

Their next brief stop was to put on the annual Junior play. They chose to present "Two Minutes To Go" which was diracted by Miss Dorothy Spencer and turned out to be a big success. A few weeks later they presented it again at Mr. Grimes' tenth Aniversary party. The last event of this trip was their Annual J-Hop and Senior Banquet. The weary travelers then departed to wait for the arrival of their last trip together.

The following fall thirty travelers gathered at September Docks, pier 1946, to wait for the boat that would take them to "Senior Glory". The Captain of this boat was Roger Collyer; Co-Captain, Wilbur Grimes; Radioman, June McDowell; and Navigator, Donald Swensen.


