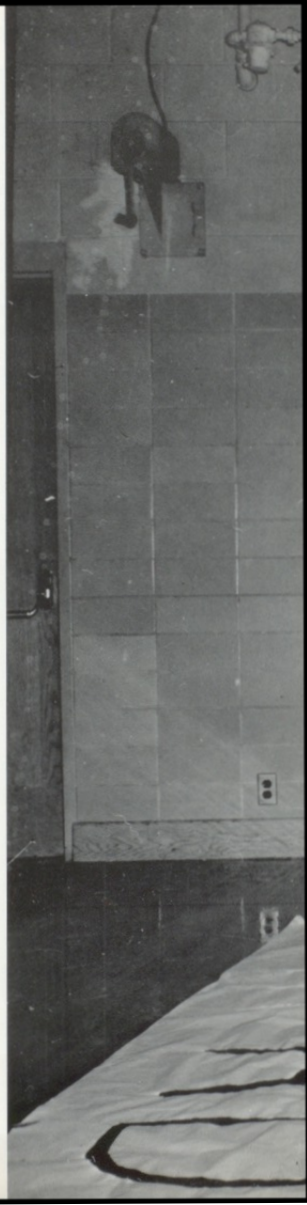

Commission Authors New Rules

When policy was decided around Coldwater High this past year, the student Commission had a part in it. Led by Mayor Jeff Hartnell the group of eight commissioners had a variety of jobs.

To start the year, the Commission helped to formulate two sets of new rules, one for the pep buses and one for after-game dances. When student conduct on the buses going to out-of-town games was questioned, the Commission decided upon some rules for bus riders. Early in the year a problem also arose after there was trouble at several after-game dances. The result was a set of rules written by a committee composed of a group of faculty members, parents and commissioners. The commission saw that the new rules were put into effect smoothly.

The Commission also had charge of the homecoming festivities this year. In the past, a club had taken care of the arrangements. The Commission-sponsored dance had "Autumn Leaves" as its theme to honor Martha Van Aken, the 1963 Homecoming Queen.

In addition to its new part in school life, the Commission continued its usual services to the school. It sponsored pep buses to away games, scheduled dances, distributed parking stickers and made it possible for students to help choose future professional assemblies.

