assemblies and in the Band Follies. A Senior and Junior quartet were formed within the Chorus.

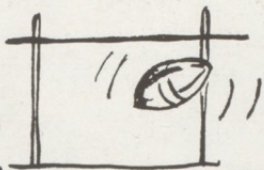

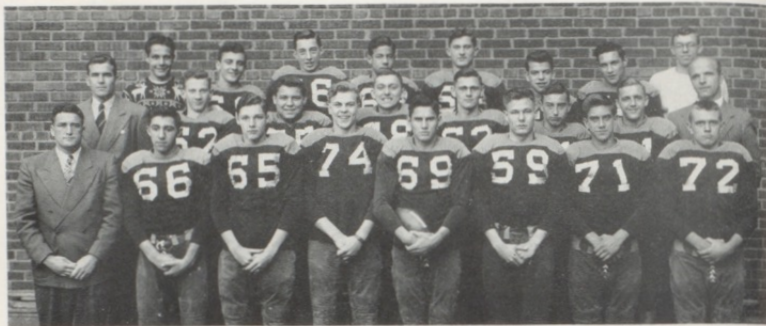

Varsity Football

Every fall the air is filled with the thud of footballs being punted and the grunts and groans of the boys who play this he-man game. There is a magic in the air during the football season that is beyond comparison. Yet, behind the glamor of the football games, there is a lot of sweat, dirty work, and sacrifice on the part of all the team members and coaches. This year's team, with only a mediocre won-and-lost record, was always in there fighting for victory and C. H. S. We're proud of our Cards.

After almost three weeks of calisthenics and scrimmage, our Cards opened the season on Sept. 19 by defeating Three Rivers 13-6 at Waterworks Park. Coldwater scored in the first five minutes of play on a long pass from Sowles to Cox, and again in the last five seconds of the first half—with the same combination clicking on another long pass. Three Rivers scored in the first quarter on a running play to complete the scoring.

The next week the Cardinals traveled to Lakeview and opened their Twin-Valley schedule with a 20-13 victory. This was a very fast game, with the outcome in doubt until the final whistle. Several Lakeview passes were knocked down or fell incomplete in the end zone in the final minute of the game.

Hillsdale came to Coldwater the following week and absorbed a 13-6 defeat. The Cardinal scoring was confined to two long touchdown runs in the first half, one by Lewis and one by Murphy. Neither team scored in the second half. But early in the fourth quarter the Hornets acquired a first down on Coldwater's one-yard line. The Cards were undaunted, however, and in four plays were in possession of the ball on the ten-yard line.

The next week Coldwater suffered its first defeat by a heart-breaking 13-12 score. Our Cards were unable to get an offensive rolling in the first half and Marshall ran up a

13-0 lead. Late in the third period Coldwater's offense started to click, and in the fourth quarter they scored two well-earned touchdowns. Both attempts for extra points failed, however, and the time ran out before they could score again.

A rapidly improving Albion team upset Coldwater the next week, 24-16. Although Coldwater outgained Albion by nearly 100 yards, they were plagued with fumbles all during the game. During the first half, Albion, playing heads-up ball and with the help of a few breaks, ran up a 19-6 half-time lead. Coldwater came back fighting in the second half but were unable to overcome the big lead built up by Albion in the first half.

On October 24 the Cards played host to a powerful Adrian team. Although scoring first on a long pass, Lewis to Tighe, Coldwater was unable to hold its lead and Adrian led 19-6 at the half. In the third quarter Adrian scored again. Coldwater scored once more in the fourth quarter on another pass to Tighe to conclude the scoring. This proved to be the only game in which Coldwater was out-gained and was their worst defeat of the season.

Playing one of their best games of the year the following week, our Cards gave the once-beaten East Lansing Trojans a very bad scare before bowing in the second half. The Cards scored in the first period on a quarterback sneak. In the second quarter they threatened to score again but were halted on the East Lansing 15-yard line by a 15-yard penalty. In the third quarter East Lansing completed a fourth down touchdown pass to tie the score 6-6. Early in the fourth quarter East Lansing gained a first down on Coldwater's 2-yard line. Our Cards rose to the occasion, and four plays later Coldwater took over on their own four-yard line. Later, after intercepting a Cardinal pass, E. L. scored on an end-around play, winning 12-6.

On November 7, Sturgis came to Coldwater for the traditional battle for the Silver Football. Sturgis kicked off to Coldwater, and after the ball changed hands twice, Murphy broke off tackle for a 35-yard touchdown. Lewis converted and Coldwater led 7-0. Coldwater scored their second touchdown on a 90-yard drive. The pass from center for the attempted conversion was high, but Sowles, playing heads-up ball,

Early in the fourth period Sturgis recovered another fumble on Coldwater's 15-yard line and quickly scored a touchdown and the extra point but the game ended Coldwater 14, Sturgis 13.

