




State of the UNION

As Union City High's doors opened to welcome students to the '87-88 school year, life appeared fairly normal — normal, in that locally, within the state, and nationally, there were, as always, both positives and negatives.

At times, when examining the "State of the Union" on any level, the problems and controversies often seem to be coming out far ahead of positive progress, and September, 1987, on the surface, might have appeared to be following that course.

High school students faced fewer class choices, larger sections, and confused schedules. In addition, a millage vote failed for the second time on the first day of school and was rescheduled for Nov. 12.

Most class problems were settled within a week, but problems which loomed, due to the millage failure remained unsettled in the fall.

Amid the problems, however, lay the positives. The football team won its opening game at home 21-6 against East Jackson. The first new Senior Band uniforms in 27 years were scheduled to arrive in October, and new English and History texts were in use.

Around the state of Michigan, ardent football fans tried to recover from the U of M's loss of its first football game of the season to Notre Dame, and still, too vivid

in the minds of state citizens, was the horror of the crash of Northwest Airlines Flight 255 on takeoff from Detroit's Metro Airport in August killing 156 people. The miracle of the crash, the second-worst aviation disaster in U.S. History, was the survival of one passenger, 4-year-old Celia Cichan.

In September, Michigan was honored when Pope John Paul II made Detroit one of his stops on his U.S. tour.


Nationally, citizens had spent many summer hours watching as Oliver North, John Poindexter, and others faced stiff congressional scrutinizing for their parts in the Iran-Contra affair.

Fall also found the nation in a mood of celebration as we honored our forefathers and that great historical document, our constitution, which was the ingenious result of their minds and their pens. Once again, we were reminded, that regardless of how unsettling and unpleasant controversy and dissent may be, always, it is also the mark that the State of the Union is healthy and that we need fear for the Union's health only when the controversies become hushed, hidden, or worse yet, simply not allowed.



Sophomores are winners


























Team Works Hard, builds for next year












