

Author Beverly Haskins Reyner will be at the Coldwater branch of the Branch District Library on August 20 from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. to discuss and sign copies of her book titled, "Memoirs of a Country Schoolteacher".

Reyner currently lives in Michigan but has lived in other parts of the country throughout her life as a dedicated teacher to youth and adult aged students.

After studying social work for two-and-half years at Calvin College she

found herself teaching in a little one-room school house in Alcona County Michigan. "I was completely unprepared for teaching. The county superintendent came to the college and said the school would close unless they found teachers. I considered it and they presented the contract and I signed it," said Reyner.

Before she new it the 20 year old city girl was living in the country, of which she knew nothing about.

"I learned a lot from the students—they taught me too," said Reyner.

Reyner experienced a great deal about life, teaching and country living during the two years she taught at the country school.

She taught school aged

students in grades kindergarten through eight grade, totaling 25 students.

Through the years she had told many people about her time as a country school teacher and she was encouraged to turn her stories into a book.

It took her two years to write the book and upon publishing it, she sold 50 copies in two weeks.

Reyner will be attending a reunion in August with the students she first taught so many years ago.

"I'm really looking forward to seeing them again," she said.

Reyner continued teaching over the next 24 years at various locations including a drug rehabilitation center, adult education and Hurley Medical Center. She obtained her Masters Degree at the University of Michigan.

"I knew what I learned in the country school could apply to my teaching in other schools," said Reyner.

She moved to Quincy in 2007. "I very much like it here. It feels comfortable and it's a beautiful area," she said.

Her book can be purchased online or at a local bookstore. Copies will also be available for purchase at the Library during the book signing.
