The Juniors spent many weeks in preparation of the banquet and prom, and the seniors were indeed honored.





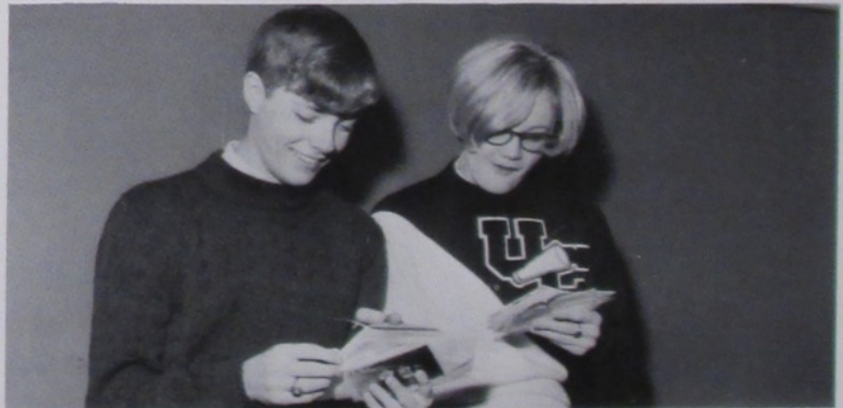

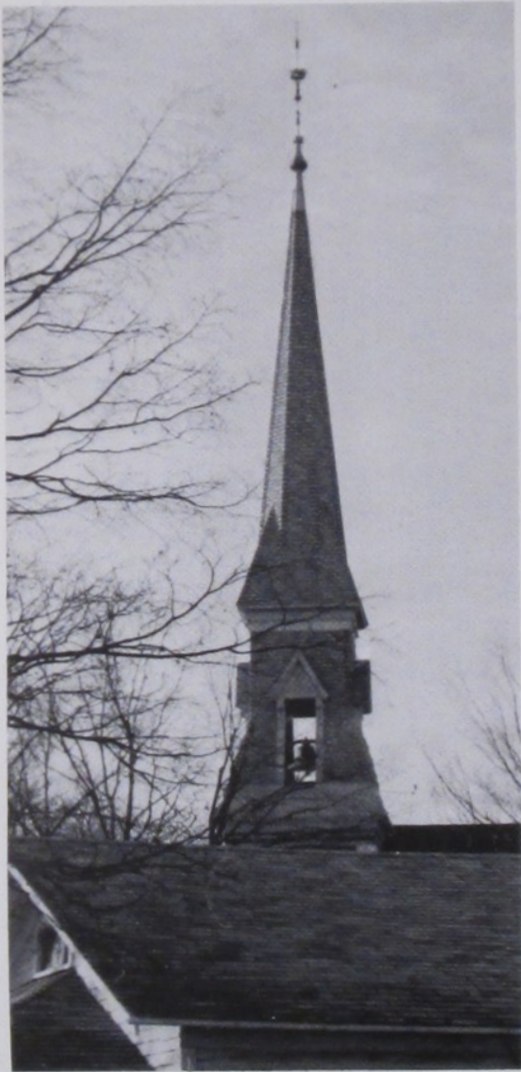
COMMUNITY

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