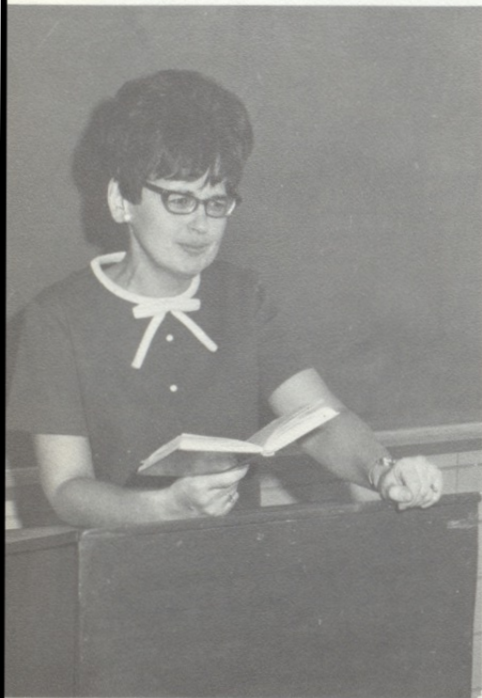
English Explores Inner World of Authors



English studies inherited fresh life this year with the addition of inspiring new classes. For the seniors, the study of Elizabethan times and drama was characterized not only by reading lines from a play, but by preparing a banquet where students recreated the uninhibited flavor of the sixteenth century food and dramatic entertainment. The study of contemporary music, along with American authors provided a challenge for the juniors' inexhaustible energy, and also an understanding of life in America yesterday and today. In their first year at CHS, the sophomores were introduced to a panoramic view of world literary figures; those as familiar as Omar Khayyam and as original as Rod McKuen.

Communications and creative writing are the other phases of this year's new approach. In these courses, students learn the meaning of involvement and effective communication with other people.

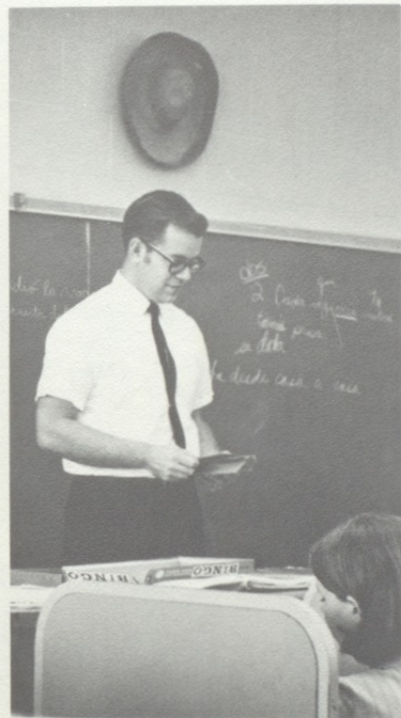

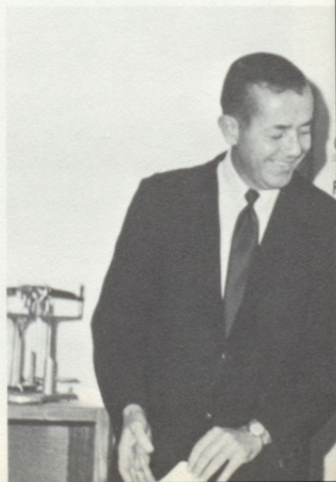
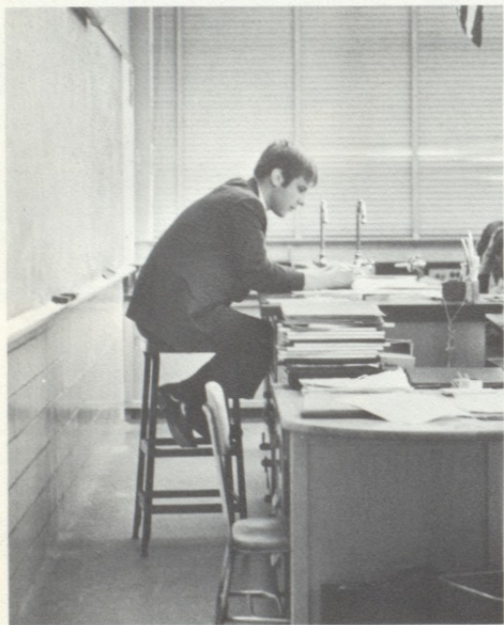
CHS Students



There's a new approach to chemistry being taught this year at CHS under the title of chem study. The course stresses the individual and his abilities to learn the laws and facts of chemistry through experimentation rather than by the cut and dry learning technique of the past.

