

The largest task of the Board this past year, other than their regular duties of collecting and appropriating revenue and hiring teachers, has been the Edison School. Under the Board's able supervision the construction of this new elementary school has been proceeding as part of a general expansion program under way in Coldwater, which program will provide better buildings and a more adequate budget for the Coldwater School system.

The Senior Story

1944. The seventh grade. We were not so high and mighty then, but the initiation into our new life was not entirely without compensation. A few of us crashed the journalism world through Mirror and Cardinal staffs; a few, the A and B bands; and one was honored on the popularity poll. Officers: Bob White, President; Virginia Garvin, Vice President; Phil Munger, Secretary; Gilbert Dean, Treasurer; Paul Woods and Nancy Fair, Representatives.

1945. We had a bang-up eighth grade party — where all the girls danced! Harry Cooper made varsity basketball — as manager, and no one could forget the SPORES!!! Nan Fair was our prexy and had able assistance from John Odren, Bob Tubbs and Pat Kaser, along with Gilbert Dean, Council Representative.

1946. Freshmen. A deluge of rural students was warmly welcomed into the ranks of the '49ers. All the boys went out for sports, a good share making reserve squads. We were proud of Carl Lewis, the first to make varsity football. Fred Weeks was prexy; Eugene Sowles, Max McConnell and Pat Kaser completed the line-up. Odren was council representative and Betty Aiken was elected as president of the Lincoln Council.

1947. Across the court and sophomores!! We joined all the clubs, were on all the staffs of the Mirror and Cardinal, went out for forensics, filtered "en masse" into the select "A" band. We helped celebrate the TV Championship in basketball; it was a rarity then. Sowles, Don Smith, Glyn Dee Havens, and Bob Luse were our class officers; Jane Morgan and Richard Dick were Commissioners.

1948. Juniors — not much longer. The Bow Tie Club and "I Speak For Democracy" Contest were initiated into the CHS curriculum. "Peg O' My Heart" was presented and was a brilliant success. Some of us were finally made staff editors — Patience and Fortitude. The crowning factor was, of course, the second TV champion-ship in basketball. Fred Weeks was class prexy; he was aided by Bob Luse, Carl Lewis, and Kenny McDonald. Morgan and Ardith Betts were Commissioners; the clerk was also a Junior — Aiken.

1949. This is Senior year. What has it brought? Oh, so very much. It has been a grand, wonderful year, one we, the Seniors, shall never forget. And through the Cardinal, our memory book, we want to share it with you, the undergrads.





The Varsity Basketball Story

On Nov. 30, showing the same spirit and aggressiveness as last year's championship team, the Coldwater Cardinals opened their 1948-49 basketball season by easily downing Eaton Rapids in a non-conference game, 65-30.

On December 4, the Cards suffered their first setback in 25 starts, dropping a close one to the Albion Wildcats 51-50, but the next week they came back strong to whip the Lakeview Spartans 60-35 for their last conference win of the season. In a thriller at Marshall, the seemingly beaten Cards came from behind with 14 points in the last 3 minutes to down the Marshall Redskins 46-42. Gaining momentum, on January 4, the Cards defeated E. Lansing, 49-29, thereby moving into second place in the T-V standings. The next week they moved to first place in the T-V league by handing the Adrian Maples a 49-28 beating. Their next opponent was Sturgis, and the Cards managed to slip by them by a surprisingly small margin, 36-33. This marked the Cards' fifth straight conference victory. To end the first half of the season the high-flying Cards romped over the Hillsdale Hornets with comparative ease, 45-31.

Opening the second half of the season, they removed

their chief rivals in the T-V race, and also avenged their lone defeat by emerging victorious over Albion, 57-33. The next week the Cards were compelled to fight all the way as they faced an inspired and improved Lakeview five. Coldwater managed to come out on top, 44-38. On February 4, the Cards all but clinched their third consecutive T-V championship as they scalped the revenge-seeking Marshall Redskins 54-21.

The East Lansing Trojans suddenly ended the Cardinals' 10 game winning streak. They pulled a major upset by defeating Coldwater in the last minutes of play by a very close score of 41-40. Completely recovered, however, the CHSers displayed top form as they raced to a surprisingly easy decision over the Sturgian Maples and then the Hillsdale Hornets, they found their task not too difficult as they downed each of them by scores of 55-30 and 48-28 respectively, thus ending the season. By beating Hillsdale, Coldwater became the 1948-49 Twin-Valley Baskethall Champions, being one whole game ahead of anyone else. This was the third straight year that Coldwater has accomplished such a feat.

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DISTRICT

In the first game of the District Tournament at Sturgis, Coldwater met and defeated the Sturgis Trojans in easy victory. The Cards, in the first of the game, rushed into the lead with an exhibition of sharpshooting and at the half were out 36-14. Coldwater outscored Sturgis 13-4 in the third quarter, and in the final stanza the Trojans had the edge, 17-1. The final score, 50-35.

Kalamazoo State High was Coldwater's opponent in the District finals and playing true to Cardinal enthusism, the CHSers gained the right to play in the Regionals by eliminating State High in a close game. Coldwater outscored their opponents in the first three periods and held a 11 point margin, going into the fourth quarter. At this point, however, the Kalamazoo club found the range and scored 14 points while limiting Coldwater to 3. State High was unable to score the winning bucket and the final score was 39-37 in favor of the Cardinals.

REGIONAL

The State Class "B" defending champs, who a year ago tripped up the Cards by one point in the Regional finals, met Coldwater in the initial game of the Regionals at Kalamazoo. This year the score was very much in reverse with the Cardinals winning, 48-39. The first two quarters saw St. Joe out in front 11-9, and 26-18 respectively, but in the third quarter, the Cards caught fire and outpointed the defending champs, 19-5. The same was true in the last period as the Ebymen again rushed pass their opposition, 11-8.

