The future looks promising for all who are ready to accept the challenges of our modern world. Education is the answer!



ADMINISTRATION

MR. WILLIAM A. DYER has been superintendent since 1937 and has seen our school population grow from about 300 to 1250. Under his supervision, many school districts combined to give better opportunities to all the children of the area. From the one remodeled building in service in 1937 we now have five classroom buildings in addition to a shop building now used for junior high. The vocational courses have been expanded so that many students now are prepared to earn a living when they graduate from high school. More math, science and foreign language courses give better preparation to the college-bound student. Under Mr. Dyer's supervision, two teachers with master's degrees in counseling have been added to the faculty. There has been a great change from the small school system of 1937 to the educational plant in our community today.





MR. WILLIAM L. ADAMS has been principal of the junior and senior high schools since 1948. His philosophy of education is that all students have a right to twelve years of public education and should be encouraged to complete that training. To that end, he spends endless hours assisting students to find the course of study for which they are best suited, encouraging them to try for higher levels, discouraging them from courses for which they are obviously not suited. This means that he knows and takes a personal interest in each student. Nobody knows how many have remained in school and graduated because Mr. Adams has said, "There's some good there. We ought to give him every chance to make use of it." Mr. Adams handles the scheduling of sports events and is always there in an official capacity, is present to see that all goes well at every social event, handles the business details of the annual, helps both students and teachers with problems, and has spent untold hours assisting classes in money-making pursuits. These are just a few of the many things our principal does in addition to his regular job of supervising curriculum planning and the education of our students.

The Union City Community Schools have completed the building program started in 1952. Included in this program was the Union City Elementary School, 1954; the Sherwood Elementary School, 1960, and the Union City Senior High School finished this year. The present and past boards played a very important part in the fulfillment of these projects. The school year, 1960-'61 was the first year the district had a seven member board of education, as required by State of Michigan law of 1960.

We sincerely wish to express our thanks to our Board of Education for the many hours and hard work they have put in and for their devotion to the best interests of the students, teachers, and the community.



This new frontier in education in Union City has provided our students not only with a beautiful new building, but also the opportunity to learn through experience.


In the library many more books have been bought for the use of the students. Now that there is more room, students can sign out of the study hall for the whole period and work in the spacious new library in peace and quiet.



The Home Ec. room is one of the most colorful rooms in the school. The girls have more ovens, irons, sewing machines, and an added attraction, a modern grooming area. Mrs. Converse has a demonstration kitchen which is very colorful and modern, and new furniture gives the room a home-like atmosphere.



More light, less fumes, more storage space! Yes, our new laboratory makes science study more effecient. In addition to a motorized hood under which gases are compounded, ventilators in the ceiling remove the gaseous smells that used to spread through the whole building. Each table is provided with a substation to supply either direct or alternating current, an improvement over the old battery-operated direct current. Each student has a drawer for his own supplies so he can work independently.









This year's Junior Play was a hilarious comedy entitled "The Inner Willy" which was presented on March 23 and 24. It was the first play to be given on the new high school stage.





This year we have a much more complete library than in previous years. Besides the main room, which seats fifty students, there is a conference room for group study. There is an audio-visual room for storing tape recorders, projectors, and other equipment, and an office and workroom used by the staff.

The library is open full time and at noon for individual student reference work. Students may come in a full study period or only part of one if they prefer.

The student library club has twenty-nine members each of whom devote approximately three study periods a week in the library. Usually two librarians are on duty every study period of the day. They take charge of the circulation desk and put the new books through the eleven processes.

Our Future Teachers Club received its charter on April 20, 1953 from the National Education Association and the Michigan Education Association.
