THE CITY OF COLDWATER.

To give anything like a complete historical article of the development of Coldwater would require space many times the size of a volume such as this and to undertake it would be practically impossible in this work whose principal feature is merely one of a directive nature rather than a writeup HISTORICAL.

The apology offered for inserting it is not that it is the first and original, nor that it fills a long felt want in any manner whatever; for the facts have been related heretofore in various articles and publications and in this respect have already become well familiarized, but owing to its concise and limited review of the several industries, professions and business pursuits of the place, with their particular historical data given, make it a story, giving more completeness to the publication and perhaps by the way of presenting the facts, may lend to the subscribers some information worthy of memorization and a better (historically speaking) idea of this very good city in which we live together.

The city in size comprises about five square miles, its location being upon what was once a burr oak prairie, on the northeast bank of the Coldwater river, the elevation being about fifty feet above the St. Joseph River; the water supply lies in a bed of gravel from 20 to 60 feet deep and furnishes an inexhaustible supply of the very best of water. Coldwater long years ago took its name from the Pottawatomy compound Indian word Chuck-sey-ya-bish, meaning cold water.

In 1822 a trading post was established two and one half miles east of the public square by Joseph Godfrey; at that time, two miles east and 80 rods north was an Indian village of 33 wigwams. The chief named Mix Aubee died about 1829 and was buried on the hillside about 40 rods from the residence of A. C. Fisk; Mix Aubee was a tall muscular man as proud and conceited as the average "big injun" of that time could possibly have been. He was a noted warrior and engaged at the battles of Fort Meigs and River Raisin. Black Hawk, the famous chief when he passed through here on his way to Canada complimented him highly on his bravery in war. Chief Mix Aubee passed to the happy hunting grounds as before stated in 1829 at the rather advanced age of 100 years.

The United States survey of the city shows that the center of the corporation, corner stake, was established in 1829.

The first house built within the present corporation limits was erected by Hugh Campbell on the northeast corner of the land where the Lewis Art Gallery now stands, and was subsequently occupied by the pioneer preacher Allen Tibbits, the second house was built by Joseph Hanchett where the (Courier office at present stands) in July 1831, the family with his son Edwin remaining at Coo Coosh, now Girard, until the house was finished. At this time the Indian trail from Chicago to Detroit was on the north side of the present Chicago road from the river 10 rods below the Cemetery Bridge to the Indian village presided over by Mix Aubee, previously alluded to.

In the fall of 1832 the village of Lyons, named Lyons by an emigrant from Lyons N. Y. now the city of Coldwater, was platted by Joseph Hanchett who owned 80 acres where the business portion of the city is located. Mr. Hanchett gave to his son Edwin, the lot where the Southern Michigan Hotel now is, for the purpose of erecting a tavern. That autumn, Benj. Smith came from Pennfield, N. Y. and built an inn for John Morse on the site now occupied by the Moses Smith residence. Recently the building was purchased by Wm. A. Coombs and is now used as an addition to the "A" flouring mill, these were the two first hotels erected in Coldwater. The County of Branch having been organized but by the townships of Green, then extending over the third

of western lower Michigan, the county seat was established by the commissioners and called Masonville, in honor of Gov. Mason; it was situated on the eastern bank of Coldwater River, opposite Oak Grove. The late Harvey Warner and Cal. Bolton in 1831 built a hotel there on the north side of the Chicago road; it was afterward known as the James Stuart house; the village at this time sprung up as if by magic. A bridge was built by Seymour Bingham, in the fall of 1853. Coldwater at that time was, very thinly settled; the principal men located in the village were W. H. and Robt. J. Cross, and Peter Martin, living in the old Crippen house which stood between the present Court House and Public Library. In the summer of 1831 Allen Tibbits settled in this village and purchased the 80 acres entered by Hugh Campbell.

Masonville had then increased in population far outnumbering in inhabitants the village of Lyons (now Coldwater).

The mill pond, just south of the Lake Shore depot, had been made by Mr Martin and a mill put in operation furnishing the first lumber for the people of the village.

Then commenced an unexpected rivalry between Coldwater and Branch, where the County seat was afterwards located.

A large delegation of settlers moved from Monroe County, N. Y. to Coldwater in 1835; they formed a company and purchased the property afterwards known as the Crippen Mill and shortly after secured the removal of the county seat from Branch to Coldwater in 1837.

Business men had located and were known as the Hook and Line Company, Sloan Cole, Ramsdell & Co. Our early merchants were; Holbrook, Hibbard & Cross, Mr. Welling & O. B. Clark, McCarty Porter & Wendall, H. C. Lewis and Geo. Kellogg, David Williams, As a Parrish Koland Root and John T. Haynes. The manufactories at that time consisted of Martin & Crippen's Saw Mills, Parrish's foundry located 80 rods east of the Public square, Brink & Leech's blacksmith shops one located east of the public square and one on Chicago street opposite Morse Street, a chair factory conducted by honest John Wilson located on the site of "Tell the Truth", clothing house, three tailor shops, conducted by L. D. Halsted, John D. Wood, and Wm. Harpham. Albert Chandler was tinner and S. P. Noyes made boots and shoes; thus are enumerated the manufacturing industries of Coldwater previous to 1848.

The first newspaper office in the county was at Branch 1835; the name of the paper then published was the Star, edited by a man named Champion. Next on the list is the Coldwater Sentinel edited and published by Hon. Albert Chandler in the early forties. When the Free Soil period arrived the True Sentinel was published by Judge Turner now of Jackson being succeeded by C. P. Benton. F. V. Smith also edited the Sentinel.