Senior right-end Jack Tighe and Junior fullback Carl Lewis were elected co-captains this year and both proved they deserved this honor by their outstanding performance on the gridiron.

The Seniors who played their last football for C. H. S. this year are as follows:

Jack Tighe won his third varsity letter in football this year at right end. His spirited play won him the respect of his opponents and his teammates who elected him honorary co-captain.

Dean Murphy played his first year of football for the Cardinals after transferring here from Elkhart, Indiana. He switched from tackle to halfback this year where he did a very fine job. He also played defensive tackle and was awarded honorable mention on the All-conference team at that position.

Jack Rowe played three years of varsity football at tackle for C. H. S. Jack was a fast man for his size and was one of the steadiest and most dependable players on the squad. His ability and spirit will certainly be missed by next year's team.

Lloyd Loose won his first varsity award this year playing regular guard. Lloyd was a very aggressive, hard-blocking man on offense and a mainstay on defense. He was troubled near the end of the season by an infection in his leg.

Willard Schlubatis was another first year man. He played offensive center and defensive guard. He saw most of his service at the defensive guard spot where his size and aggressiveness often helped to stop the opponents' offense.

Dick Moore played a lot of ball the last few games at defensive guard. He played one reserve game at the first of the year and then moved up to varsity competition. He developed rapidly and was one of the hardest charging men on the team.

Varsity Basketball

The Coldwater High School basketball team, coached by Floyd Eby, completed another excellent second straight year, also winning the District Championship which was held at Sturgis. Their record was not blemished by any conference team. They won all fourteen tilts and one non-conference game while losing their only game of the scheduled season to Angola, Indiana. They now have set a new Twin-Valley record by winning twenty-four games in a row and next year's team has a chance to extend this record even further. Only one other team in the history of the Twin-Valley has ever gone through one season undefeated by any team in the conference. This season the Cards played twenty games in which they scored 980 points to their opponents' 641. Their game average is 49 to their opponents' 32.05 points. Rex Corless, the Cards outstanding Sophomore guard, captured the Twin-Valley individual crown with 202 points in fourteen games which

gives him an average of 14.5 points per game. He was one of the members picked for the All-Conference team. Jack Tighe and Dean Murphy were made co-Captains of the All-Conference team. This year's squad consisted of two Seniors — Jack Tighe, guard; Dean Murphy, center; five Juniors—LeRoy Cox, forward; Max McConnell, guard; Eugene Sowles, forward; Harry Cooper, forward; Marvin Rosenberg, guard; three Sophomores—Rex Corless, guard; Gene Fry, center; Jim Rhodes, forward.

December 2—The Cardinals opened the season with a new non-Conference game against Eaton Rapids. They got off to a good start and did not seem to have too much trouble piling up a 50 to 19 score over Eaton Rapids.

December 5—Albion came here to open the Conference with Coldwater. The Cards jumped into the lead, scoring thirteen points

while Albion only scored one. From there on it was no job piling up a score of 48-20.

December 18—Marshall came here to play in the last game which was to be played on our own school court. The Cards controlled the ball most of the time and in doing so scored 50 points to Marshall's 32.

January 6—Coach Floyd Eby's men journeyed to East Lansing to play in what turned out to be one of the toughest games of the season. Both teams kept up the fast pace, with the Cards coming out on top, 53 to 48.

January 9—The Cards made their second long trip of the week to Adrian. The game started slow for both teams but, after the pep talk at the half, the Cards came back fast and hard, running the score to 46 to 20.

January 13—The Sturgis Trojans came here to play in one of the most exciting games of the season. This was the first game that was played on the Armory floor and the Cards had some trouble finding the basket. But after a hard-fought battle, the Cards came out on top by two points. The score was 32-30.

January 16—The last of the first round games was played here with Hillsdale. After a see-saw half, the Cards charged ahead to win 47-23.

January 30—Lakeview traveled here to play in one of the biggest battles of the year. The reason was that Coldwater was the only team to defeat Lakeview which stood in second place in the Conference. Starting fast the Cards scored twenty-three points to the Spartans' four. Coldwater slowed up a little in the second half but finished out in front, 47-21.

February 6—Coldwater went to Marshall to play the Redskins. They gave the Cards a real scare in the first half but the Cards bounced back, scoring twenty-three points in the third period and won by the score of 59-36.

February 10—The Cards played the second non-Conference game with Angola, Indiana, at Angola. The Hornets stopped a twenty-three game winning streak in a very exciting game which was a see-saw battle all the way. When the fourth quarter was over the score was knotted 51 to 51. After the overtime was out, Angola had won by two points, 56 to 54.