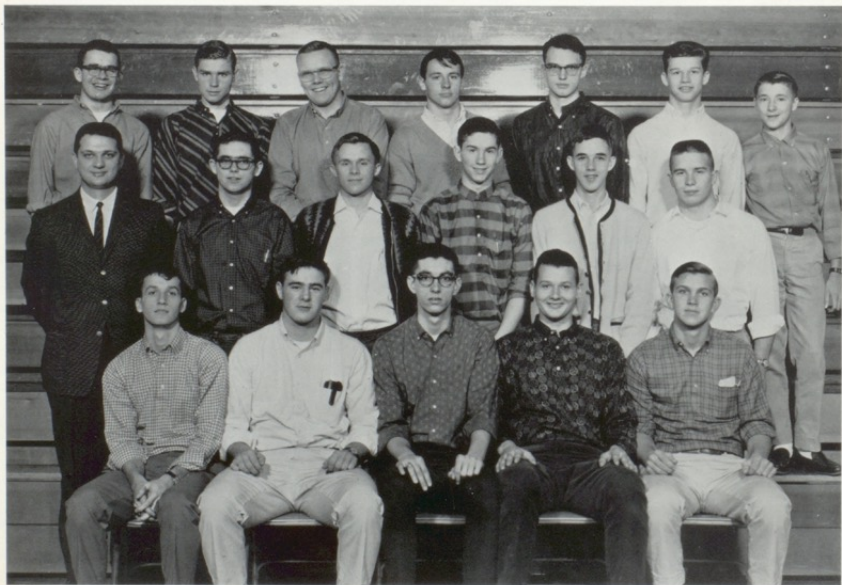

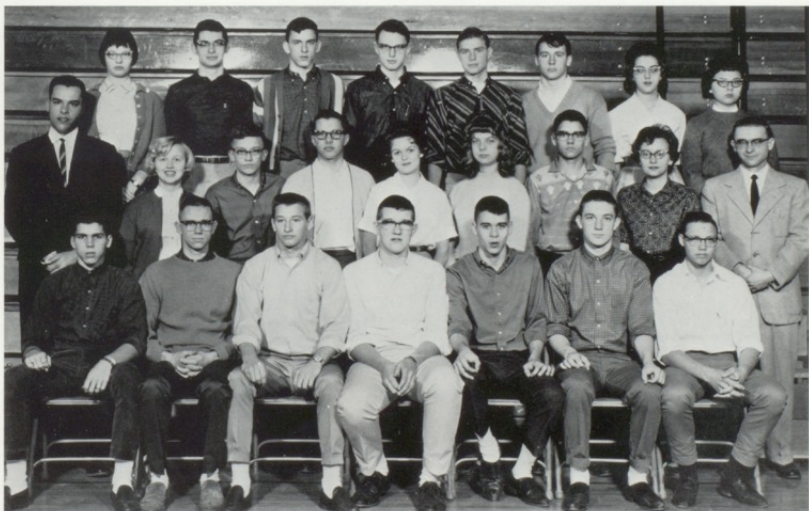
Scientists Build Varied Projects

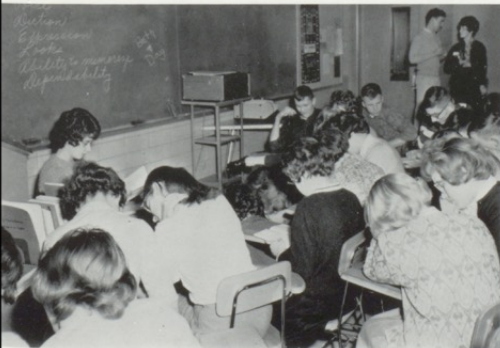

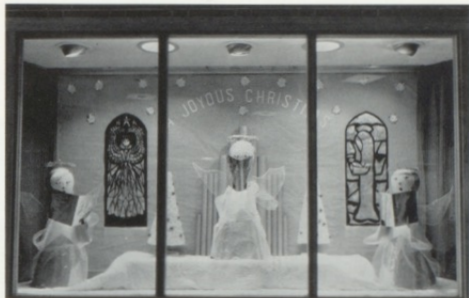

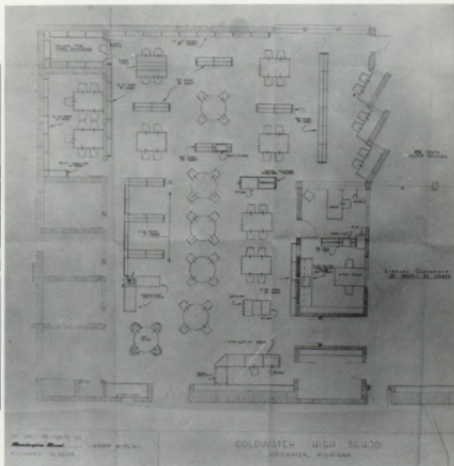

