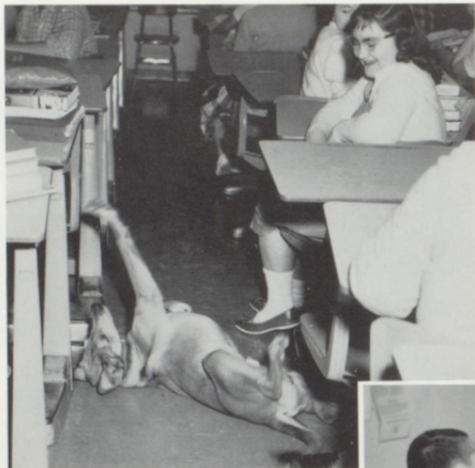

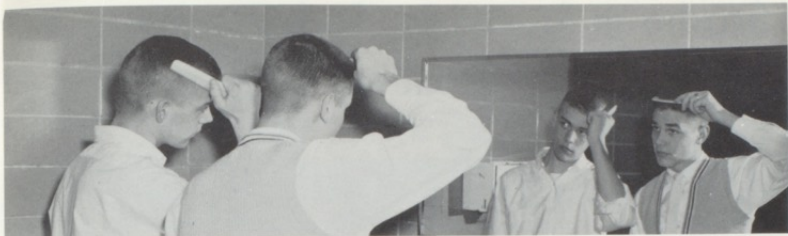

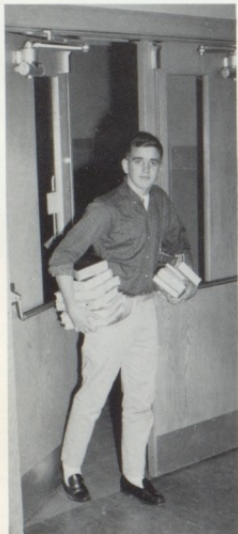





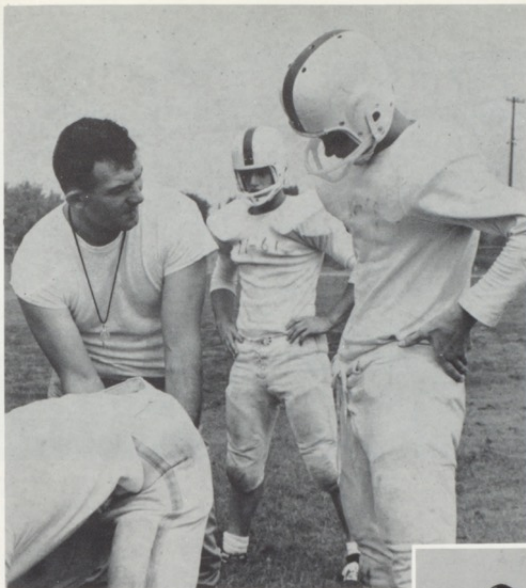

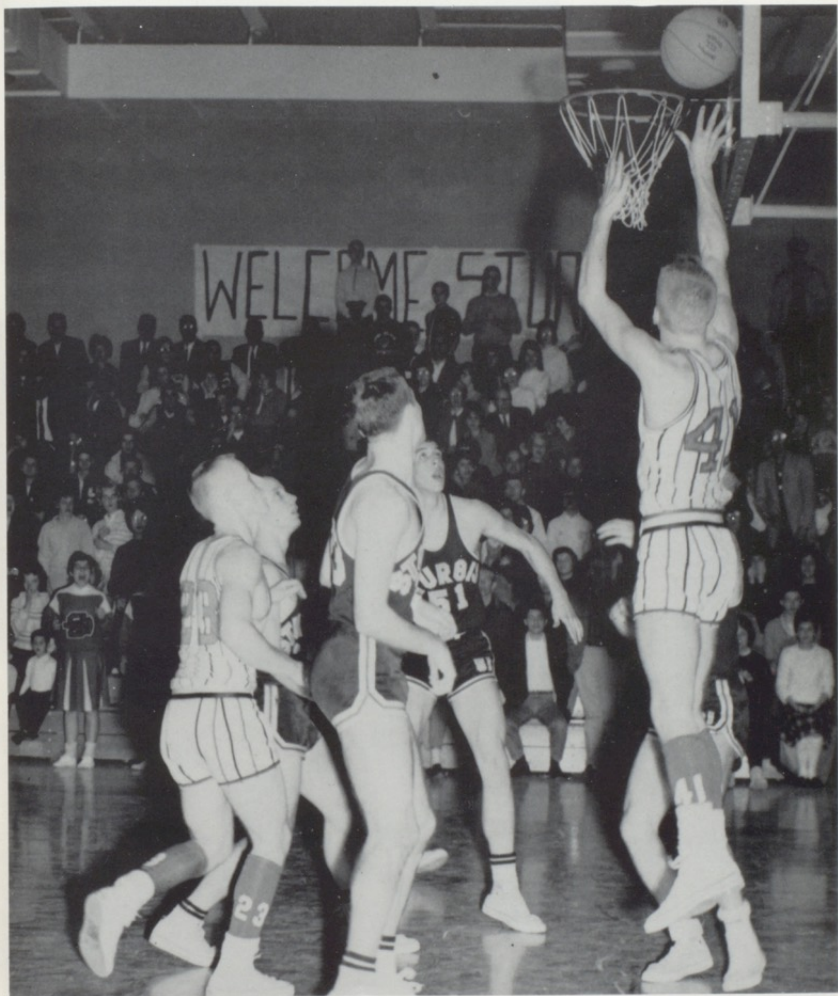

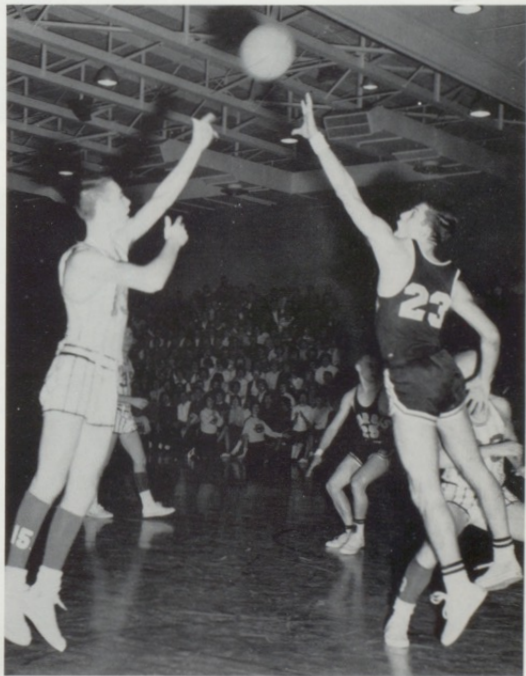