February 13—East Lansing came here to lose in a thriller, 47-35, in which the



Cards controlled the ball most of the time. This was the twenty-first Conference win.

February 17—Coldwater was the guest of their old rival, Sturgis. After the close game played here January 13, Coach Eby and his team were determined to trounce Sturgis by a larger margin. The Cards didn't seem to be bothered by the floor's size and to prove this they won by 49 to 30.

February 20—Adrian journeyed here to play in the last home game of the 1947-48 season. Adrian put up a good fight for the first half but soon tired with the fast pace set by the Cards who won 58-31.



February 27—The Coldwater Cardinals traveled to Hillsdale to play the last game of the 47-48 season. The Hornets almost stung the high-flying Cardinals in a very close contest. The game was a hard-fought see-saw battle every second of the game. The Hornets guarded Eby's men very closely but the Cards won their twenty-fourth consecutive Conference game by one point. The score was 48-47. The Cardinals then took the T-V title which was well earned.

March 4—Coldwater took the first hurdle in the state tourney. They played Kalamazoo State High who previously had defeated the Cards three years in a row but the Cards retaliated somewhat by beating them by twenty-four points. State High gave the Cards a tough time the first half and then they tired and the Cards breezed to a 52 to 28 victory.

March 6—Eby's men took its first District Championship since they were transferred to the Sturgis district by downing Three Rivers 63-41. The Cards jumped into an early lead and maintained it by a safe margin all through the game even though Three Rivers put up a hard fight every minute of the game.

THE REGIONAL TOURNAMENT

March 11—Coldwater journeyed to Kalamazoo College to play the South Haven "Rams" in the first regional game of the tourney. The Cards seemed to slightly tire the first quarter but came back to be out in front by ten points at the half. From there on the Cards didn't seem to be troubled by the hard-pressing Rams too much as Coldwater won 45-27.

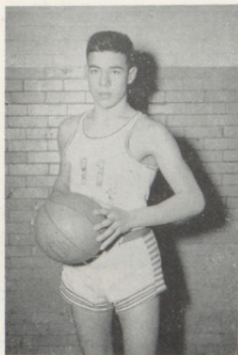

The Cards got off to a poor start while St. Joe surged ahead and after that the Cards only had the lead momentarily. In the third quarter the Cards caught up and it was a see-saw



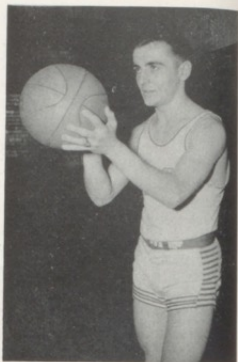

Mr. Grigg and his Future Varsity Basketball team have made a nice record for themselves in 1948.

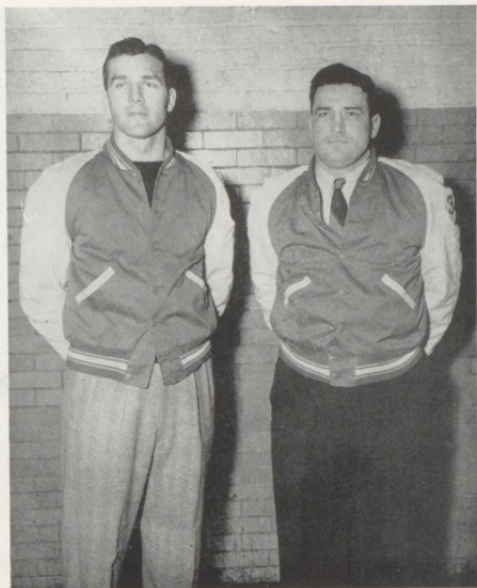

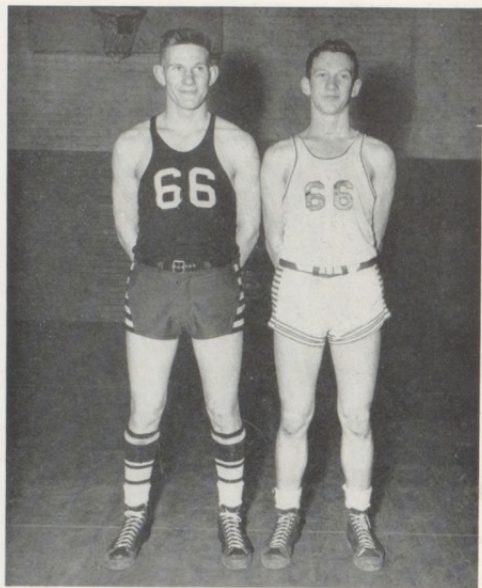