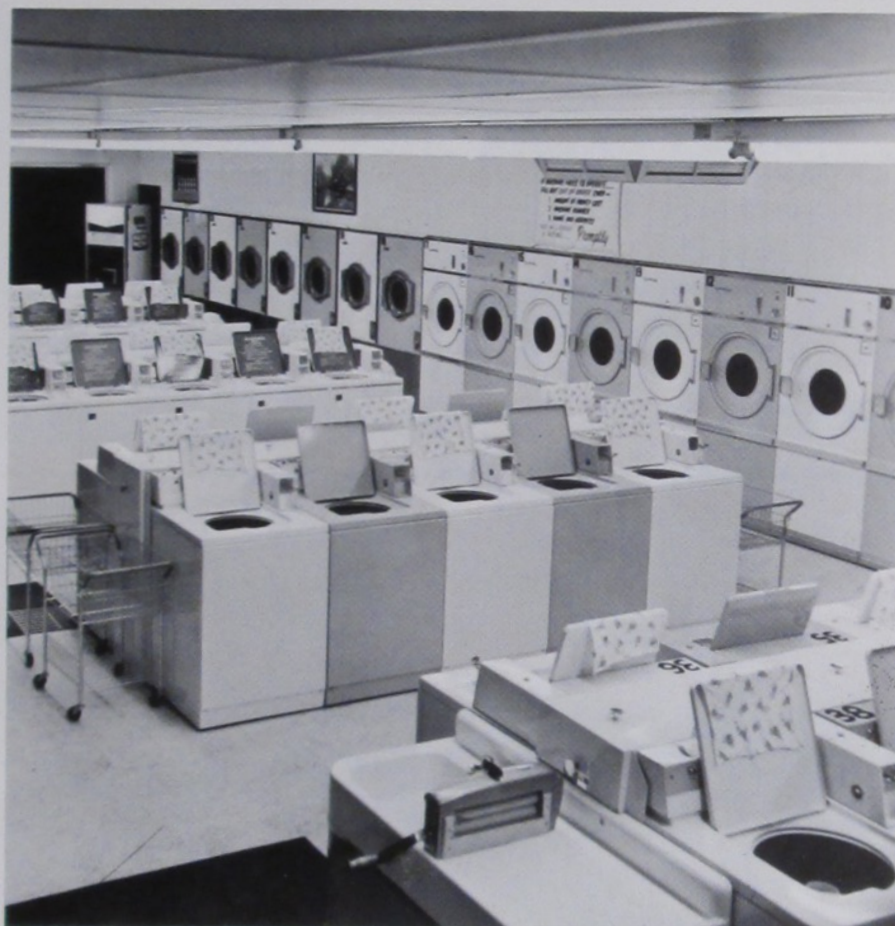
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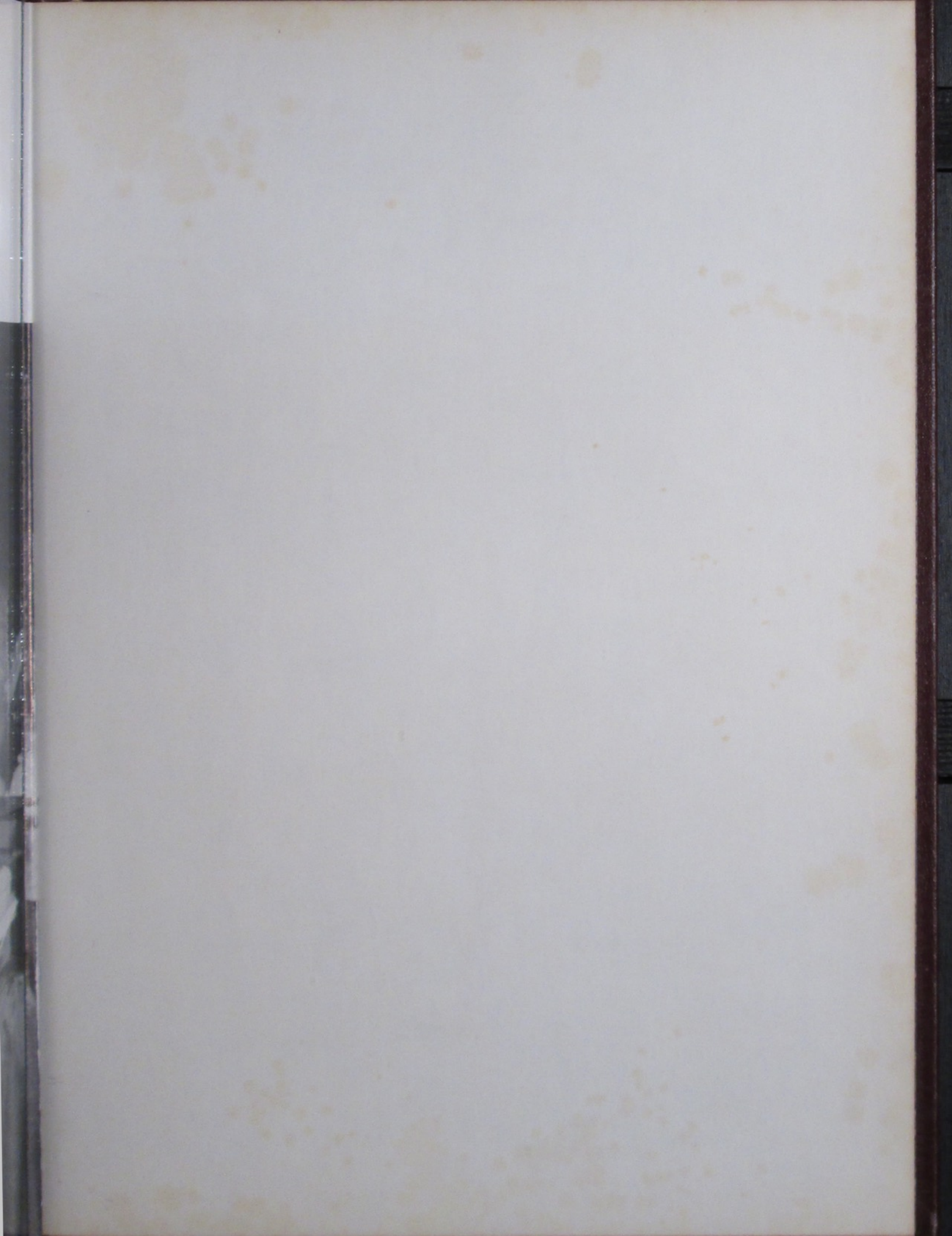

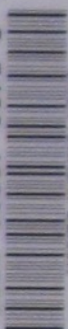








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