The biology course taught at CHS this year gears itself according to the student's aptitude and interest. It is actually a composite of three courses which range from dissecting frogs, cross-breeding fruit flies and many other labs which add to the interesting aspects of the course.

It is the objective of the PSSC Physics course to learn a lot and at the same time enjoy doing the work. 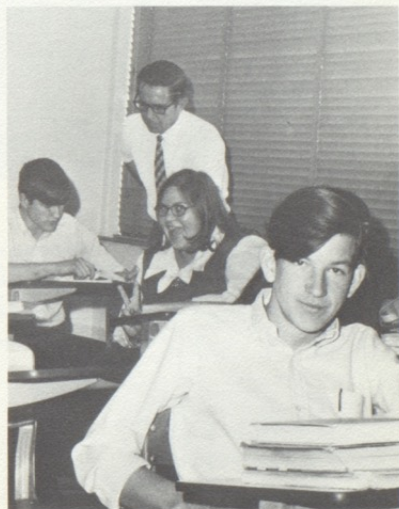

The fine arts department offers a variety of opportunities for each student's self-expression. Through the arts, students can involve their inner-selves and kindle the creative spirit.

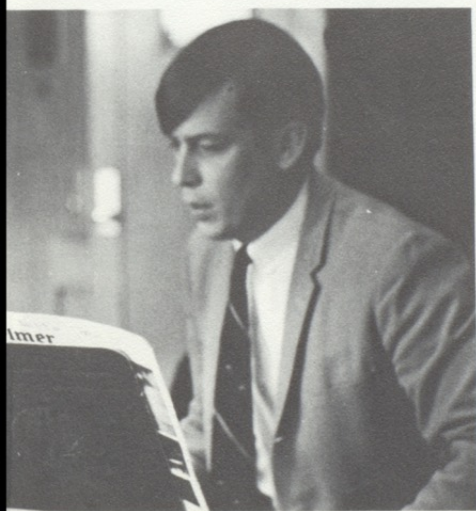
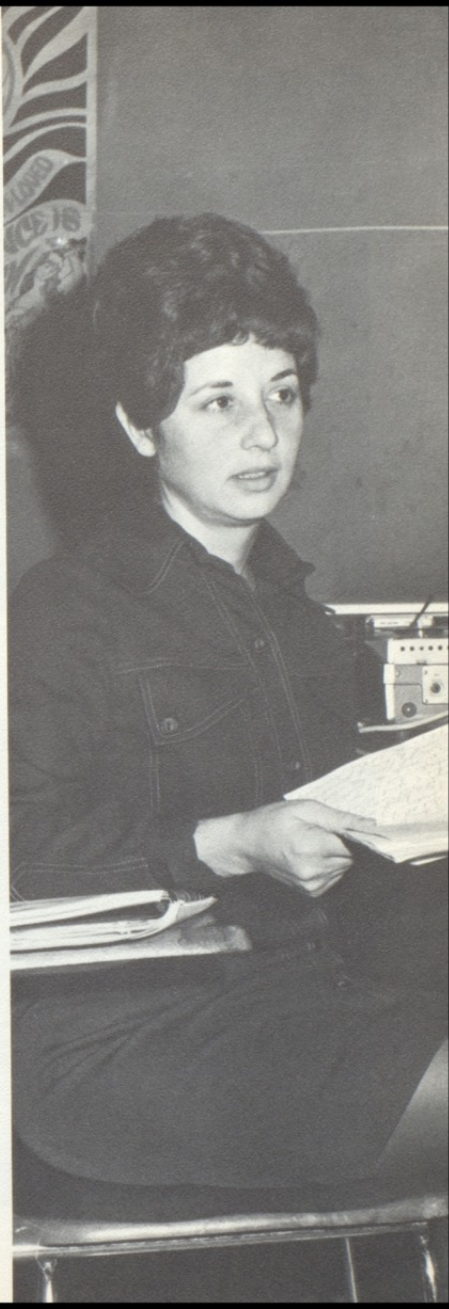
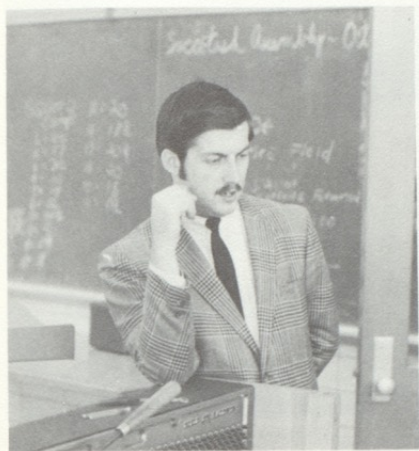
Under the supervision of Miss Woszczyński, the artistic interest of the students has been expanded. Creative snow creatures and wire men have helped to develop individual talents.

