Although it may appear to be a position of leisure, being a high school principal is no easy job.




Mrs. Pendill has taught in Union City's school system for several years. In addition to instructing several classes of junior and senior English students, Mrs. Pendill also teaches American History.

Part of English is reading, and one of the best things to read is the "Maroon and Gray" newspaper, published by the journalism class.















Ranked 4th in State


The 1966 Maroon varsity football squad completed the most successful season in the history of UCHS by compiling a perfect 8-0 record and outscoring their opponents 334-6. This unblemished record gave the Maroons the conference championship, a no. 2 ranking in the area for class C schools, and a no. 4 statewide ranking in class C.

Highlights of the season were a 26-6 win over highly-ranked Quincy, a 35-0 pounding of Bronson, and a tough 32-0 victory over arch-rival Athens.

To cap an extremely fine season, ten members of the squad were given mention on the all-conference team. Ron Brewer was named as honorary captain of this team.












Appendix