The Thompson Bros. about this time published a Republican sheet known as the Branch County Journal. At the beginning of the war Hockstaff edited a paper that was converted into the Reporter under the management of C. J. Thorpe & Co. Other papers established are the Semi Weekly Republican by A. J. Aldrich, it is now owned by G. W. Perry & Co. The Sun by the Greenback party now the democratic organ of Branch County, and edited and managed by Bates. The Courier established by Moore & Nichols and at present owned by Owen and Turner.

The Star recently set up as the Prohibitionist representative is managed by W. C. Bailey. A group of portraits of the present editors are herewith given.

The different religious denominations represented are: The Methodist Episcopal, Baptists, Presbyterian, Episcopal, Roman Catholic, German Lutheran, Wesleyan Methodist and Christian Church. Portraits of pastors and brief sketches of the several denominations are given elsewhere.

Physicians who have practiced here are Dr. Enoch Chase who settled in 1834 remaining but one year. Dr. Hanchett settled in Coldwater in 1832; he was in reality the first practitioner. Dr. Alden came in 1834. Dr. Darwin Littlefield arrived here in 1835. Dr. Henry Stillman in the early forties. Dr. I. P. Alger commenced the study of medicine in 1844 in Dr. Hanchett's office and afterwards practiced for many years in this city. Dr. W. B. Sprague, Dr. Wm. Clark, Dr. Stocking, Dr. S. S. Cutter, Dr. C. B. Tucker, Dr. J. H. Beach, Dr. Rufus Kibbs, Dr. D. C. Powers, Dr. John H. Bennett and Dr. Geo. W. Whitford are names of other prominent physicians that have

practiced here. At present there are fifteen representatives of the medical profession. X

The legal profession of this city was first represented by Esborn G. Fuller who came to this city from Orleans Co., N. Y. in 1836 and settled where the Conant residence now is. He was the first prosecuting attorney of Branch county and later was probate judge. In the spring of '37 Lawyer Estus commonly known as the "State of Maine" settled here. In 1844 Henry C. Gilbert settled here, soon followed by his father, and brothers, Daniel and J. W. Gilbert.

Geo. A. Coe came from Rochester, N. Y. in the early 40's; he was elected to several public offices, being elected lieutenant governor in 1854-56.

Louis T. N. Wilson, Judge Chas. Upson, Gen. J. G. Parkhurst, Hon. J. W. Turner, Judge David Thompson, Judge Thomas M. Cooley (now of Ann Arbor), Justin Lawyer and Frank D. Skeels have been other notable lights in the legal profession of Coldwater. Many of them are now dead or have abandoned the practice of law. Likenesses of the members of the Branch County Bar Association are produced elsewhere.

The banking history in this city would fill a large volume all by itself, but owing to the limited scope of this work, mere mention can be made of all of them. The first bank organized was the old Coldwater Bank in 1837 with \$100,000.00 capital; officers, L. D. Crippen, pres; George Nichols, cashier and Mr. Mandel teller; this bank was located where Sloman's clothing store now stands. It closed its doors in 1838.

The "Exchange Bank" of Crippen & Fisk followed the old Coldwater Bank. This bank suspended payment in the fall of '57 and was succeeded by Fisk & Lewis, they by Lewis, Bolwell and Miles, they by Lewis & Kellogg, they by Lewis & Starr they by Clarke and Starr, they by Dennis & Starr and they by the Coldwater National Bank, organized in May 1865. The Southern Michigan National Bank was organized in November 1871. The Branch County Savings Bank organized in 1891, completes the list.

Up to 1850 Coldwater never had an organized fire department, buckets being the only articles available in case of fire. In 1841 fire destroyed all the buildings extending from E. R. Clarke & Co's store to the public square. Attention was called to the great necessity of having some apparatus provided to protect the town in the future. Accordingly a company was formed and known as the Excelsior Fire Company. In 1856 a hook and ladder company was organized. In 1864 a second company known as the Upsilon was organized. In 1872 a total change was made in the fire department. A Silsby engine was purchased and christened "The City of Coldwater," the old Excelsior company becoming known as the "Coldwater Steam Fire Engine Co." Another engine was purchased soon after known as the "Mayor Tibbits." These pieces of mechanism are no longer in use since the very efficient water works system was put in in 1890-91.

The water works and electric light departments are now under one board of commissioners consisting of three members; the works are under the supervision of a superintendent.

The city was lighted by gas supplied by the Coldwater Gas Light Company beginning in 1863 and lasting until 1883 when the same company put in an arc electric lighting plant. The city purchased this plant in 1890 and removed it to the present station on Clark street. The electric light and water works plant was put in by the city in the winter of 1890-91 at a cost of \$110,000. The lighting plant consists of a low tension arc circuit (street) of 74 lamps, 2,000 candle power, and a low tension arc circuit (stores) of 41 lamps, 1,500 candle power; the incandescent system has over 3,000 lights of two circuits. At the power house, 3 arc dynamos and 2 alternating (in incandescent) dynamos furnish the power for the city's lighting. The water works consist of two Hughes Duplex pumps of a capacity of 1,500,000 gallons every 24 hours; two tandem compound engines with a low pressure cylinder 18 inches in diameter and a high pressure cylinder 12 inches in diameter and 18 inches in length, force the water through to the city mains and branches amounting in all to a trifle over 14½ miles in length, the pressure per square inch being 60 pounds and in fire instances 90 to 100 pounds. Hydrants for fire protection number 103; other tapplings made so far on the mains for family use number 515. The supply of water is afforded by 8 wells 45

feet deep; the center of force for engines and dynamos is in a battery of three tubular boilers five feet in diameter sixteen in length; each boiler containing fifty flues. No city in the state is better lighted or has better fire protection than this. The receipts from both water and lighting plants for the year ending April 1, 1894 were \$1,800 in excess of all expenses, which include a large amount of constructing and interest on the bonds outstanding.

