



You've been my pride and interest all Summer long,


I often ask myself what I'll do when you are gone. A killing frost is coming to take your life away,

BRANCH DISTRICT LIBRARY Another fix for roof leaks

COLDWATER — The Branch District Library may have finally figured out what is causing all the water damage to the inside of its Coldwater main library building, but it will cost \$48,000 to fix.

The Coldwater City Council agreed to pay the amount over the \$25,000 the library board approved for the fix when it awarded a contract to Hoekstra Roofing Monday night to install new gutters.

The city owns the building and leases it to the library on a longterm lease, which is up for renewal next year. The library has fixed its roof three times and reworked its HVAC system to try to stem the water damage. It didn't work.

City manager Jeff Budd the problem is "an

internal gutter system. You don't see the gutters until you see the down spout."

The stainless steel gutter system "has basically rotted out," he said.

The new gutter system will be 113 feet of copper, with some shingles pulled back and the flashing put underneath.

"At least we will know the water will be going into the gutter system," Budd promised. "The copper gutter is very expensive but it should last for 100 years."

The 25-year lease agreement calls for the library district to pay all interior and exterior repairs, which it has done.

"It is my opinion the

city needs to provide a one-time assistance with this repair to continue to maintain the structural integrity of the building," Budd said. "I am not sure the library could afford to make all the repairs."

The building will deteriorate more without the work. Budd also said

city staff will take a day and go over to work on the century-old building foundation on the main structure to help stabilize it.

Mayor Tom Kramer called the library "a keystone of our downtown." Its silhouette appears on the city seal.
