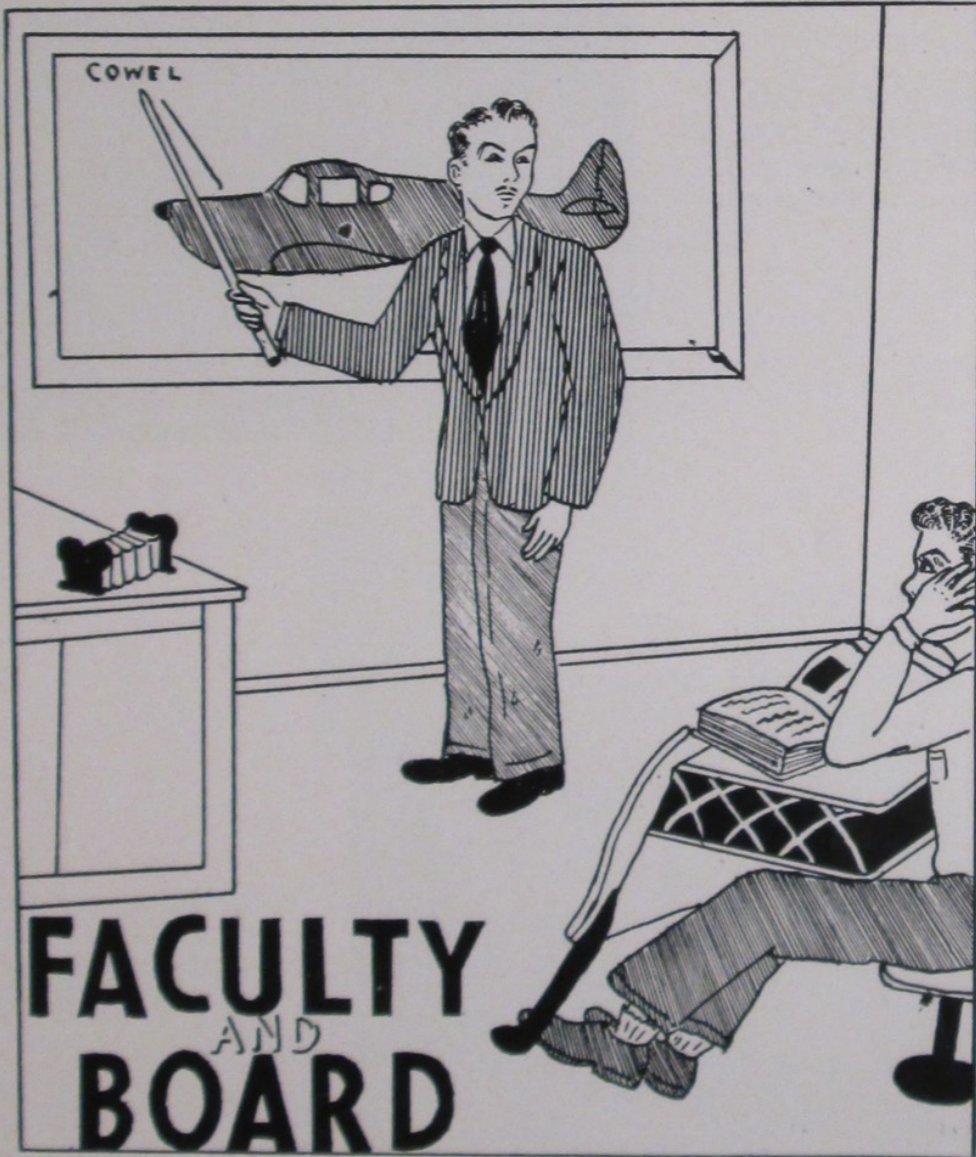
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may obtain practical experience in airing his or her views. In the classroom there is also ample opportunity for discussion among the students.

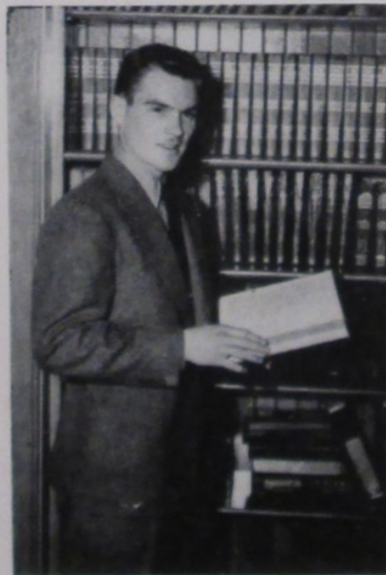

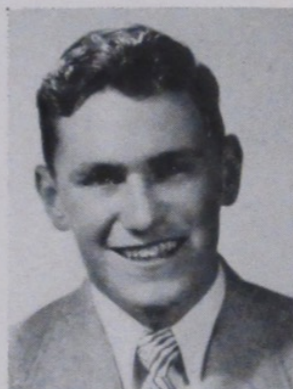

Our Christmas Ball was given December 19. The Drexel Lamb Orchestra played under the