To make brief mention of Coldwater's present industries the important ones in order are here recorded: The manufacture of cigars is beyond doubt the principal one of the city; employment is furnished to 175 hands. About 4,700,000 cigars were made in 1893. The different firms are: The American Cigar Company organized in 1873, O'Shaughnessy & Co established in 1873, A. J. Pierce established in 1873, O'Shaughnessy Bros., established in 1891, F. T. Eddy established in 1880, J. D. Payne established in 1889, Gatch & Co. established in 1883 besides eight other smaller shops.

The Pratt Manufacturing Company established in 1882, makers of childrens' sleds and cutters in the rough, employ from 50 to 60 hands.

Calkins & Co. manufacturers of flour and pork barrels, established in this place in 1873. Sixty hands are required to run this establishment.

Johnson's Cooperage Works, also manufacturers all kinds of barrels and employ 30 to 40 men. This concern was established in 1874.

Harlow's furniture factory founded about 1873, is another establishment employing 30 men; medium grade furniture is turned out by this firm.

The Coldwater Oil Stove Factory manufactures all kinds of oil, cooking and heating stoves. This manufactory was recently started but is rapidly pushing forward; employment is furnished to 40 men.

Ball Bros. planing mill. Here twenty hands are engaged during the year. Exterior house furnishings are manufactured and planing and matching lumber done.

The C. D. Warner Medicine Company established here in 1887 employs ten laboratory men and five traveling salesman. This company makes Warner's White Wine of Tar Syrup and German Hop Bitters.

S. B. Kitchel's Linament Laboratory is another patent medicine concern where employment is given to a dozen hands. Kitchel's Liniment is manufactured and has an extensive sale in the United States and Canada.

Coombs flouring Mills, known respectively as the "A", "B" and "C" mills to gether, with the elevator recently constructed, form one of the best pieces of milling property in the state. Employment is given to forty hands; the three mills have a daily capacity of 800 barrels of flour.

Another branch of industry for which Coldwater and Branch County are nationally reputable is the breeding development and sale of fine horses. Scores of famous horses have either been bred in this county or owned here at one time. The pioneer horseman of the county, A. C. Fisk, started out in 1851 by importing Green Mountain Black Hawk. Others purchased away and owned here by Mr. Fisk at his Maple Park farm are: Vermont Hero, Belmont, Mambrino Chief, Lexington Chief, Mambrino Patchen Jr., Hambletonian Star, Masterlode, Hambletonian Wilkes, Kentucky Belmont, Dictator Almont, Latitude 2:16½, Judan, Greatheart pacer 2:15, Highlawn Prince, Corbeau Medium and Wilton Wilkes. This makes up a string of as noted horses as ever were owned in the state. Another horse owned here worthy of mention was Magna Charta owned by H. C. Lewis and S. M. Seeley; he was afterward owned by L. Dean of Girard.

At present Coldwater has four stallions with records better than 2:20. They are Cartridge 2:14½ owned by Jas. Walker prop'r Locust Grove Stables; Kitchel's Red Wilkes 2:19¼ owned by S. B. Kitchel; Latitude 2:16½ and Greatheart 2:15 (pacer) owned by A. C. Fisk at Maple Park. Another promising stallion is McLane by Pilot Medium with a yearling record, the fastest in the state, of 2:40. He is owned by Scott McLane. There are several other horses and horsemen in Coldwater worthy of mention but limited space will not allow of enumerating them.

Other features of the city are the State Public Schools a sketch of which is elsewhere given; The Lewis Art Gallery; The Edwin R. Clarke Free Public library.

As a municipality the city is a model one both in its advantages derived from nature and its good features bestowed upon it by those who have lived here and those who are at present its citizens. The pleasant drives and parks shaded perfectly by manganimous maples the many miles of well kept walks, the brilliantly lighted streets, the neat and substantial residences, the urban appearing business places all in part go to make up this city so fortunately inhabited with well educated intelligent and thoughtful people whose actions both publicly and privately are devotedly American; though not numerically as great as other cities in this Michigan commonwealth yet the aggregate intelligence, education and character could these be aggregated, would stand well up in the column of cities of the state. Though not a typical manufacturing town it is anything but an ideal wayback hoosier corporation. It is blessed with any number of societies and associations with a scientific, literary, musical or other scope, which tend to give the place an effete atmosphere which is not to be found in every place of 6,000 inhabitants. Thus in grandeur and glory do we find Coldwater in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four.

COLDWATER PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The history of the Schools of Coldwater seems to begin in the year 1834. A red school house was built near the northeast corner of Hudson and Pearl streets and in this Miss Cynthia Gloyd taught the first school within the present limits of the city. A second school building was erected on the west side of Clay street between Chicago and Pearl streets about 1842.

In 1847 a two-story frame building was erected on the site of the present school in the second ward and about four years later the old brick school was built in the third ward.

For several years these schools were entirely separate and distinct, belonging to independent districts each having its own school board.

The state had made provision for the consolidation of districts and in 1854 steps were taken which resulted in the formation of the union school district.

The pupils had become so numerous in 1859 that, besides the two schools, it was necessary to rent two rooms for primary schools on Chicago street. This condition led to the construction of the central school, a brick three-story building, on the site of the old Central school in 1860.

The oldest of the school buildings now in use is the one in the fourth ward and was built in 1867. This is now known as the Franklin school.

The wooden structure in the second ward was removed and in 1883 the fine brick building, recently named the Washington school, took its place.

The "old brick" in the third ward was replaced in 1887 by the more modern structure now called the Longfellow school.

Fire having demolished the central school in 1889, from the ashes arose promptly the elegant and commodious Lincoln school. The cost of this building was about \$50,000. It is one of the most complete, convenient and well equipped high school and grade buildings in the state.

