

This year, the 1963 annual staff is proud to dedicate their annual to Mr. William A. Dyer, who is retiring this year. He has been Superintendent of the Union City Community School District for 26 years. Under Mr. Dyer's guidance, much progress has been made in improving the educational program of our district.

Because the student enrollment has risen from approximately 300 to 1264, several new buildings have been added. New elementary schools were built in Sherwood, Burlington, and Union City. A new high school was constructed in Union City in 1960.

Many new subjects have been added to the curriculum, including: French, trigonometry, mechanical drawing, additional shop and commercial classes in the Senior High School, and shop and home economics classes in the Junior High.

To Mr. Dyer, who has helped so much to raise the standards of education in our district, we sincerely dedicate the 1963 annual.





Visual aids have been playing an increasingly vital role in classroom instruction, thus offering the opportunity to student librarians to become familiar with such materials.




be carried on through the years if it's successful this year.







This year an art editor has been added to the staff. Other additions or improvements have been a regular exchange page, sports page, editorials, and better headlines.












