## English Explores Inner World of Authors



English studies inherited fresh life this year with the addition of inspiring new classes. For the seniors, the study of Elizabethan times and drama was characterized not only by reading lines from a play, but by preparing a banquet where students recreated the uninhibited flavor of the sixteenth century food and dramatic entertainment. The study of contemporary music, along with American authors provided a challenge for the juniors' inexhaustible energy, and also an understanding of life in America yesterday and today. In their first year at CHS, the sophomores were introduced to a panoramic view of world literary figures; those as familiar as Omar Khayyam and as original as Rod McKuen.

Communications and creative writing are the other phases of this year's new approach. In these courses, students learn the meaning of involvement and effective communication with other people.

## Language Broken by Studies

The foreign language program at CHS breaks the boundaries of provincialism by introducing the student to the exciting realm of another language. Through their experiences with German or Spanish, they are able to greet a world of matadors and bullfights or escape to a quiet German village.

By emphasizing communication, Mr. Parker and Mr. Olsen manage to teach the language skills that will enable them to transcend the boundaries of America and communicate with foreign peoples.
