
Coldwater High School

Coach Bertrand Grigg



All life should be a struggle, a striving, and an aspiration, and one's last day should be one's best and happiest.


There is a constant stir in the soul when there is struggle going on; when too much comfort sets in, dying begins.

Chronicles of the Senior Class

In September 1942, we, the Class of '47, took our scared-to-death bodies into the big Junior High and proceeded to uphold the old tradition of reverencing the big Freshmen and being thrilled each

time one of them spoke to us. But, as the year wore on, we became more confident and no longer felt as lonely as we had at the beginning. We chose our class officers: president, Marjorie Byers; vice-president, Dick Baum; secretary, Martha Snyder.

The first thing we did in the 8th grade was to elect Bob Milliman, Wilbur Noel, Jean Mills and Mary Vinton our class leaders, and we also undertook selling magazine subscriptions to buy a radio victrola.

When we arrived at our Freshmen year we were the big confident leaders of the Junior High and were enforced by the rural students who joined our brigade to become graduates of C. H. S. At this time the boys in our class began to pay attention to the girls and we got over our clumsiness. The boys made up the future basketball, baseball, and football teams and were we proud of them! At this time we sold magazine subscriptions again to buy folding bleachers for the gym. Perhaps they will put the money toward the new field house.

The crossing of the court didn't come soon enough for us and we found ourselves in the same boat as when we had entered the Junior High—scared to death not only of the Juniors and Seniors but also of the Faculty. The sophomore reception made us no longer strangers with the others and we got into the step of things. We then elected Clyde Gilbert, Bob Milliman, Ramona Thomas and Don Linn as our class officers.

On March 30, 1946, we presented "Papa is All," as our Junior Class Play, and with a cast of six it turned out to be a great success. Our officers that year were: president, Larry Olmstead; vice-president, Frances Walters; secretary, Peggy Best; treasurer, Jack Healy. Co-operating with the Class of '46 we put on an excellent Junior-Senior Banquet—in fact 1 think it was the best one yet. I can still taste that good chicken gravy.

We, the class of '47, began our senior year with a big bang. We chose Francis Walters as president of our class; Beverly Haylett, vice-president; Jean Mills, secretary, and Jeanette Corless, treasurer. Bob Milliman was elected as Mayor of the High school, and Larry Olmstead, Senior Commissioner. This year many of us worked real hard on the Cardinal and the Mirror staffs, and the rest of the school ought to bow mighty low to us. "Thank you, folks."

We presented "The Green Light," with a cast of 9 under the direction of Anne Gwatkin. This was also a great success and made lots of money for our Washington trip.

Our class won honors not only in quality but in quantity. We hope the school misses us 'cause we'll miss it.





ened their curriculum to include more subjects of interest to more people... Not only is it necessary for high schools to have a good curriculum; they must also have an efficient teaching staff, adequate facilities, and high standards in all fields...


In the battle of mechanical versus cultural education, there is much to be said for both, but it is our opinion that to be successful one must combine the two.

Could we, without mechanical aids, run the farms of hundreds of acres that are necessary to feed our people? Could we weave the millions of garments that we must have to keep our people clothed? Could we communicate from coast to coast in a matter of seconds, or travel the same distance in a matter of hours? . . . These, along with millions more, constitute progress. Without progress little of importance is accomplished.

All of this mechanical education, however, is of little value without a cultural background... In order to appreciate the full value of great inventions and discoveries, in order to have the benefit of the knowledge of past experiences, in order to understand uses for these marvels, one must have a cultural education. Life is a selling game. You sell either your inventions, stoves, automobiles, farm products, your ability, your knowledge, your brains, your ambition, brawn or your time. You must convince other people of the merits of the thing you're selling, and to do this, first of all you must sell yourself. One needs a cultural background to do this, and as civilization is a high degree of culture, we must prove that we are cultured before we can claim to be civilized . . .

We believe that for a well-rounded life, it is necessary to have both—the mechanical education and a cultural education. This, then is what schools today must strive for

"The next time you pass a school pause a moment to think what that school means to humanity. Recall the long, dark centuries when the masses were kept in ignorance — when greed and oppression ruled the world with an iron hand. From the very beginning of man's struggle for knowledge, self-respect and the recognition of his inalienable rights, the school has been his greatest ally. We refer to the school as 'common' because it belongs to us all; it is ourselves working together in the education of our children. But it is a most uncommon institution. It is democracy's greatest gift to civilization."—Courtesy of NEA


COLDWATER 6



Basketball

Twin Valley Basketball Champions

The Cardinals opened their season with a nonconference game against Colon. Because of the race-horse style of baskethall played this year, 29 personal fouls were collected, but the boys came through with a 41-26 win. The game was played in our gym, December 3, only two weeks after the boys had started practice.

After two more days practice, the team journeyed to Albion to face a tall, fast Wildcat team. Although considerably shorter than the Albion Cagers, the Cards outran them to win by a 37-26 margin. Again the unaccustomed style of play hampered the Cards and they chalked up 32 personals.

The next week, December 13, the team played at home and marked up a 48-44 win over Lakeview. The Spartans had one of the fastest teams in the conference, and also one of the leading scorers. It was a very close game with the lead changing hands time after time, and the outcome was in doubt up to the last few minutes when our boys managed to pull ahead to stay. This game also showed that the team was getting used to the new type of ball, their fouls being cut almost in half.

