Computer literacy is another important piece offered to children. It is a vital attribute in the 21st century, especially when considering the workforce. To fill the basic need for computer knowledge, Kidsplace staff provides services to develop children's keyboarding skills and other computer familiarity. Thanks to John and the library, Kidsplace is equipped with 6 computers complete with Internet access. This gives children access to the future and the world around them. Staff in Kidsplace help families find friendly sites that will help children learn and grow at any age level.

When discussing children and libraries, it would not be complete without discussion of the most extensive children's initiative, our Summer Reading Program. It spurred them on to check out books on the subject or do research on the computers to learn more about a particular occupation.