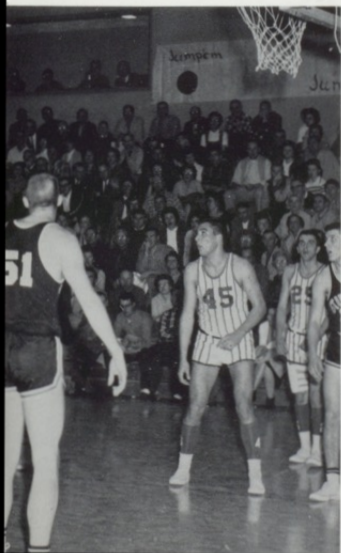

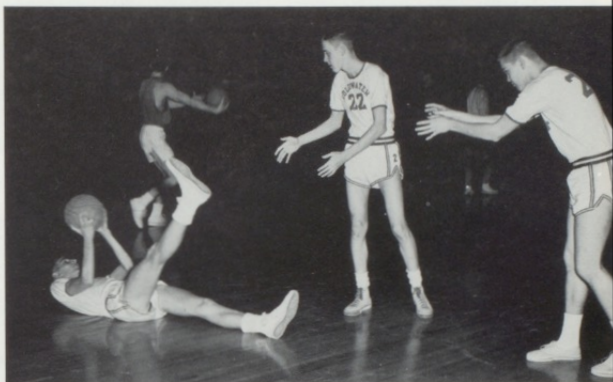

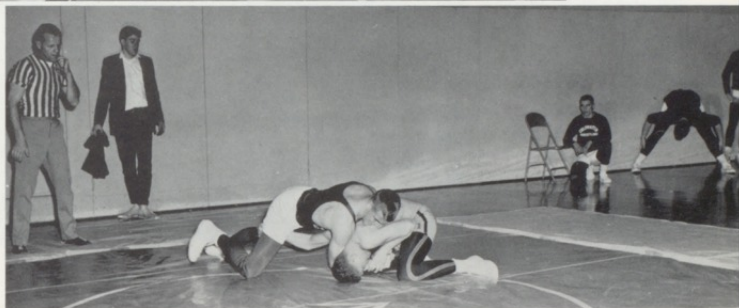

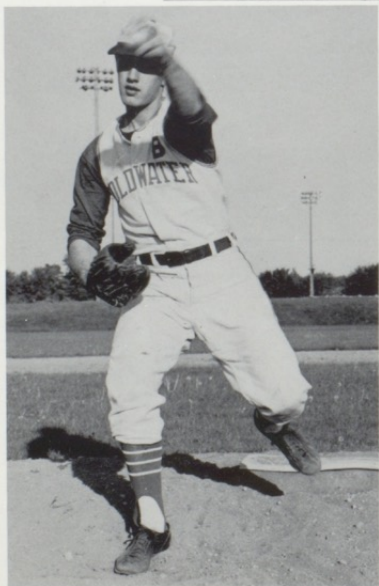
Baseball Starts Summer Season

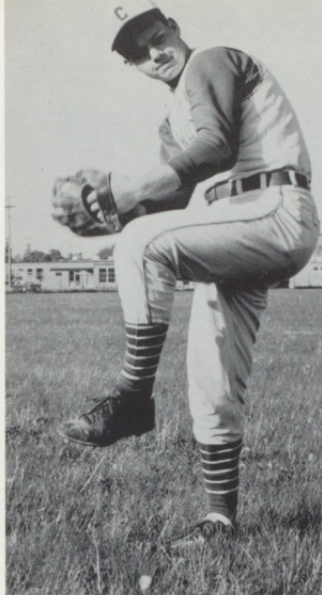
This change was an experiment under the di-