The following Tuesday the Cardinals traveled to Marshall to meet the always dangerous Redskins. The first half saw the Cards completely outplayed. Due to the superior height of their opponents they got the ball very few times and were only able to score 4 points. As the second half opened it looked as though Eby's boys were going to get back into the game. They showed a lot of fight and sank several quick buckets, but the Redskins again got control and the game became our first loss. The final score was 35-16.

After the Christmas vacation, the Cards played host to another big team. The East Lansing Trojans were tied for second with Coldwater when they came here on January 7. Although the team fought every minute and outran the Trojans, they again had trouble getting the ball due to their opponents height advantage. The Cards took their second consecutive dejeat, 43-





36. This game was a tough one to lose and it dropped us back to third place.

On January 10, the Cards played their second game of the week on the home court. The Adrian team, back in the Twin Valley Conference after being out during the war, came to Coldwater with a highly reputed team. Despite their height, the Adrian cagers had trouble controlling the backboards and the Cards got back on the winning trail again to the tune of 51-33.

The next week the team invaded Sturgis. The boys played their best game of the year up to this point. Although the Trojans averaged slightly taller than the Cards, they were about the shortest team on our schedule. The Sturgis five couldn't keep up with our boys, either on offense or defense. For the first time in five years the Cards beat Sturgis on Sturgis' floor. The final score was 52-44.

January 17 again found the Cards away from home—this time at Hillsdale. They didn't show the same form that was evident at Sturgis, and couldn't get over a three or four point lead in the first three quarters. In the last quarter they pulled away to beat the Hornets 48-38.

Starting the second round of the season the Cards played host to the Albion Wildcats. It was a repitition-off the first game with Albion. Again the Cards had to depend on speed to overcome the height advantage the Wildcats enjoyed. Albion showed a lot of improvement since the first time we met them but the Cards were also a much better team. After a slow start the Cards got under way and won a 40-25 victory.

January 31 found the Coldwater cagers at Lakeview. The Spartans were a speedy team and riding high at the time, but the Cards looked like an inspired team, in putting out one of the best

games of the year. The Spartan five had difficulty getting the ball past the middle of the floor, as time and time again the Cards intercepted their passes to drive in for baskets. The first quarter showed 23 points for Coldwater, but the Cards went ahead to run up their highest score of the year. When the fireworks ended, it was Coldwater 59, Lakeview 40. This marked the Cards fifth straight victory.

The next week the boys came home for what would undoubtedly be their toughest game of the year. The Marshall team was

undefeated. This was really a game for the fans. Time and time again the lead changed hands. Neither team was able to get enough of a margin to enjoy a moment's respite. Both teams were in there fighting for the ball and it was really a fine exhibition of the cagers' art. The Cards were determined to have this one, however, to avenge their previous defeat by Marshall and to stay in the race for the T. V. crown. The final score found Coldwater out in front 36-30.

The next Tuesday the Cards played host to Angola. The Coldwater cagers were out to break the Hoosier state's reputation for basketball teams. It was another hard-fought, close battle. The Angola five showed some deceptive ball handling and made the Cards work for every point but it wasn't quite enough and the Cards ran up their seventh straight victory, 49-42.

Three nights later, on February 14, Coldwater's team left for East Lansing. Besides being bent on keeping in the T. V. race, the Cards were out to avenge their only defeat of the year. The Trojans got off to a good start and had the lead for the first quarter. Then the Cards started fighting back for a small lead

at the half. In the second half they increased their lead only to see it disappear when the Trojans started connecting on some long shots. Again they fought back, and after one of the year's most exciting games, brought home their eighth straight triumph, with a score of 43-39.

The Sturgis cagers came to Coldwater on the following Tuesday. This gave the Cards only one day of practice. The Trojans grabbed an early lead and for a while it looked as if they would have no trouble in defeating the Cards. This impression was short-lived, however, when the C. H. S. team turned on the steam and forced themselves into the lead and won 52-36. This marked the first time in nearly 20 years that the Cards beat Sturgis twice in one season and once again the boys showed that they were not to be stopped by any jinx.

Three more days and the Cards were playing again. This time it was at Adrian. The Adrian cagers were determined to terminate our boys winning streak. They started by pouring the ball through the net from close in and way out. For the first time in ten games the Cards were trailing at the half, but the mark of a truly good team is the ability to overcome all odds and to come back. Once again the team showed what kind of spirit they had as they forged back in the second half. It was an exhibition of what makes a good team a winning team. The Cards turned on all they had to beat the Maples by 11 points, 54-43.



On February 28, the Cards prepared to play their last conference game of the year, as the Hornets from Hillsdale invaded Coldwater. Due to our winning streak and Marshall's three defeats, we were the undisputed T. V. Champs. This condition might have caused them a let down but they were determined to finish the season with a victory. The Hornets put on a good passing show but they couldn't seem to connect on their shots. The final score stood with Coldwater, 44 and Hillsdale, 28. The Cards finished their season with eleven straight triumphs and at least one victory over every team they played. While losing 2 games, they won 14, a number of victories never before equalled in Coldwater's history.

In the first game of the district tournaments Coldwater drew Sturgis. After trailing through the first three periods the Cards forged ahead in the last quarter. It looked as though they had the game but then Sturgis scored on a technical foul and three long shots in a row to win with a heartbreaking 29-28. Throughout the game Coldwater couldn't get rolling. Their shots were inaccurate. After winning eleven straight and beating Sturgis twice, the law of averages seemed to have caught up with them. The boys played a good game but the odds were too great.




