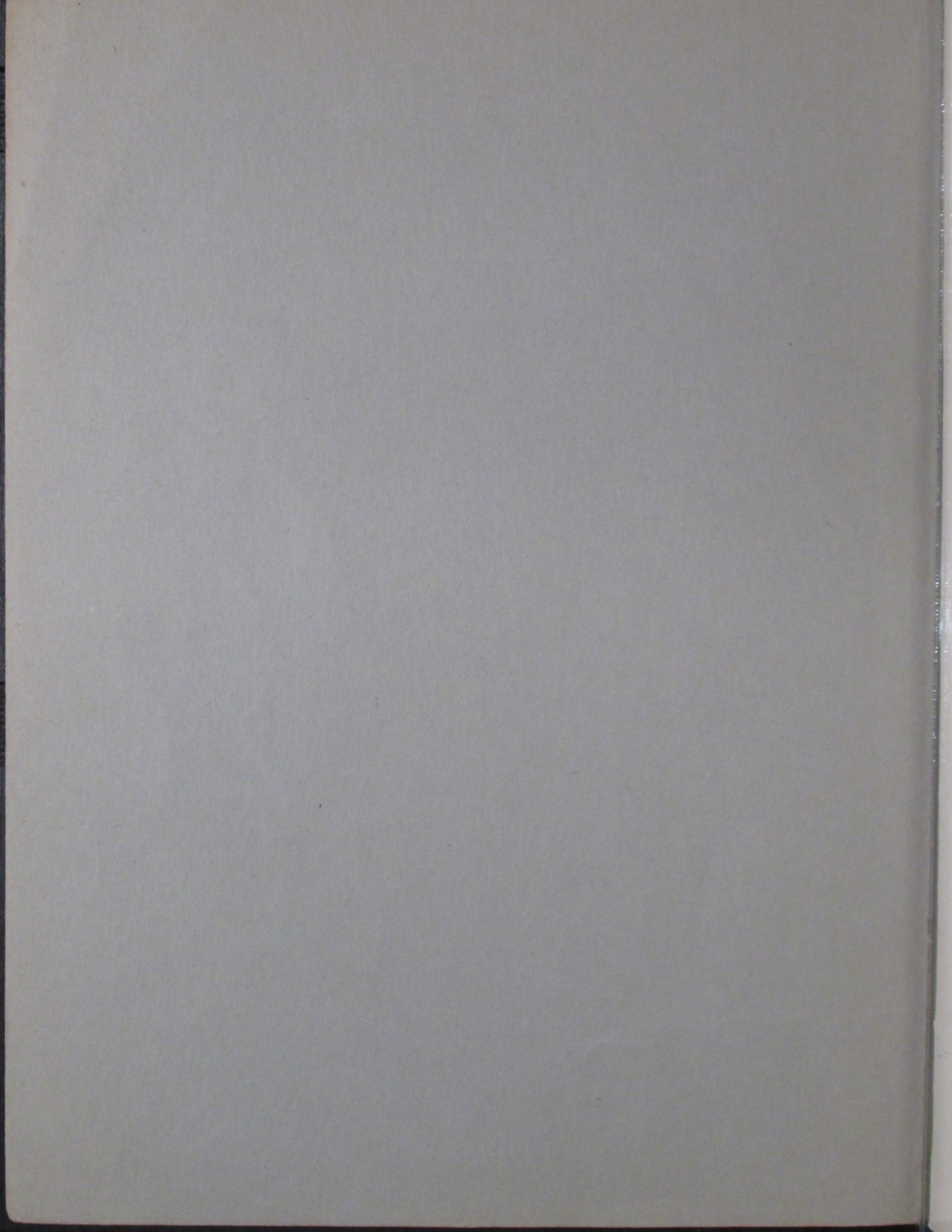

There are now left thirty-two of the original number. Most of them intend to continue their work in the tenth grade.



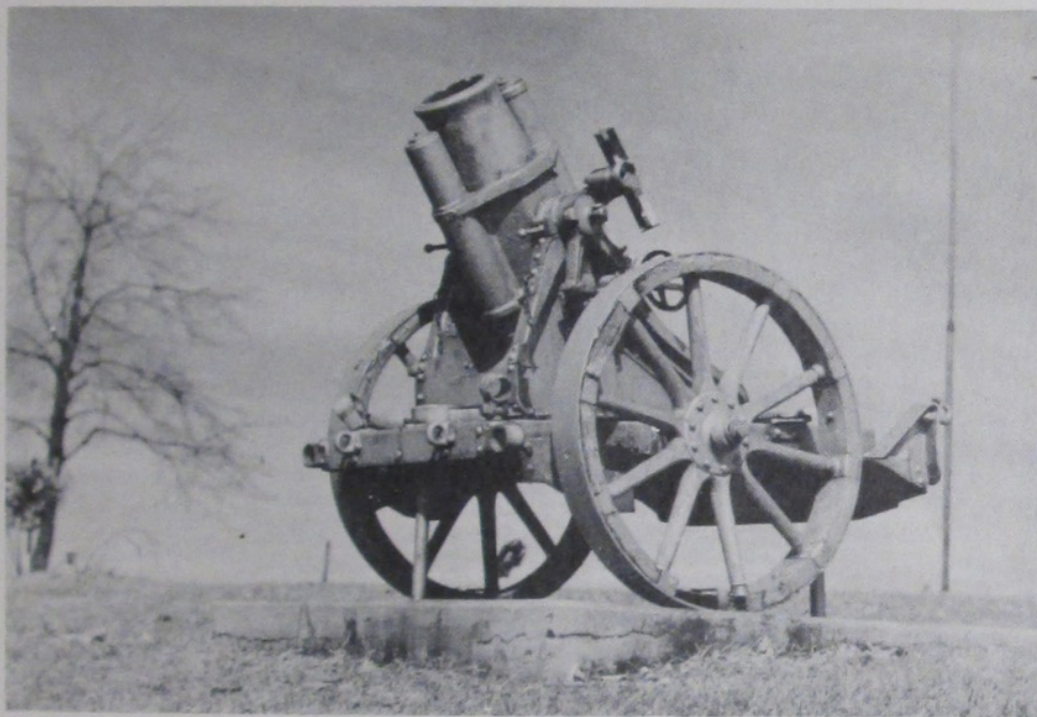

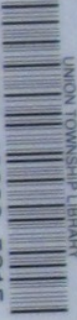
