

The renaissance of debating as a form of public speech in the schools of Michigan took place in 1917 when the Michigan High School Debating League was organized. Previous to 1917, however, for a generation other activities and a crowded curriculum had forced out all agencies which train students in oral expression until it seemed that pupils, like little children, were to be seen and not heard. In the past eight years there has been an increasing interest shown in the high schools of this state in public speaking until now, in the larger schools, departments of speech are being introduced. The practical value of the same needs no argument.

Union City High School entered the State High School Debating League in 1923 and in the past two years has won one-half of its debates each year. An increasing interest has been shown this year and it is hoped that the time will come when proper instruction in public speaking can be offered in Union City High School.