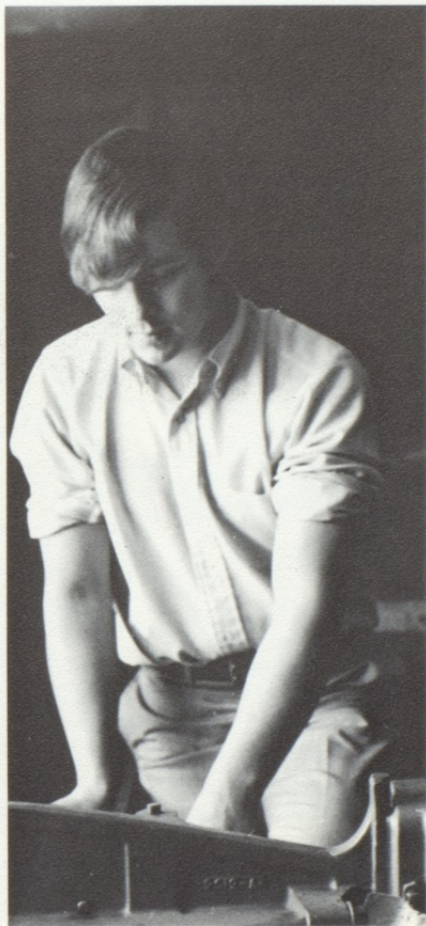

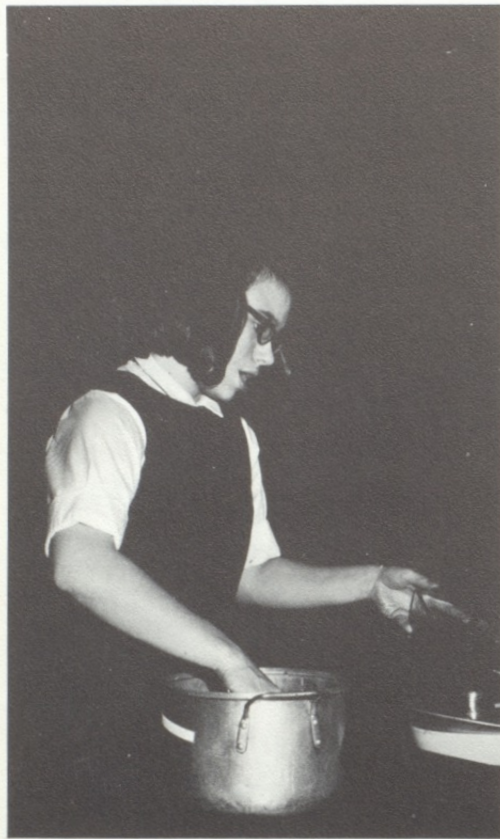

Talent, enthusiasm and hours of hard work by the cast and crew combined to make *The Loud Red Patrick* a booming success for the junior class.

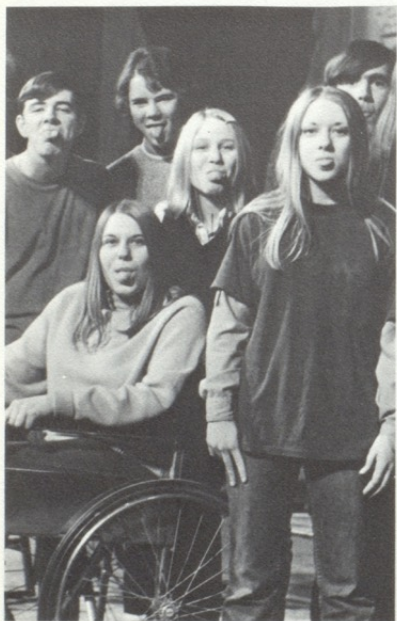

The Romantic Old South Recaptured

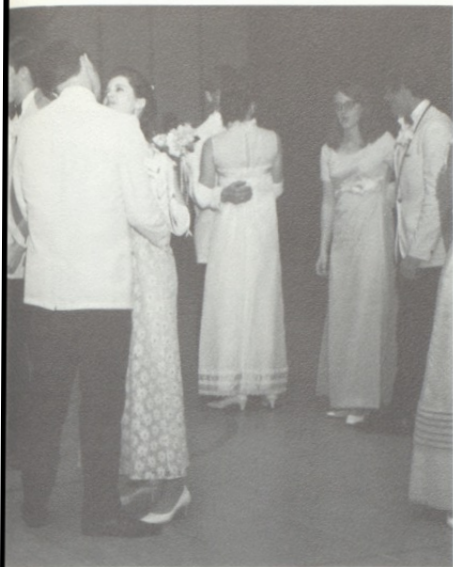
Young ladies and their escorts were swept into the romantic atmosphere of the "Old South" as they entered the 1968-69 Junior-Senior Prom.

