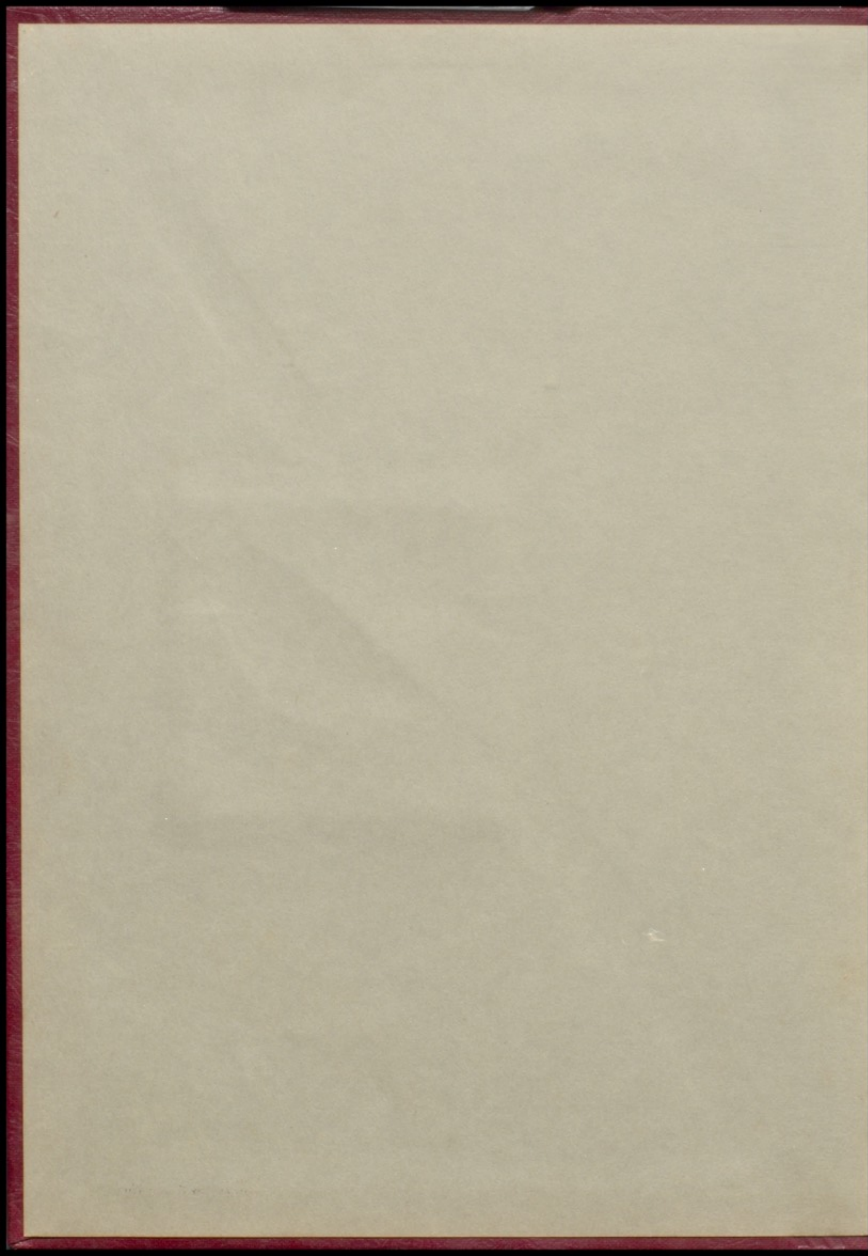
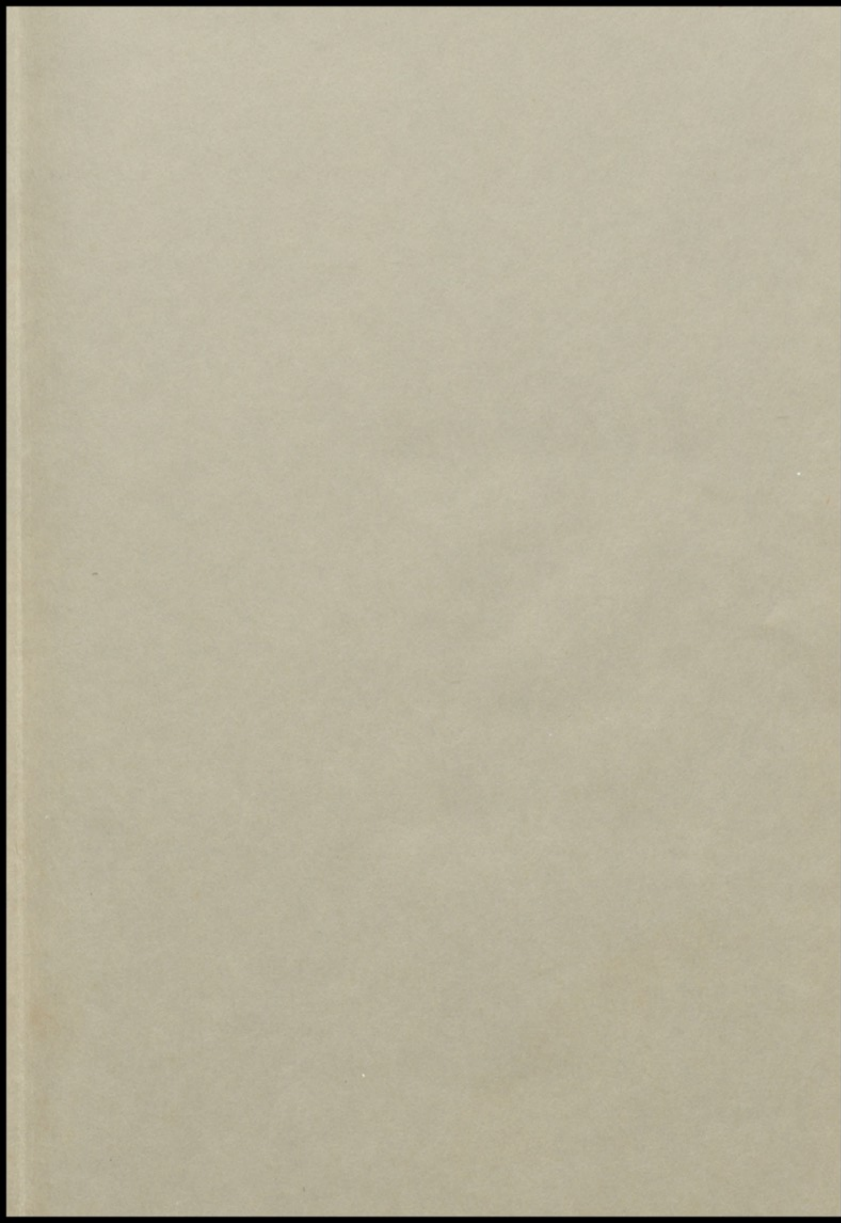

