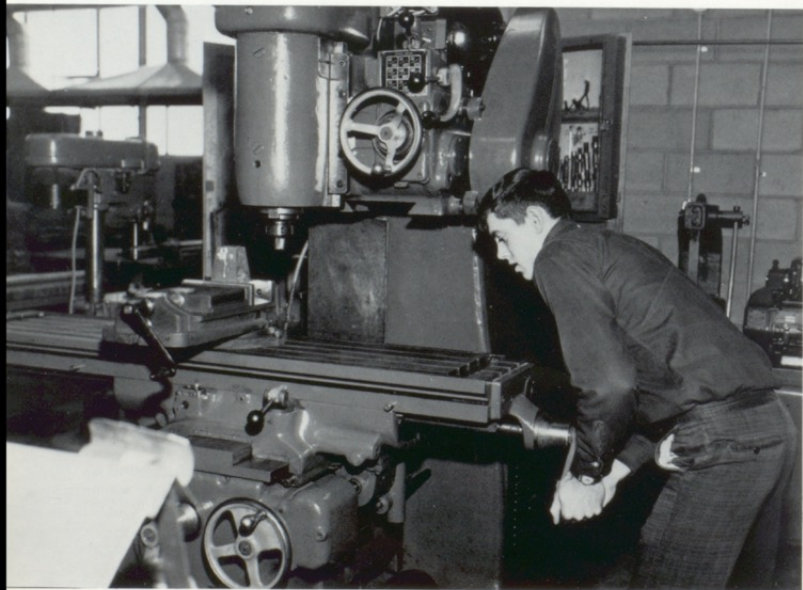

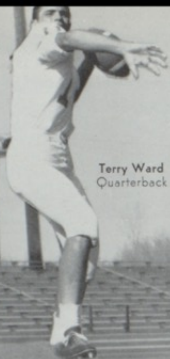

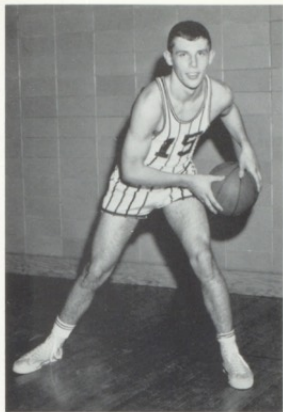

Good luck, Coach Eby. We will miss you.





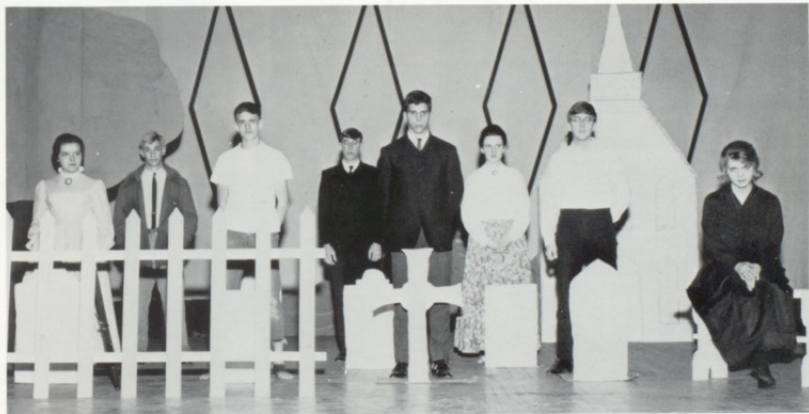
