Losing Papke, Roby and Birch by injuries, the Marshall Redskins succeeded in dominating the field, winning $32-6$. Six days later the Cardinals showed what they were made of, after traveling to Albion, and bringing home the bacon, a CHS victory 25-14.

Well, that's about all, except the last game of the season with Sturgis! Spectators thronged the field to see the Seniors play their last game, and attempt to win the silver trophy from the Trojans. The score tells how hard they tried, $26-20$ in favor of Sturgis. Coldwater copped third place in the Twin-Valley, losing 3 ; winning 2 , and tieing 1 .
