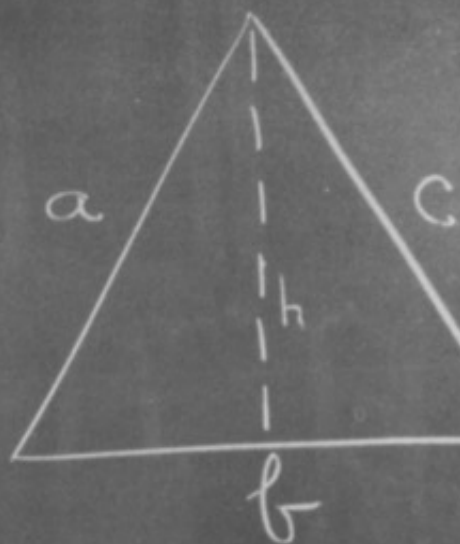
The Bronson High School principal's position was again filled by Mr. William French. He is faced with problems of students and student-teacher relationships.

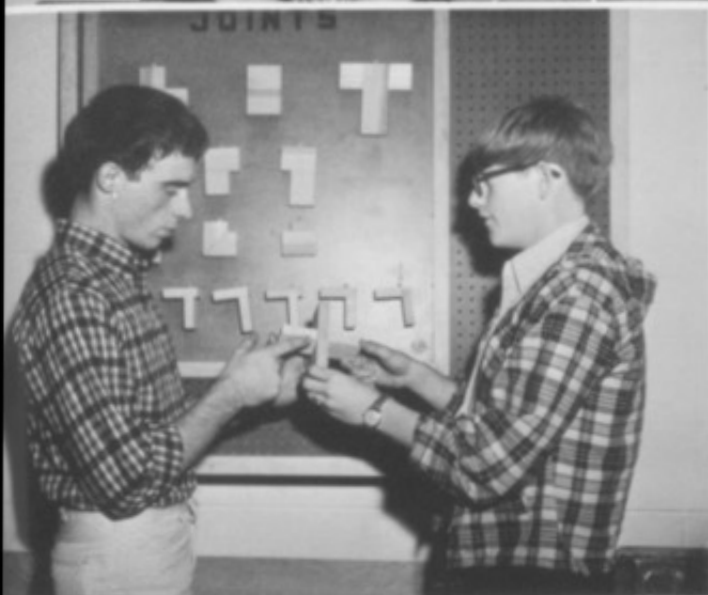