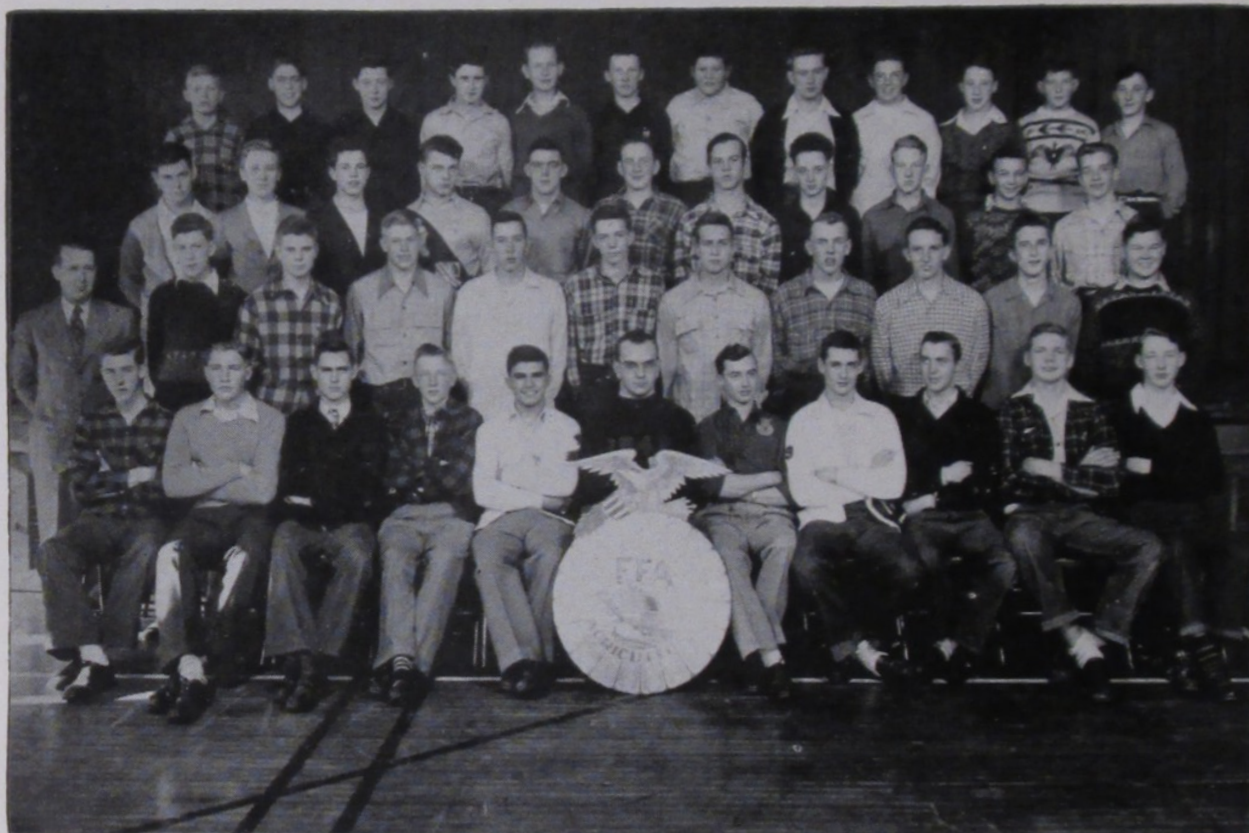
beautiful decorations of the Homemaking colors.

