

In eleventh grade United States history classes, textbook materials are linked to current events. Programs produced by the social studies faculty make the history of a great nation more interesting to students.







### New Approaches Prove

The sounds of the "physics skateboards," the buzzing of the electric timers, the screaming of the slinky as it slithered across the floor, the humming of 50,000 volts of electric potential, and Gulliver, the Lilliputians, and King Kong, all put into one package launched the Physics Department into an adventure with PSSC Physics. These and many other experiments have all been put together into a fascinating new program designed to make physics more exciting and fun. We'll never forget measuring the size of a molecule with a meter stick or finding the mass of an electron with a rolled up piece of paper, or the lab reports worth 10 points if they were done by the next day. All of the labs, the tests, the problems, and films made it a memorable journey into the exciting land of physics.

#### Successful In Science Dept

In a new approach to the science of chemistry, students learn in terms of generalizations. Then, as new information is gathered and more precise measurements are made, thinking is adjusted to formulate new theories in terms of new evidence. Emphasis is also placed on mathematical descriptions of the fundamental laws of the universe. Finally, technical use of some of the more sophisticated modern laboratory apparatus is taught.

1967-68 is the second year of individualized study in general biology. Students may work at their own speed with those finishing assigned materials going on to advanced work. Several kinds of laboratory and reading materials are available to suit the needs and abilities of the student. Three days a week are spent in the laboratory and individual study while two days are lecture days. The laboratory is the most important part of the program with the student conducting his own investigation and writing the reports which are turned in weekly. Lecture materials range from problem solving to evolution.

# Boys Learn Through Building

In a three hour building course junior and senior boys are offered the opportunity to prepare for occupations in home construction. Under the supervision of Mr. McCurley the boys construct the framework of the house, install plumbing, wiring and heating themselves. The completed house is later sold by the Board of Education and upon graduation from the course the boys are ready for initial fulltime employment with building contractors or have the background to enter an apprenticeship program.

#### Vocational Ed. Trains

The Automotive Skill Center is located in downtown Coldwater. This shop is the third largest high school auto shop in Michigan, and has been operating for three years. Students are selected from Quincy, Coldwater, and Bronson High Schools. These students spend half a day every day learning about the repair of automobiles. This popular course serves as a springboard for students who are interested in entering the automotive service field.

Industrial Arts, including both metal and wood shop, provides CHS boys with a practical knowledge of tools and their use in industry. In addition to standard equipment, Mr. Stankey has taught the students the use of a new tensile tester, lathe and surface grinder.

The purpose of Thespian Troupe # 196 is to provide students with the opportunity to develop latent talents and to acquaint interested apprentices with the modern theatre.

The group traveled to the annual Drama Day at Western Michigan University on February 17 where they witnessed the production of *Cry*, the Beloved *Country*. The annual children's play was presented in May and to conclude the eventful year an honor's banquet was held.

In the past two decades modern competitive debate has enjoyed a significant revival in the United States. Television programs with widely publicized debates have contributed to our national awareness of the merits of public debate.

Historically, the origins of American debating can be found in colonial times, flowering in the Revolutionary period, and reaching maturity in the majesty of the debates in the Constitutional Convention. The names of some of our earliest debaters - Hamilton, Webster, Randolph, and Douglas - are revered by all students of debate. Alexander Hamilton, at the age of 16, participated in debate at King's College. One can recall the momentous debates between Webster and Havne on Foot's Resolution, or Lincoln and Douglas on slavery, and more recently the debates between Kennedy and Nixon. Thus, debate has been intimately associated with the history of the United States from its earliest days to the present.

Similarly, Coldwater High School is proud of its debaters. We do not believe that debate as a scholastic endeavor should be pilloried as time consuming and an extra-curricular frill. We believe that debate offers to the student many positive educational values. It promotes basic library skills in research, trains critical thinking and evaluation of the main issues in any problem, emphasizes the virtues of careful deliberation and judgment as opposed to impulsive utterance; requires the development of physical and mental selfcontrol; trains the participants in clear, logical, and distinct speech; teaches the criteria to be utilized in evaluating public discussion and statement; concentrates attention on vital matters, rather than trivialities in asser-