The entire value of school property in 1894 is estimated at \$90,000.

From the organization of the union district down to 1878 the Board of Education consisted of six members elected by the entire district for terms of three years. An amendment to the city charter in the latter year reconstructed the Board and it has since consisted of two members from each ward chosen for a term of two years.

This Board of eight chooses annually a president and a clerk from their own number, and a superintendent to whom is intrusted the immediate management of the schools. The city treasurer is treasurer of the Board of Education.

The organization for the year 1894-5 is as follows: H. P. Collins, president. W. T. Lowry, clerk, B. D. Paddock, J. W. Burk, Bernard Lilly, W. S. Hawley, Geo. W. Stevens, J. H. Buggie, E. L. Briggs, superintendent.

The schools of Coldwater have always ranked among the best in a state of strong public schools.

The high school was first thoroughly organized in the sixties, and in 1868 graduated its first class of three members. From that date it has graduated 264 pupils, many of whom have filled places of much prominence in the community and the state.

The senior class of the present year contains 25 pupils, the largest in the history of the school.

For many years its graduates have been received upon presentation of their diplomas at the state university without examination.

The school is finely equipped with a physical and a chemical laboratory, a hall seated with 500 opera seats, besides the three session rooms and a recitation room.

Four courses are offered its students; Classical, Latin, Scientific, and English, and special instruction is given in bookkeeping and penmanship.

The enrollment for the present year (1894) has been 186. Five regular teachers have been employed and instruction has been given in two subjects by the superintendent.

The school census for 1893 showed 1,354 children of school age in the city and the entire enrollment in the eighth month has reached 1,100. Of these 51 are non-resident pupils, living in various parts of the county.

The following are the districts attached to the different schools, but attendance is necessarily modified by the superintendent from time to time to make the classification of pupils most advantageous.

LINCOLN SCHOOL. All high school, eighth and seventh grade pupils. Pupils below the seventh grade from the entire first ward except the south side of Chicago street.

WASHINGTON SCHOOL. Those pupils below the seventh grade Irving on the south side of Chicago street in the first ward, and all in second ward not assigned to the Longfellow school.

LONGFELLOW SCHOOL. Grades below the seventh. All second ward pupils to the following eastern boundaries: Marshall street including both sides, north to Pierce street; east on the middle of Pierce street to Hudson street, north on Hudson street to city limits. Third ward pupils east of Fremont street. Fourth ward pupils east of Jackson street.

FRANKLIN SCHOOL. Grades below the seventh. All the third and fourth wards not assigned to the Longfellow school.

The entire teaching force numbers 28 and at this time is composed as follows:

LONGFELLOW SCHOOL.

STATE PUBLIC SCHOOL.

The State public School is located one and a half miles north of the business center of Coldwater. This institution was established in 1874 for the care of dependent and neglected children and in the twenty years of its existence, has taken care of more than 3,500 children.

The plan for the care of these children as carried out by the State Public School was original with the founders of this institution and has proven very successful.

Believing that the only way to prevent the increase of crime is to instil into the minds of children right principles and right ways of living, the founders of this school

with the aid of its friends in the legislature, have made it possible for the state to take into its care all children who are dependent, neglected, or ill-treated. These children are often taken from homes, where if left to grow to manhood or womanhood, they would almost certainly become criminals. Here they are received kindly, cared for tenderly, trained into the correct path, and when suitable family homes are found, are placed in them to become members of the family.

While at the school the children are cared for as nearly as possible as they would be in a home. They live in cottages as separate families, each cottage being presided over by a kind motherly woman whose noble example, patient training and tender care instills into their youthful minds the truth that it is only noble to be good. Homes are selected for them with the greatest care. It must be known of what the home consists, what kind of housekeeping and general management are apparent, how old are the to be adopted father and mother, what nationality, what state of health, their character, whether temperate, whether selling intoxicating liquors, etc.

After the child is placed in the home, then, he is visited occasionally by an agent representing the school who advises with guardian and child and if by any chance the child seems to have been placed in an unsuitable home, removes him.

This system of looking after and caring for dependent children seems to have advantages over all others, not only in the results attained, but because of its economy. The children are cared for at a per capita expense of only \$150 and it is true that of the large number provided for during the existence of the institution, only 14 "have turned out" poorly.

Visitors at the institution are always welcome and information as to its methods gladly given to those interested enough to inquire.

They attend school regularly where they are taught the common branches by carefully selected and competent teachers. One of the pleasantest features of the school department is the kindergarten, a visit to which is only needed to convince one of the effective work it is doing.

The institution has been under the supervision of the following superintendents since its opening:

Original cost \$98,904.28. Special appropriations for land, buildings, furniture repairs etc. since; \$146,403.66 (not including the last special appropriation which is not yet expended). Total \$245,407.94.

CHURCHES.

METHODIST CHURCH.

The first society of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Coldwater was organized by Rev. E. H. Pilcher June 19 1832 in the loghouse of Allen Tibbits. In the fall of 1832 Rev. Wm. Sprague became pastor of the congregation. He was succeeded by Henry Colclazer. In 1835 the society was strengthened by a body of emigrant Methodists from the east. In 1840 a split occurred in the Church, one portion going to form what is now the Wesleyan Church.

The first house of worship was built in 1836 and stood upon the same ground occupied by the present edifice.

The present Church has a seating capacity of 800 persons, a commodious lecture

room and two class rooms and a magnificent pipe organ the gift of Alonzo Waterman, Mrs. H. C. Fenn and Allie Waterman. The building was erected in 1865-69 costing 25,000; An addition was made to the building in 1878.

The Church has always been growing and progressive in all departments of Christian effort. The present pastor is Wm. Denman.

