## A Year of Changes



The 1963-1964 year has been a year of changes and new experiences not only in our school system, but also in the United States as a whole. The starting of school in September brought to us a new superintendent, new principal, and five new faculty members, as did John F. Kennedy's tragic death bring to us a new national leader in November.

Civil rights concerning our freedoms as citizens of this country has been the big issue in the United States. In a way civil rights has played a big part in our school too. At the beginning of the year the new administration issued student handbooks as our guide to freedoms. We have freedoms if we don't abuse them.

The school day ran on 50 minute periods, with three minutes between classes, and a 38 minute lunch hour. This year was also the first time a school newspaper was issued weekly.

Along with these other changes some new courses were added including a girls' gym class, a college English course, and a journalism and speech class.

This community has seen the largest graduating class in the history of U.C.H.S. receive their learning from a new building, new facilities, and a new type of education.

Another year, another class, other activities, will bring still more changes and improvements to our education.
