The Maroons got off to a very fast pace, winning four straight games without being scored upon. When archrivals Athens came to town before a record attendance the Maroons had much to be proud of. This was the official dedication of the new scoreboard which was the first electrically operated in the entire Little "C" Conference.

The Maroons reported for practice in late August, two weeks before school was to begin.