THE BAPTIST CHURCH.

The first meeting of Baptists held in Coldwater was December 31, 1834 at the house of Dr. Alden on E Chicago street later occupied by Deacon Matthias Van Every. At another meeting held Feb. 9, 1835 the articles of faith and covenant of the Baptist Church of Malone New York were adopted by this church. In October of that year Rev. E. Loomis was sent by the Home Mission Society to fill the pastorate. From September 1837 to December 1842 Rev. Wm. B. Brown was pastor. In December 1842 Rev. Jas. Davis was settled as pastor. Up to 1844 the Church had no regular place of worship meeting at private houses and school houses.

On December 20th 1843 at a meeting of the Church it was voted to purchase a lot and build a house of worship where the Seely block now stands. This remained the place of worship until 1765 when the present brick edifice at the corner of Division and Pearl street was dedicated.

Other pastors not mentioned above have held the pastorate of this church: Rev. J. A. Keyes, Nov. 1844 to August 1845; Rev. O. C. Comstock, Oct. 1845 to June 1848; Rev. Anson Tucker, Nov. 1848 to May 1850; Rev. F. O. Marsh, Oct. 1850 to Oct. 1853; Rev. E. J. Corey, Dec. 1853 to June 1856; Rev. A. A. Ellis, Jan. 1858 to April 1858; Rev. Edwin Eaton, June 1858 to April 1860; Rev. E. Curtis, Sept. 1860 to Sept. 1868; Rev. N. Pierce, Oct. 1868 to Dec. 1870; Rev. W. T. Loawry, June 1871 to Sept. 1881; Rev. John Donnelly, Feb. 1882 to May 1884; Rev. J. H. Graff, Sept. 1884 to Nov. 1885; Rev. J. P. Phillips, Feb. 1886 to 1890; Rev. E. O. Smith, July 1890 to March 1, 1894.

The pastorate at the present writing is vacant.

FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF COLDWATER.

The First Presbyterian Church of Coldwater was organized, Sept. 30, 1837, by the Rev. Phanael W. Warriner, in a red schoolhouse on the northeast corner of Hudson and Pearl streets. The Society was legally incorporated, August 9, 1843.

The first house of worship was erected in 1843 and 1844, on the lot just north of the Baptist church. The building is now the house of worship of the Lutheran Church on Jefferson street. The present church edifice was erected in 1868 and 1869.

The ministers of the Church have been as follows:

Rev. Charles W. Gurney, 1837-8; Rev. Lewis Mills, 1842-4; Rev. Stephen C. Hickok, 1844-7; Rev. Elihu P. Marvin, 1847-51; Rev. D. W. Mather, 1851-53; Rev. Reuben S. Goodman, 1853-60; Rev. Horace C. Hovey, 1860-62; Rev. Gustavus L. Foster, 1862-65; Rev. William C. Porter, 1865-71; Rev. J. Gordon Jones, 1871-78; Rev. Henry P. Collin, since 1878.

THE ST. MARKS EPISCOPAL CHURCH.

The first service of the Episcopal Church in Branch County was held in 1832, in a log house, by the Rt. Rev. Philander Chase, D. D., first Bishop of Ohio, who owned and lived on a section of land on Gilead Lake, four years.

St. Mark's Parish was organized, Feb. 29, 1848, Rev. George Willard, missionary.

Services had been held from house to house during several years, and were continued, with frequent use of the "Old Court House," until April 14, 1863, when the "Old Church," a frame building on Hanchett Street, erected at the cost of \$3,000 was consecrated. In 1876, a lot was purchased on Chicago Street, and the chapel, which stands to the east of the church, was built. In 1881 the present commodious brick church was erected at the cost of about \$15,000, and opened in August of that year.

All indebtedness having been paid, the church was consecrated Sept. 29, 1886.

The present rector, Rev. Henry Hughes, has been in charge nearly eight years, since September 1, 1886, during which time the church has continued to prosper.

OTHER CHURCHES.

Other denominations in Coldwater are: The German Lutheran Church established in 1861. In 1868 they purchased their building from the Presbyterians and moved it to the present site corner of Jefferson and Perkins street. Rev. Roessler is now resident pastor.

The Wesleyan Methodist Church held its first service in 1850 in this place; they continue to hold services regularly in their worship house located at the corner of Church and Hudson streets.

The St. Charles Borromeo Roman Catholic Church was founded here in 1849 by Rev. Father Smoulders.

The lot on which is located the present edifice was purchased in 1856, upon which a small frame church was erected; this structure was blown up with gunpowder placed there by "young bloods" who had considered the rector, Rev. Joseph Kindikens, obnoxious and took this method of searing him away.

In 1860 Father Rychert, with the help of citizens built the present brick edifice. Rev. Father C. Korst the first resident pastor came here in 1867. He still presides over the congregation.

THE COLDWATER LIGHT GUARD.

The Coldwater Light Guard was organized August 1871, and was mustered into the state service on the 11th day of November following with 41 members. The commissioned officers were: Captain Geo. H. Turner; First Lieut. Abe E. Stowell; Second Lieut. C. H. De Clute. The company was supplied with Springfield breech loading rifles in January 1872 by the State military department and immediately began drilling in their quarters in Noye's Hall.

