





Under the direction of Mrs. Anne Trebilook and Gerhard Carlson, the class sponsored several evening events. Included in this list were many Friday night hops.


One of the most memorable events was the "Remember When" dance which they held after one of the basketball games. The main objective of the event was to present the top fifty records for the year of 1959.