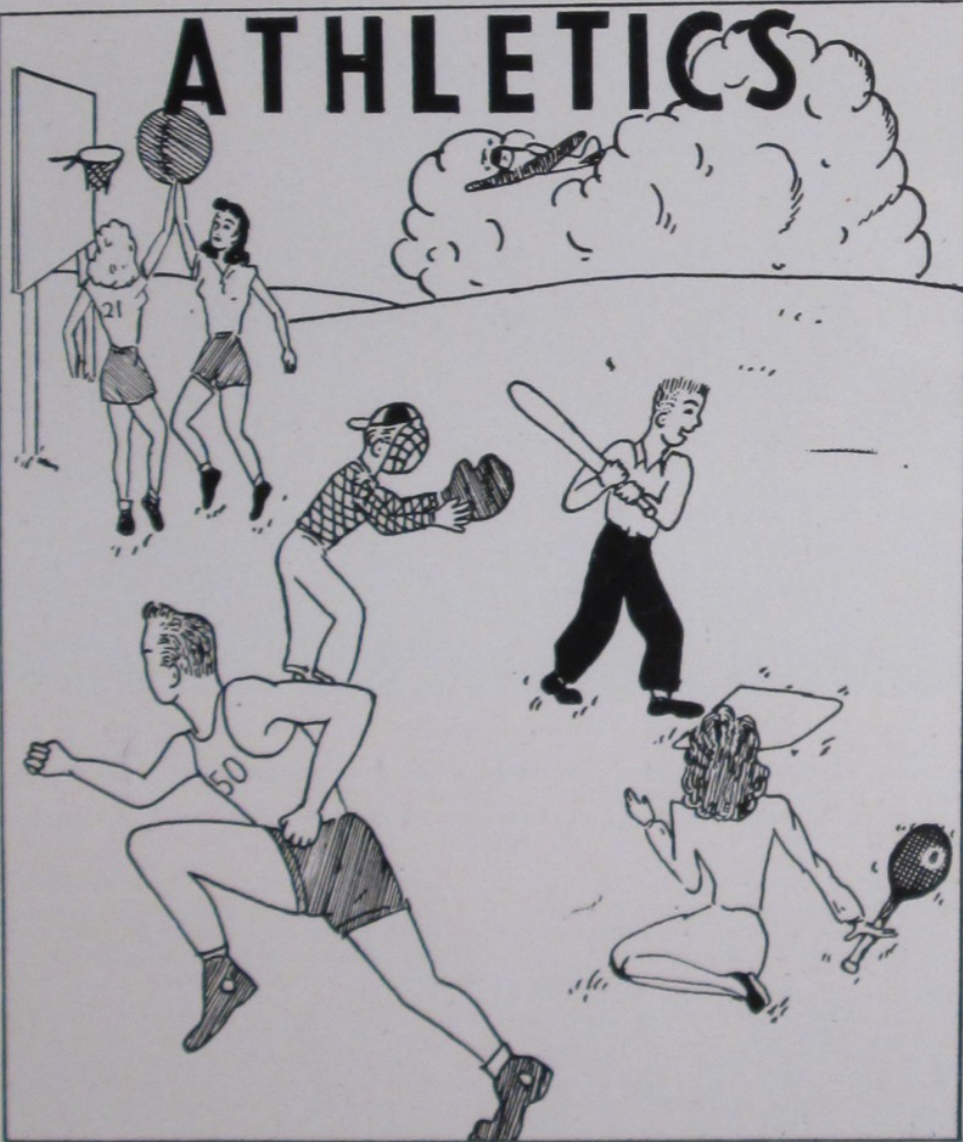

the second win of the season as the Orioles trounced the Litchfield Terriers. However, the rest of the season proved dismal as far as Quincy was concerned, due to losses in the final two games with Athens and Bronson.

This made the season total for the Orioles two victories and one tie as against four defeats. The Orioles scored forty-five points on seven touchdowns and three extra points. Many boys on the squad were awarded Varsity letters for their efforts.

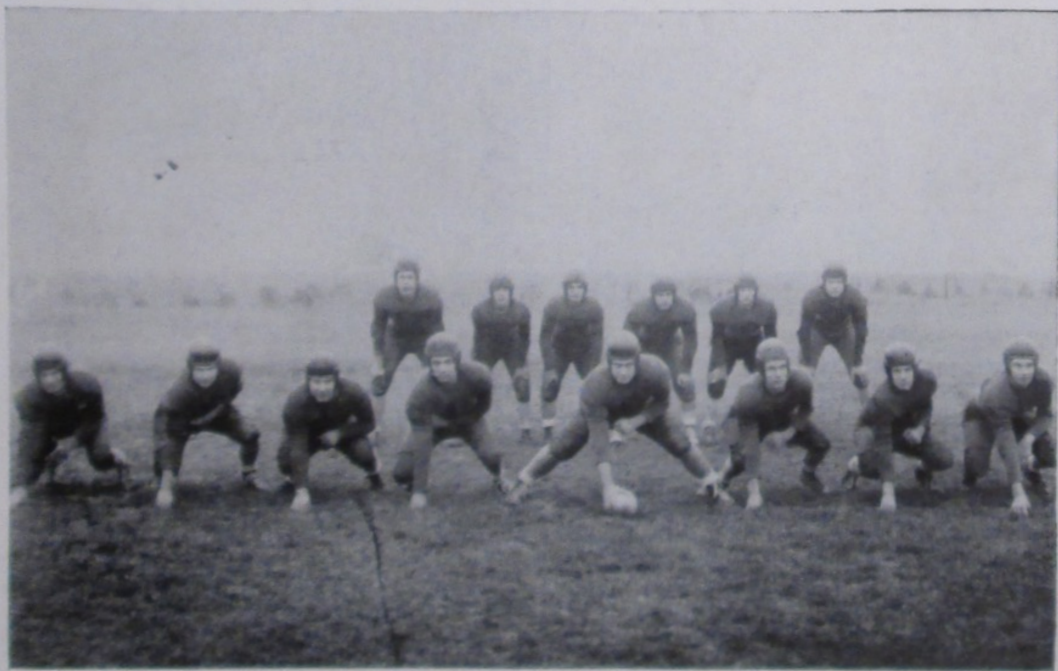
