

COLDWATER - The public is invited to join representatives from the Coldwater branch of the Branch District Library and the Arab American National Museum (AANM) of Dearborn for a festive event to celebrate neighbors whose culture includes the Muslim faith tradition and those with family ties to Yemen, one of the 22 nations of the Arab World.

The free even begins at 1 p.m. Saturday with a presentation of new books and art. Guests will learn about the new titles from the Bridging Cultures Bookshelf: Muslim Journeys program, children's and young adult books on Arab American themes donated by the museum and the AANM's



SURA award-winning student photography program and exhibit, which will be on display through December.

The photography on display was done by Ar-American middle school students in Dearborn and Detroit. The AANM is also donating books to the Coldwater library.

"It's a way to continue to do outreach. We are the only museum of its

kind in the country. Our is one of 953 libraries and mission is to bring people together from all different cultures and provide a better understanding of the great diversity that is the United States of America," said Linsday Robillard, spokesperson from the Arab American National Museum. "It's a way to introduce ourselves to the community as a useful resource."

From 1:15 to 2 p.m. guests will enjoy complirefreshments mentary as performers demonstrate a traditional Yemeni dance. Guests can also have their hands decorated with elaborate, allnatural henna designs.

Starting at 2 p.m. a video screening of "Yemeni Voices in America: Dr. Rashid Abdu" will be showing.
