The exhibit consists of two panels — one displaying the three major monotheistic religions, Christianity, Judaism and Islam and the other examining the holidays celebrated by each religion.



## McLaughlin family starts fund at BCCF

COLDWATER - Knowing that there are many local needs that aren't being met, Rosella McLaughlin and her son, Dr. Jerry McLaughlin, have created a legacy fund at the Branch County Community Foundation (BC-CF) to meet those needs and to honor members of their family who have passed father and husband Ralph McLaughlin and sister and daughter Janean McLaughlin Kistel. The fund will help support local libraries, 4-H clubs and Boy Scout troops.

Knowing the family had deep roots to Branch County, they were recently approached by a BCCF Board member, and the family was eager to set up the legacy fund through the Foundation's Legacy Society. The Legacy Society recognizes individuals and couples who have notified the Foundation that they have included the Foundation as a beneficiary in their will or other deferred giving plan.

The McLaughlin's have

a strong tie to Coldwater. Ralph was born in 1914 in West Unity, Ohio, and Rosella was born in 1918 in Burr Oak, and they were married in 1937. They resided in Coldwater after marriage, and during the war owned the McLaughlin Feed Mill on Monroe Street. They both worked at the Coldwater State Home, Rosella owned a catering service, and then Ralph was a fur buyer after retirement.

The McLaughlin's had two children, four grandchildren, and seven great-grandchildren.

Ralph passed away in 2009; daughter Janean succumbed to breast cancer in 1995.

When asked why they wanted to give back to the community, Jerry commented, "Because the community supported us. During the war, the local farmers supported the feed mill business, and when dad didn't have a steady job after the war the community hospital forgave

our debts. We weren't unique though; it was a tough time then, and it's a tough time now for many organizations. The libraries, 4-H, and Boy Scouts gave us skills, educational tools, and a competitive attitude to use long after we grew up began our life's work."

In addition to creating the legacy fund, the family gave an immediate donation of \$5,000 directly to the Branch District Library through the BCCF.

"When I was a kid, I spent a lot of time reading but our family only had a couple of books, so I was at the library often. Donating to the library is just one way we can say thank you to the kind librarians who found me books to read and who encouraged my interest in science at a young age," said Jerry, whose career was spent as a professor and researcher.

The family also felt a connection with 4-H since Ralph went to Michigan State University on a 4-H

scholarship for some "short courses" in agriculture, and as a boy Jerry was a member of Boy Scout Troop 59 and moved on to become an Eagle Scout.

"These community organizations helped shape who I am and how our family was able to grow and thrive in this competitive world."

As many know, the Branch District Library and branches recently put out a statement saying decreasing millage funds, penal fine funds from the courts, and the poor economy in general make "the immediate future admittedly a bit bleak. We've made some very painful cuts which we hope are temporary, but honestly we just don't know what the future holds."

Donations like the McLaughlin's will help support the local libraries during this tough financial time, and the McLaughlin's hope that other local families will be encouraged to contribute through the BCCF.

## Addition to Bronson library should be ready by mid-March

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The library in Bronson is in a century old Carnegie building.

Several years ago, the Friends of the Library, the Dearth Foundation and the community built a handicap accessible entrance, said Lynnell Eash, librarian.

This month Brussee/Brady, Inc. of Three Rivers is completing a media center, a \$250,000 addition, made possible through the same three groups, she said.

A 25 foot x 25 foot media center and a 7 foot x 18 foot office space, was built on the same level of the library. On the ground level (or slighty below) the same size rooms are being finished — one for library storage and the other for storage for the Bronson Township.

The ownership of the community building is a little confusing, Eash said.

A 1940s court agreement gives ownership of the building to Bronson Township, she said. The township and City of Bronson care for the building and grounds. The township has an agreement with the

Branch District Library to house the Bronson Branch on the second floor. The county library system also owns the books, equipment, furniture and pays staff.

The new additions are paid for by generosity of the community, including a sizable portion from the Dearth Foundation.

The media center will

be ready for patrons by mid March, Eash said.

While the added space is important for patrons, keeping the historicity of building in tact is also important to Eash.

Brussee/Brady restored windows, replicated the wood work and generally were careful to keep his-

torical features true to the

period, she said.