The keen interest in this sport resulted in a large turn-out for the team. It was then carefully cut to approximately eighteen team members.



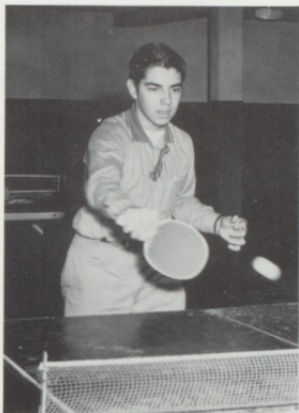

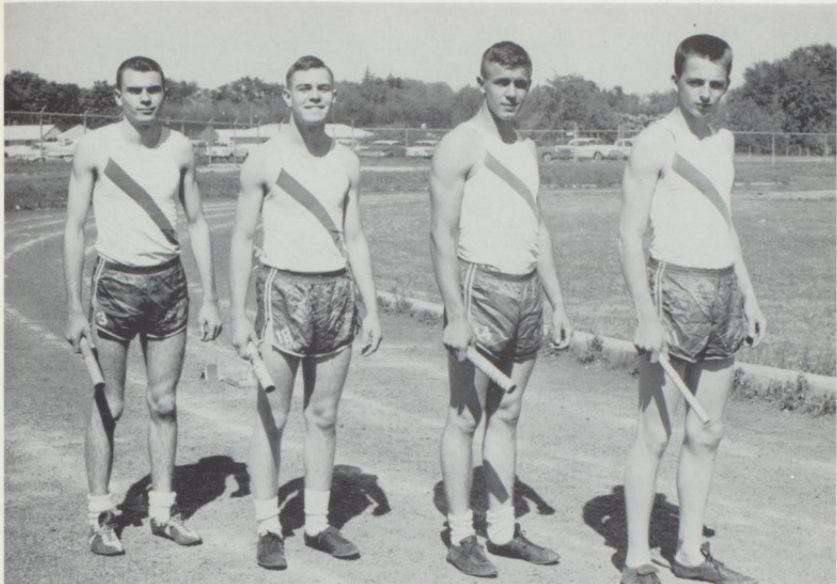

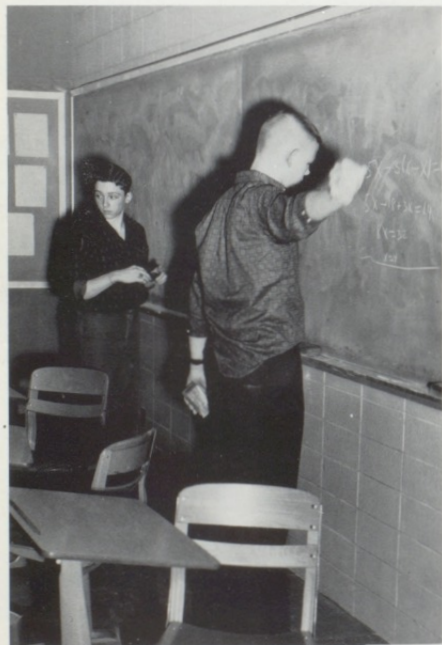

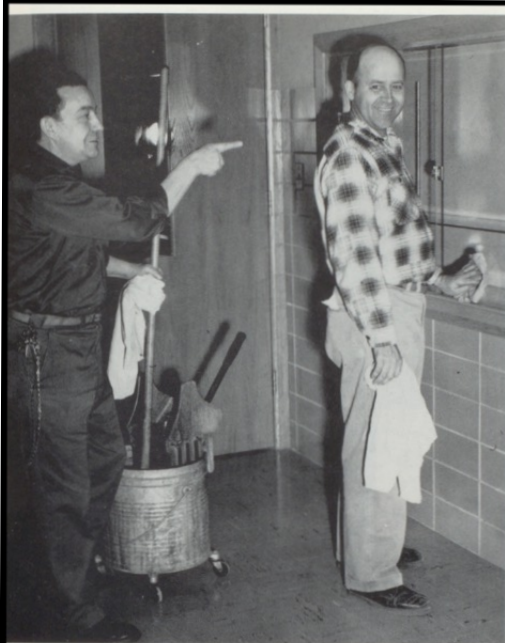
