The Union City Maroons started the season with the return of thirteen letter-men and several reserves which look very promising.

The first game was scheduled for Sept. 17th. After several days of hard practice, the Maroons met their first opponent, Reading. There was little trouble for the Maroons. At the end of the game the tally read 25-0.

The next game was with Colon. Since a 31-0 score was racked up there seemed to be no trouble for the fast and hard hitting Maroons.

Oct. 1st. Union City battled it with a tough Homer team, with the final score standing at 6-0. But here Clyde Finlay, Union City's left-end, received a knee injury, which kept him out the rest of the season.

Oct. 8th was the game of the season with Union City and Quincy tied for first place. It was a battle to the finish with Hoover kicking both extra points to place the Marcons in first place by one point. The score was 13-14.

The Marcons took Bronson the following week 18-0. Here the Marcons suffered their first serious injury. Bill Howell, left guard, suffered internal injuries and was hospitalized, unable to finish the season.

Jonesville was the second and last team to score on the Maroons. Due to the loss of Howell and a misunderstanding between Jones of Union City and Jones of Jonesville. The score stood at 20-12. After a hard and tough fight the Maroons topped Litchfield 13-0.

Then came Athens, Union City old rival. The hard charging Union City line accounted for the first tally a touchdown. Luck was against the Marcons for six touchdowns were scored but only two counted. The Athens four were called back on penalties. The Marcons were penalized 105 yds. to Athens 30. But the score was Union City ll, Athens 0.

The fact that the Maroons did such a nice job of blocking, tackling, and ball handling with so few injuries, was due to Coach Wheeler, who did every thing possible to help the Maroons become undefeated Champion of the Little C Conference.