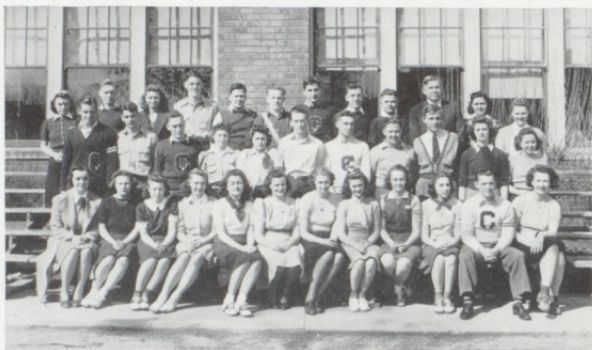

The Senior High School Glee Club had a very successful year, partially due to the fact that they met every day instead of twice a week. Much more could be accomplished under this new plan.

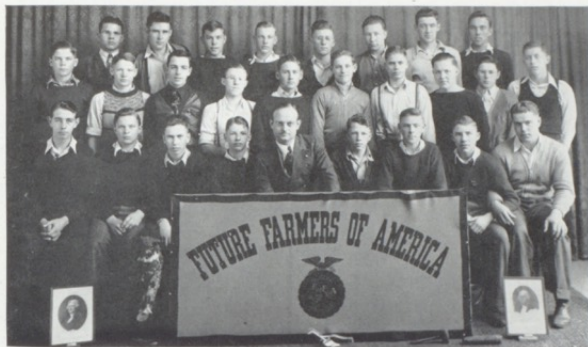
During the first semester, the Glee Club was under the direction of Miss Pitts. When she left to be married, Miss Behrents took over her duties.

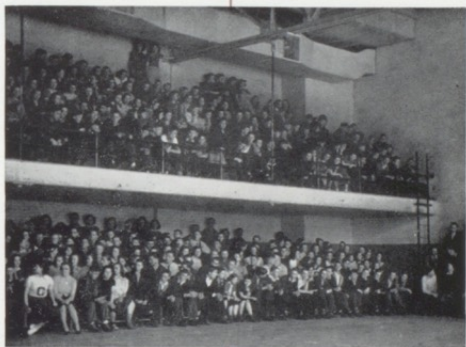

The Cardinal football team broke even in their schedule, winning four games and losing four, but the defeating of their ancient rivals, the Sturgis Trojans, in the final game of the season greatly offset this record.

In the line, Coach Bauer used VanAken, Harris, Huegli, and Van Every at the end positions, Love, Spink, and Pascoe at tackles, Ferguson, Zull, and Mohrhardt at guards, and Marion and Gates at center. Gates, however received an elbow injury in the first game and was lost for the remainder of the season. VanAken suffered a knee injury in the St. Augustine game which kept him on the sidelines for three weeks. Jim Love and Ozzie Marion, who were outstanding on line play, were selected honorary co-captains.

The Cardinal backfield was made up of Elliget at quarterback, O'Neil, Petersen, Linton, and Green at the halfback positions, and Barry at fullback. Bonnie Barry's punting was the talk of the conference. His season average was better than 41 yards from the line of scrimmage. Petersen, Linton, O'Neil, and Elliget also deserve a lot of credit for their work.

During the 1939 season, Coldwater defeated Marshall for the first time in nine years and played its annual Armistice Day game with Sturgis the night of November 10.

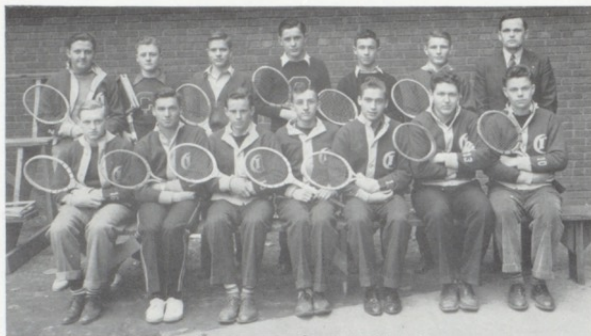
