We began to relax and make ourselves at home — we even became so daring as to venture into HARRYS or peep in on the dances at the Parish Housewhere "Pork" Morgan's band "banged it out every Saturday night — making pins out of macaroni was all the rage — The "Mirror" "dirticolumns ran thus: "In the eighth grade a feet



Three seniors, Duane Papke, Bill Newberry, and Bill Zabonick, played their last, and very successful basketball season this year for Coldwater High School.