Guests were entertained in the fashion of old southern comfort at restful post-prom parties. For one unforgettable evening, the old South came alive with spirited joy.





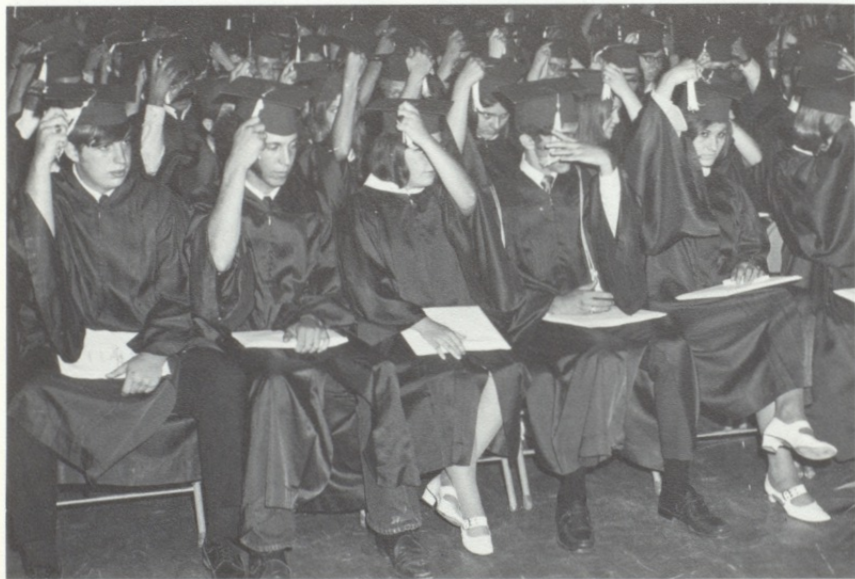

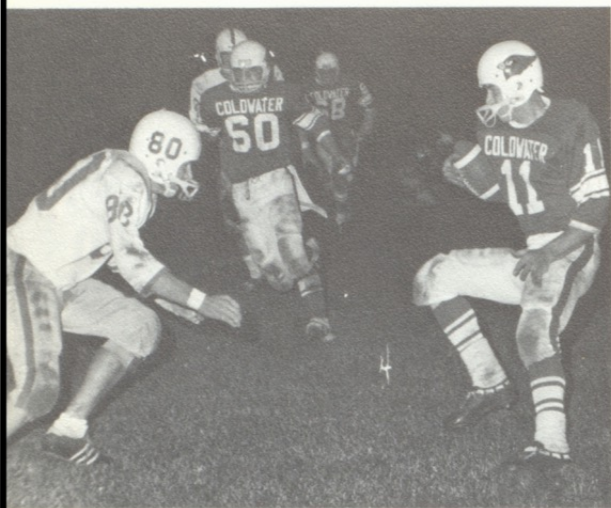

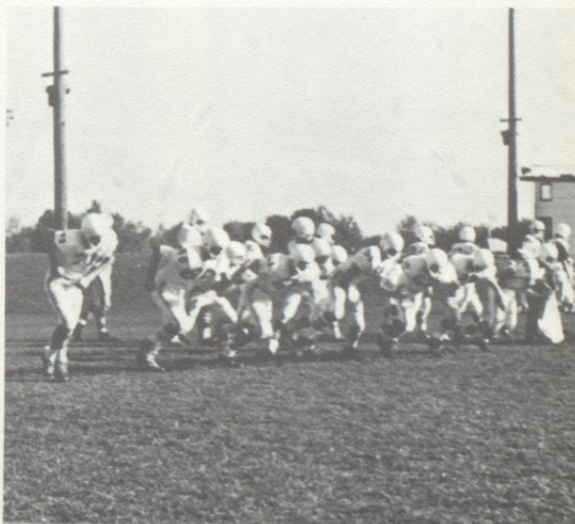