The history of the company is filled with a series of brilliant appearances; the first one was April 9, 1872 when they were ordered to take part in the ceremonies of the unveiling of the Soldiers and Sailors monument at Detroit. On the 4th of July of the same year the Light Guard on behalf of the citizens of Coldwater extended an invitation to the several companies of the state to be present and take part in a military encampment held in this city on that day. Several companies were present among them the Adrian Light Guard who were awarded a costly silk banner offered by the citizens to the best drilled visiting company. In June 1873 the first and second lieutenants resigned and were succeeded by Clarence L. Hunter and Ed. R. Root. In 1873 the State Agricultural Society offered a premium of \$200 for the best drilled military company in the state, to be competed for at the state fair at Grand Rapids the following September. On the 15 of September the day for the drill, the boys started with but little hope of success. They were "guyed" as they passed through the streets in their cheap uniforms beside the elegantly dressed companies from other places. After the drill was over the tables were turned for the Coldwater Light Guard had won the treasured prize and were the heroes of the day. Oct. 3, 1873 the company attended the laying of the corner stone of the State Capitol at Lansing.

In the Spring of 1874 the companies in the state service having increased from seven to twenty they were organized into regiments and the Coldwater Light Guard was assigned to the second regiment and designated as Company "A" of that regiment.

In the regimental formation Captain Geo. H. Turner was elected for the Majorship of the 2nd Regiment whereupon first Lieut. Hunter was promoted to the captaincy and 2nd Lieut. Root to 1st Lieut; Franklin Eaton was made second lieutenant.

In the summer of 1874 the Company received new uniforms which had been adopted by the state military board. The Company competed again in September 1874 for the \$200 premium offered by the State Agricultural Society at East Saginaw. The citizens of the place, took great interest in the outcome of this eventful drill. Before their departure the Guards were given a swell reception at the residence of F. V. Smith. A

magnificent stand of colors was presented to the company in behalf of the wives, sisters, and sweethearts of the Coldwater Light Guard by Mrs. Josephine Hunter, wife of Captain C. L. Hunter. The celebrated Consantine Band accompanied the company to East Saginaw upon this occasion. The following day five competing companies appeared on the Fair Grounds at Saginaw, the drill, being confined to company movements and the manual of arms. All the companies drilled exceptionally well and were heartily cheered.

When the Coldwater Light Guard appeared they were vociferously cheered by thousands of spectators who had picked out Company A as their favorite. At the close of the drill the judge's decision was announced and Coldwater's military company had again won the prize. Upon their return home they were received by the citizens with an enthusiastic demonstration. They were greeted by a salute from one section of the famous Loomis Battery, met by the mayor and Common Council and escorted to their Armory and welcomed home in a very congratulatory speech by Mayor Champion.

The companies headquarters were moved in December 1874 to Seely's hall where they remained until December 1877.

The company's first state encampment was at Reed's Lake; every year since then they have regularly encamped, always marching in with a full company and during the time in camp have the ideal material for good soldiers, there being rare, if any, instances of playing out or "bushing" by the members of Company A.

In January 1877 Chas. N. Legg was elected Captain, Frank J. Dart 1st Lieutenant and Lilburn P. Palmer 2nd Lieutenant. In July 1877 came the Pittsburg riot and almost universal strike of railroad men throughout the country. On July 24 Captain Legg received orders from adjutant general John Robertson to start for the annual encampment at Grand Rapids. Messengers were immediately dispatched to instruct all members to report for duty the following morning. At the appointed hour with but two exceptions the company left for Grand Rapids. Soon rumors of riot and bloodshed were spread about and before the time of departure had come it was generally understood that the company would have to fight its way, commencing at White Pigeon to Grand Rapids. These were only rumors however, and when White Pigeon was reached not even enough to form a corporals guard were there at the depot. Everything passed smoothly until Grand Rapids was reached that evening. After the company had taken supper at Sweet's hotel and were marching from the city out to the camp grounds, a large crowd of working men together with a mob of saloon "hoofs" commenced an infernal hooting and daring them to shoot etc; this soon passed away and the company spent the rest of the week peaceably in the routine duty of camp life.

In November 1877 a civil organization known as the Coldwater Light Guard Company was incorporated. They purchased for \$450, property on Hanchett street where their present Armory stands. This building was destroyed by fire in 1881. A new and more commodious building now stands as the home of the Coldwater Light Guard.

In January 1878 Frank D. Newberry was elected Captain, Chas. N. Legg and Alonzo Thompson lieutenants. In September 1878 Sharp's rifles were substituted for Springfield guns.

The following are the non-commissioned officers since 1878:

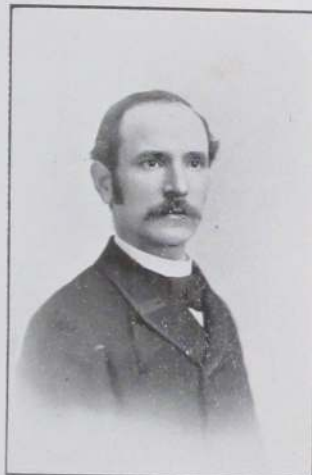
Frank D. Newberry captain, Frank J. Dart and Wm. M. Mix lieutenants. Captain Newberry served as Captain six consecutive terms. Wm. Mix succeeded him as commanding officer but resigned soon afterward. Captain Newberry then served the remainder of this term. He was elected Lieutenant Colonel in 1886 and appointed Inspector General by Governor Luce, serving in this capacity four years. Norman Reynolds succeeded General Newberry with Wm. Ehrle and Geo. Miller as Lieutenants. Wm. Ehrle was elected Captain to succeed Captain Reynolds with Chas. S. Stuart and Ed D. Legg lieutenants.

Chas. S. Stuart succeeded Captain Ehrle with Jas. B. Smullen and L. D. Hickey lieutenants. Captain Stuart was elected Major of the 2nd Regiment in 1893. Jas. B. Smullen as Captain and L. D. Hickey and Chas. Keep filled the vacancies caused by the election of Major Stuart.

Lorenzo D. Hickey Jr. is now Captain and Chas. Keep and Fred Ferguson lieutenants.