On Saturday, March 12, the Cardinals became Regional champions after whipping the South Haven Rams. Coldwater established a 15-4 lead in the first four minutes of play and was never once in danger. The score at the end of the first period was 19-7. South Haven fought back in the second quarter only to be outscored 14-12 and trail at half-time, 33-19. Play slowed down in the third quarter with Coldwater gaining a 9-7 edge, leaving the score at the end of the respective period, 42-26. The Cardinals, in the first four minutes of the final stanza, built up a substantial lead to make the score 55-31. South Haven then came back fighting to outpoint the Cards 9-1, but this didn't affect the outcome of the game and the Cardinals triumphed, 56-40.

OUARTER-FINALS

The Boys' Vocational School Fieldhouse at Lansing was the site of Coldwater's next battle, in which they met the Alma Panthers, who had been picked by the Free Press to take the State "B" title. In the first period, Coldwater bom-

barded the bucket to pace the Almanites, 15-6. The second quarter showed the teams on even terms with each registering 13 points, and making the half-time score 28-19. Both teams again played on even terms the rest of the game with each getting 10 points in the third quarter, and 13 in the last. Thus the favorites fell to mighty Coldwater, 51-42.

"OUR STATE CHAMPS"

This year's State Championship team will go down in history as one of the best basketball teams ever to play for Coldwater. They had a record of 21 wins and 2 losses. This is indeed excellent!

Many honors were achieved by this fine team. It was the Twin-Valley, District, Regional, and State Champion. It was also the highest scoring team in the league, with an average of 50 points per game. Also significant was the fact that four members of the team placed in the All-Conference selections: Rex Corless, who held Twin-Valley scoring with 224 points this season, and LeRoy Cox made the first five. Eugene Sowles was placed on the second team while Gene Fry was given honorable mention.

There are eight members of the Cardinal State "B" Championship team who are Seniors and thus have played their last basketball for Coldwater. They are: Harry Cooper, Tom Engle, Marvin Rosenberg, Fred Weeks, Max McConnell, Lawrence Porter, Eugene Sowles, and LeRoy Cox. Rex Corless, Gene Fry, Jim Rhodes, Bernard Hoogenboom, and Bob Simmons are the Juniors around whom next year's team will be built. All these boys will long be remembered because they brought to CHS the first State Championship in its history.

SEMI-FINALS

Grand Rapids Godwin Heights, paced by their lanky pivot star, Art Spoolstra, gave the Cards a tough, close fight for the semi-final tilt at Lansing Sexton High School. The opening period saw Coldwater outscore the Heights team 10-4, but in the second stanza Grand Rapids out-pointed the Cards, 13-12, making the score at half-time, 22-17. Inspired Godwin Heights, at the beginning of the third quarter, scored 6 points in

rapid succession and then scored 7 additional counters while holding the Cards to a mere 4. Score at the end of third quarter - Grand Rapids 30, Coldwater 26. Grand Rapids' lead was temporarily vanquished when the hard-fighting Cardinals made a field goal and two charity tosses in the opening of the final period. The lead see-sawed until the score stood 34-34 at the automatic time out. Grand Rapids scored on a free throw, thus regaining the lead, 35-34. It was Coldwater's brilliant center, Gene Fry, who then pulled the game out of the fire by stealing the ball and dribbling the length of the huge floor to score the winning basket. The Cards stalled the remaining few seconds to win 36-35 and advance to the finals at East Lansing.

FINALS

Saturday night, March 19, 1949, will long be remembered for on that night the Coldwater Cardinals met the tough River Rouge Panthers before 11,800 fans at Jennison Field House in East Lansing. The game, highly publicized as a close contest, turned out to be just that.

River Rouge, sparked by Al Driscoll, opened the scoring with a free throw. Cox sank a pivot shot then the Panthers hit on a corner shot. The Cards and the Rouge men each countered a charity toss. The score was then tied up 5-5, on two free throws by Corless. Driscoll scored but the Cards made up the deficit with two quick free throws. Rouge took the advantage with a close-in shot. A free throw by Sowles and a field goal by Corless put Coldwater ahead 8-7, only to have River Rouge regain the lead with a hook shot. Cox sank a rebound while the Panthers made a charity toss to tie it up 10-10. Rhodes then sank a free throw to give the Cards a 11-10 lead at the end of the first period.

Opening the second stanza, McConnell hit on a tip-in shot. The Rouge men racked up two points on a set shot only to see Rhodes tip in a rebound. Cox and McConnell each sank a free toss and then Driscoll scored again for Rouge. In the remaining few minutes before the half Coldwater scored 5 points while River Rouge made 4. The score at the half, 22-18.

Starting the third stanza, River Rouge opened the scoring with a free toss. Corless retaliated

with a field goal making it 24-19. Driscoll of the Rouge men then broke loose with two baskets to make it 24-23. At this point, however, Corless opened a scoring spree and connected for 7 quick points. River Rouge came back with 3 free throws but Sowles off-set this with a field goal to put the Cards out in front 33-26 at the end of the third quarter.

In the first two minutes of the final stanza, Coldwater spurted ahead with 6 points. Driscoll came through for the Panthers with a field goal while Corless dropped in a charity toss, making the score 39-28. The Panthers, fighting desparately, tried to stage a rally, but McConnell and Cox halted their efforts with field goals, making the score 44-31 at the automatic. In the last two minutes, the Panthers, led by Driscoll, scored 11 points, while Sowles fed the ball to Cox and McConnell, who also hit on a charity toss, for four valuable points. This made the final score, 49-42.