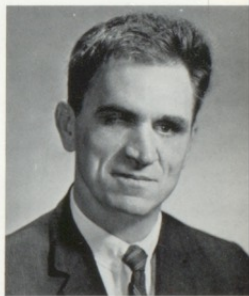

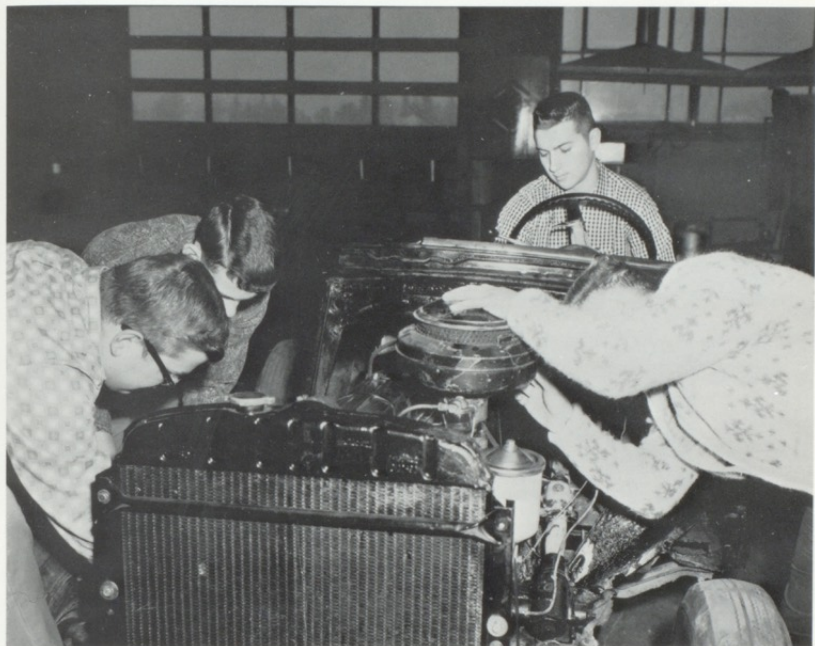

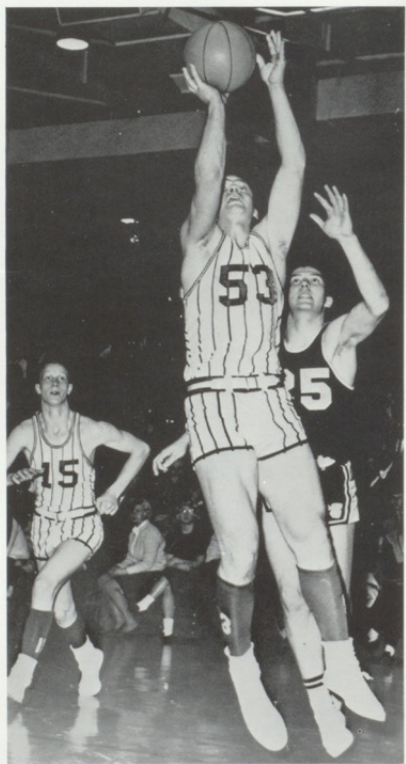

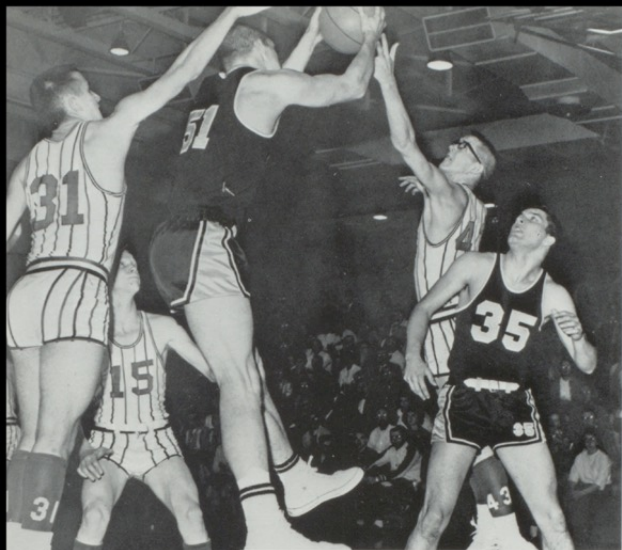

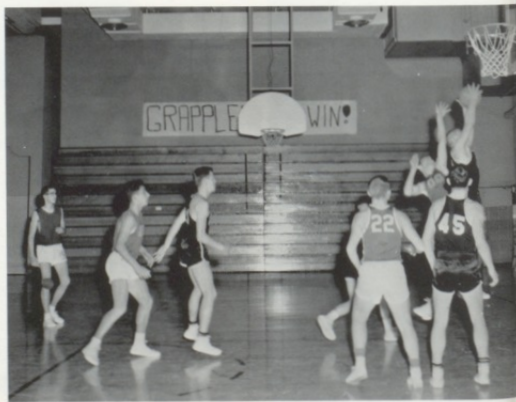

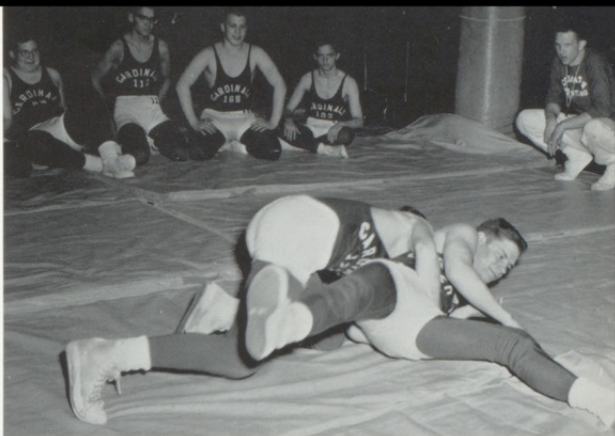