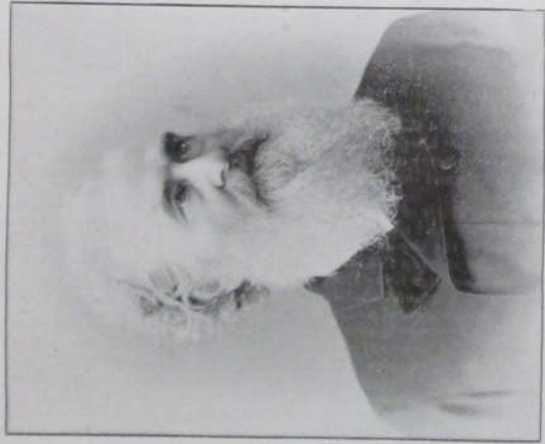

THE COLDWATER POST OFFICE.

Coldwater's post offices furnish an interesting historic memorandum. In the early thirties there was a post office established at Masonville, James Stewart subsequently sheriff of the county being the first postmaster. In a few months thereafter Branch became the county seat; Havery Warner moved from Masonville there and became its first postmaster.

Coldwater then wanted an office also. Peter Martin was appointed to fill this position, Silas A. Holbrook was made his deputy; the office was kept in Holbrook & Hibbard's store (where the Masonic block now is.) In 1837 Mr. Warner moved from Branch to Coldwater and was made postmaster which he held eight years. In 1847 congressman Chipman from Niles was here and not liking Mr. Warner for some political reason, appointed Theron R. Foster in his place; following him A. L. Porter was given the office; the office then took upon the present site of Kerr Bros. hardware store, under Mr. Porter the office was moved to the building now occupied by Lind's market. The following is the list of postmasters since A. L. Porter; C. P. Benton, Hamlet Adams, David B. Purinton, Julius Barber, John Chandler, E. R. Root, David B. Dennis, A. A. Dorrance and John G. Parkhurst. The latter three have occupied the present edifice which was erected for the purpose in 1882.

A word should be said of the free delivery system which was secured mainly through the efforts of A. A. Dorrance and which began in June 1892. The business transacted by the Coldwater office being something over \$10,000 per annum it was entitled to free delivery of mail. Accordingly Mr. Dorrance set to work with this point in view and after going through the necessary amount of red tape, the free delivery of mail began June 1, 1892. This reduced the box rental \$4,000 per annum but before Mr. Dorrance's term expired the receipts for the year ending with this administration were \$13,000, thus making the present salary \$2,400.

The above illustrations are fair reproductions of ex-postmaster Dorrance and postmaster Parkhurst.

COLDWATER MARINE BAND.

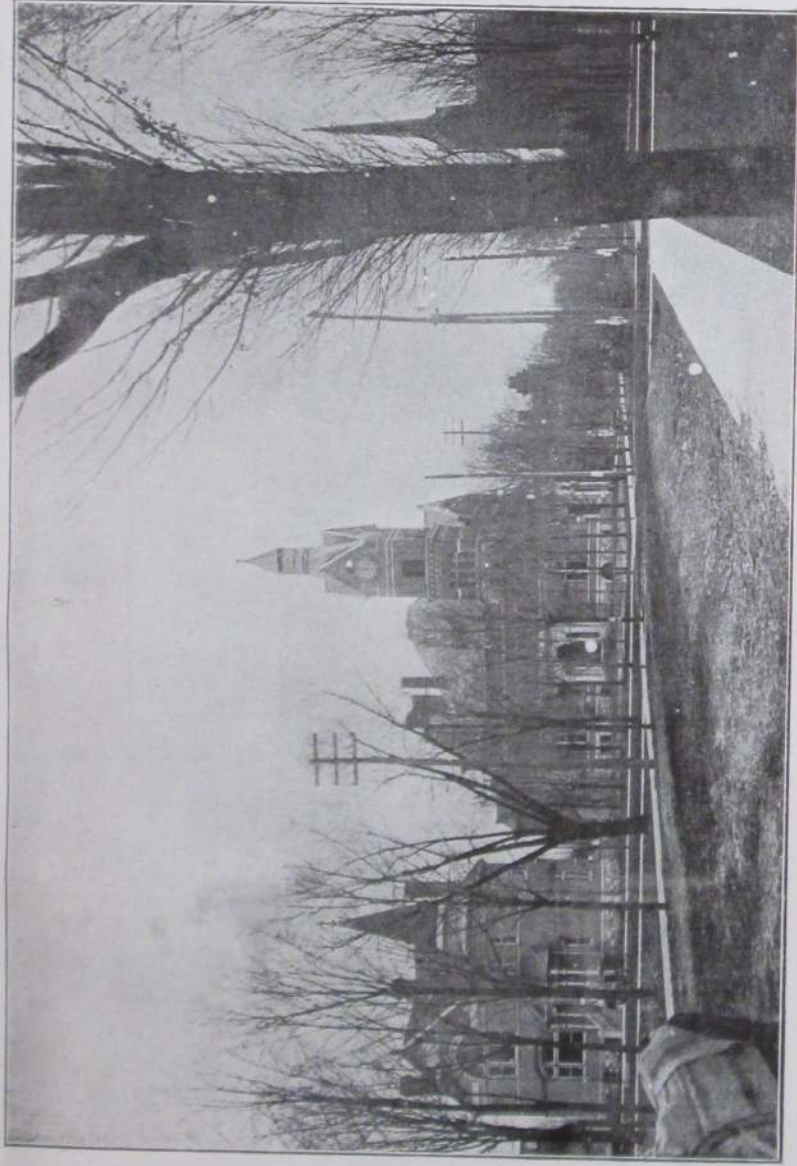
Among the many noted musical organizations of the City of Coldwater, the Coldwater Marine Band, even when a thing of the past, will be one of the foremost. It is a juvenile organization and dates its birth from the early part of the year 1892. Its existence was mainly due to the efforts of Mr. Fred Hamilton, Homer Dickinson and Ralph Andrews. At this time the members only averaged the age of fifteen years each. The band passed its first year, that of 1892, under the leadership of Mr. Hamilton and during this season rapidly progressed musically and in favor, filling foreign engagements at Sturgis, Union City and Quincy, besides many home engagements, very creditably. It was during this year that, through the kindness of the citizens of Coldwater, the band was equipped with neat zouave uniforms, which added not a little to its popularity and success.

