

After a week of non-conference competition with Adrian, which was won by Adrian by a score of 28-12, the Cards travelled to East Lansing to a defeat of 51-0, which was the worst defeat of the season. The last game of the season was played as usual with Sturgis, which turned out to be a victory for Sturgis, after a hard fought game by both teams, by a score of 21-0. This ended the season, giving the Cards three wins and five losses for the whole year.

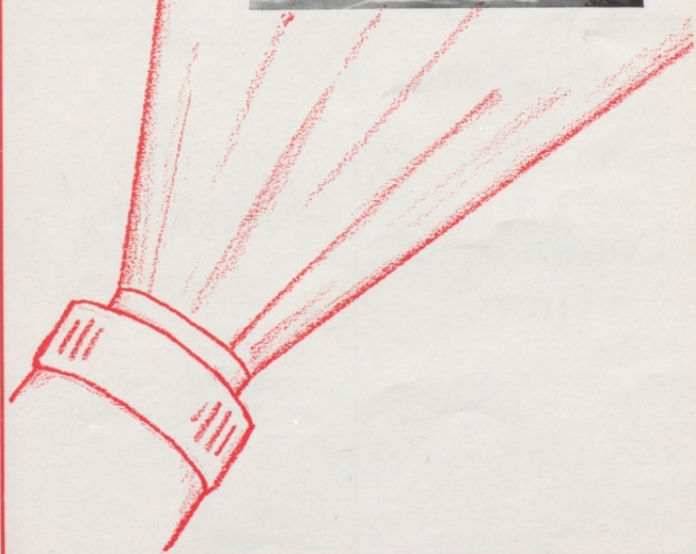

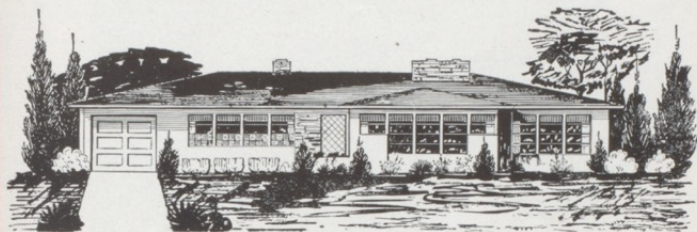
