## SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

E. Byron Thomas, our new and efficient "Super," graduated from Albion College with a B. A. in 1924. In 1935 he received his Master's degree from Northwestern University, later doing graduate work at the University of Michigan. He taught high school four years, was for six years Superintendent of Schoolcraft High School and for ten years Superintendent of Vicksburg High School. Six years ago he became C.H.S. Senior High principal and just two years ago Superintendent, thus completing his twenty-fifth year as an educator.
He is a member of the Masons, the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Rotary Club, the Michigan Educational Association, the National Education Association, and the National Educational Fraternity, Phi Delta Kappa. He uses his spare time, when he has any, reading anything in print and gardening.

## BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education is a group of five Coldwater businessmen elected by the people of Coldwater for terms of three years. The Board meets once a month and more often when necessary.

The largest task of the Board this past year, other than their regular duties of collecting and appropriating revenue and hiring teachers, has been the Edison School. Under the Board's able supervision the construction of this new elementary school has been proceeding as part of a general expansion program under way in Coldwater, which program will provide better buildings and a more adequate budget for the Coldwater School system.

NOV. 29-The Cards tonight raised the curtain on their 1949-19:0 cage season with a stunning $57-43$ victory over a non-conference foe, the Three Rivers Wildcats. The Cards had to stage a belated rally to clinch the hard-fought tilt.

DEC. 2-Before a packed home crowd at the Armory the Redbirds copped their first T.V triumph at the expense of the Albion Wildcats. The Cards, winning $52-32$, made up for Albion's briliant one-point upset the year previous.

FEB. 10 -Shooting for the coveted Twin Valley trophy in hopes of making it a fourth consecutive one, the Cardinal hoopsters set the East Lansing Trojans down a second time with a taunting 49.35 win .
FEB. 17 - For their tenth straight conquest the elassy Cards banished the wilted Maple Leaves of Adrian to the tune of $64-43$.

FEB. 24 -Running into an "up" Hillsdale squad that find pulled a couple of surprising upsets earlier in the season, Coldwater had to fight hard and settle for a slim $38-31$ victory. This was the final conference tilt, and by winning the Cards put their record at eleven straight with a total of 12 wins and 2 losses for the season.

## DISTRICT TOURNAMENT PLAY

MARCH 2-In the opening game of the district tournament at Sturgis, the Three Rivers Wildeats toppled Coldwater's defending Class B Champs, in a game that was regarded a major upset in the infant tournament play, by the meager margin of $42-40$.
Besides being Twin Valley Champs this year, the Cards also had four men, all seniors, on the squad who received additional honors by being placed on mythical all-star teams.
Rex Corless, twice previously an all-stater, was a unanimous choice for a first team all-state berth on three Detroit newspapers, New, Free Press, and Times and also the United Press ratings. Besides these honors, Rex was played on the T.V All-Conference first team, for the third straight time in his three year stint with the Redbirds.
Jim Rhodes, who ranked third among the T.V scorers, also received an all-conference first team position.
Gene Fry, playing brilliantly all season, took a T.V second team rating, being nosed out of the first team division, by one vote.
Bob Simmons, another member of the first five, by his alert and clever play, was given honorable mention.

Dear Diary:
The CHS basketeers have set a record that will probably never be broken. They have won their fourth consecutive undisputed T.V title! In a league that is considered the toughest Class "B" in the state, that was quite a record. In 1947 they won 14 and lost two during their regular scason. In 1948 they won 15 and lost one. In 1949 they won 14 and lost one to go on to win the State championship. You'll never find a team like the one in '49.

After all these marvelous squads, the townspeople said that another TV title couldn't be won by our varsity basketeers. Nevertheless, in 1950 they came through to do it again with a 13 win and but two losses. "You aren't licked until you mentally give up," ought to be their motto.

Of course, this feat could never have been accomplished without an excellent group of coaches. Along with our famous Coach Eby there was Cosch Reed Laughlin, who has since then brought his Port Huron boys to final state competition three times; Coach Dave Dillon, who has resided at Sturgis for the past two years; and Coach Bob Livermore, who has been Eby's "right hand" man for the past two years. Each one had his bit to add to the teams.

## Here's a quick run down of this year's team:

REX CORLESS is first and foremost on everyone's list. This was his third year as a varsity letterwinner nd in that time he has racked up 986 points, with a high of 256 this year to take the T.V scoring honors for the third time. He has been an All-State choice each year, this year being chosen unanimously by all Detroit newspapers for the first team. Rex was chosen for the all-conference team for the third time. CHS will have to look way into the future to find anyone who has the athletic ability to compare with that of Rex.
JIM RHODES, another three letterwinner, in his senior year proved to be the most improved player on any T.V squad. He injured his knee while playing freshman football and had played with this handicap until last summer when an operation cured him of this. Without his 14 point per game average, along with that of Rex, CHS wouldn't have won its fourth title. Jim is an excellent ball handler, both in out-court play and underneath the basket; he plays an exceptional floor game all the way. Jim finished this season with a total of 201 points to place third for TV scoring honors. He also won a first team all-conference berth.
GENE FRY is another senior winning his third varsity letter. He hasn't received a lot of publicity, but without him CHS wouldn't have had much of a defensive team. Many realized that even though Gene's point column did add up to 20 or 24 , he was one of the most valuable players on the floor. If it hadn't been for his interception to that ball during the G. R. Goodwin semi-final game in 1949, CHS would never have won the State championship. Gene showed us this season he could score if given the chance. Last year he made the second all-conference team and was to be an alternate for the first team this year, but the coaches decided to put five on the first team and the others were to be on the second team. Gene lost out by one vote. Even if he didn't make it, we all feel he's first team material.

BOB SIMMONS, a senior, won his first varsity letter this year when he came up and capably filled the forward position left open through graduation. He was a fast man, and turned in a good floor game. He wasn't a great one to score, but somehow he kept pep and snap in the fellows. Bob drew an honorable mention on the all-conference team.