After a long winter of arduous practice, the band commenced the season of 1893 under the direction of B. C. Thorpe, Mr. Hamilton having moved away from the city. This season was but a repetition of the first. In addition to weekly concerts and work at home, engagements were filled at Three Rivers, Hudson, Hillsdale County Fair, etc., with great success and the numerous press notices received were of the most flattering kind.

During the winter of 1893-94, the band gave one of the finest in-door concerts ever given in Coldwater and received much praise for their effort. A similar entertainment was also given in the city of Sturgis, which was equally as well received. The band has among its members a few youthful soloists of remarkable skill and ability, the most worthy of mention being Homer Dickinson, saxophone, Lou Legg, cornet, and Harvey Haynes, Euphonium soloist, while to the efforts of Mr. B. C. Thorpe is mainly due the success and musical perfection attained by the band.

The band starts out the present season in fine condition and looks forward to a busy summer. The personnel of the band as made up at present is as follows:

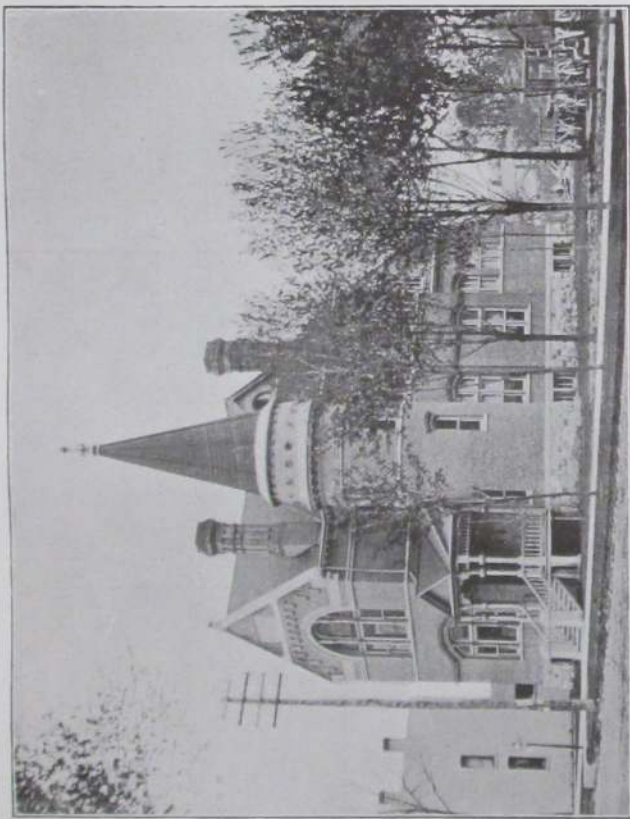

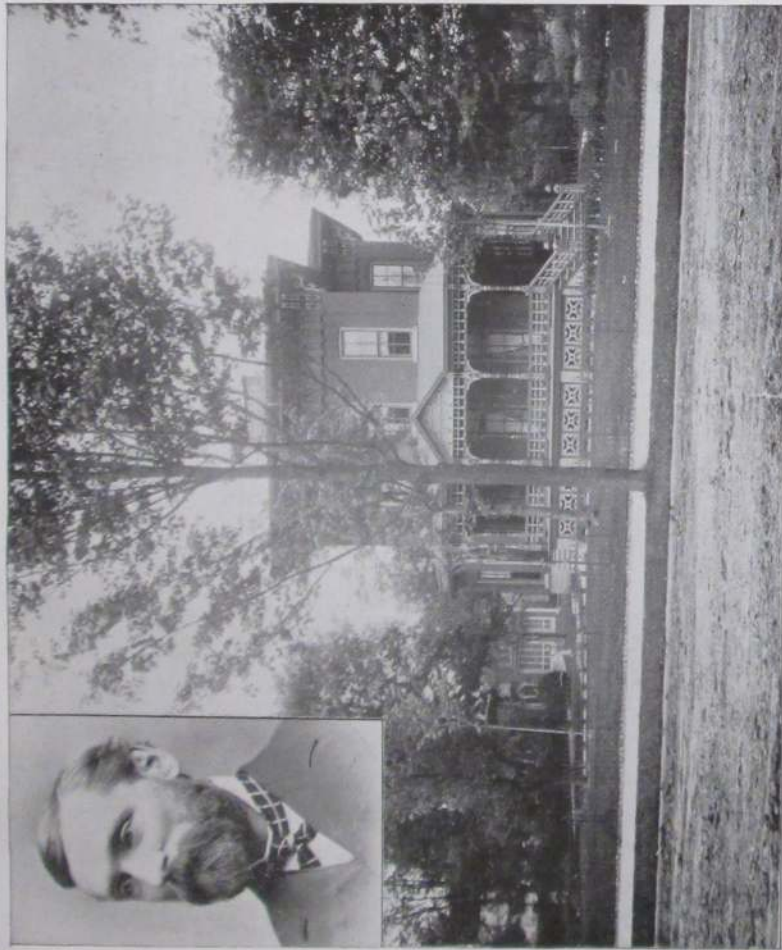
