The participants were provided with a variety of colorful tapes to make a bookmark, a bracelet, and their choice of a purse, wallet or pouch.

The supplies also featured printed tapes for the children to experiment with.

Tacey taught them to make a base for each of the projects and shared sample ideas while encouraging creativity. Some of his examples featured Pac-Man, a rainbow with clouds, and a pencil. Several were made by patrons for him.

While working with the young people, Tacey modeled his own Duct Tape vest that he created with silver and red tape.

Comedian shares magical show

BRONSON — Joel Tacey, Michigan's Family Funnyman, made an appearance at the Bronson Branch of the Branch District Library as he shared his Page Racer Magical Comedy Show on July 7. It was held in conjunction with the summer reading program which is focused on fitness.

Tacey opened the show with a clap meter, demonstrating how it worked and encouraging the children to clap loudly. He separated the group into boys and girls and then had them clap together. The clapping was so loud that it "blew out" the meter.

He explained that during the show he was going to bring to life seven different stories celebrating active living. With each book, the audience was encouraged to be interactive and play. Tacey shared the related activities with the group and made note that the participants could borrow the books from their library.

The first story was "The Tortoise and the Hare", a well-known fable. Tacey told the story in cards, with the tortoise magically appearing at the finish line. Next was the part cookbook/part dinosaur adventure story, "Eat Like a Dinosaur", which promoted healthy snacks. He invited five children to the front of the room to play 'Dinosaur Mask Matchup.' Even though he was behind the children and couldn't

see the masks they had, he correctly matched the mask he had with the mask they were holding.

The "5 Minute Brain Workout for Kids" promoted activities that made the children think with word and number problems. Tacey told the crowd that he was able to read the attendee's minds and demonstrated with some funny cards that did seem to support his claim. A laser game and a magic trick with large cards got the children excited about the book "Bearobics."

Magic tricks were the focus with the "Extreme Sports" book. Tacey encouraged safety as the children looked to playing games this summer and trying some sports. "The Racecar Alphabet" was enjoyed as he did a magic trick involving the cutting of a ribbon and the whole ribbon emerging at the end of the presentation.

The final book was "Monsters Don't Eat Broccoli" and Tacey created a monster on a board to tell a story. Since he drew it with a Magic Marker, the monster began to talk and told jokes. He was introduced as Murray and assisted Tacey with his show.

To wrap up the program, Tacey turned up the music and encouraged the children to dance, read, and enjoy themselves this summer.

The Bronson Branch Library will be having a music program at 10 a.m. today.

BRONSON — The Bronson Branch of the Branch District Library sponsored "Shake, Rattle and Roll", an interactive musical show where dancing, clapping, twisting and rocking were expected. Jeff Rutter, a repeat performer at Bronson, played the guitar and sang favorite songs.

Rutter, a guitarist and singer since he was ten years of age, began the show with a rendition of "Brown-Eyed Girl", encouraging the participants to sing along. He

followed that up with "If You're Happy and You Know It" where the children stomped their feet, clapped their hands, and hugged their neighbors.

Elvis seemed to be in the building as "Can't Help Falling in Love" was played and many of the adults sang along. "I'm a Believer" was another sing along involving the children as well. The participants danced during the playing of "Stayin' Alive" and it was surprising that a disco ball didn't appear.

Some easily recognized tunes were played as Rutter strummed out "Santa Claus Is Coming to Town", "This Old Man", "The Chicken Dance", the National Anthem, and "Jingle Bells."

"Smokey Robinson wrote 'My Girl'," Rutter said, in reference to the next song. "But did you know that he also wrote 'My Guy'?"

The next number got the crowd excited as "Sweet Home Alabama" sounded throughout the library. More dancing was required as "Twist and Shout" was played, requiring the attendees to move to the music. Three

young men made their way to the front of the group to help recreate an Elvis concert with "Hound Dog." After that, three girls were chosen to lead the crowd in doing the "Twist" and they brought up some adults to dance along.

The last song had arm motions and movement as "YMCA" was played and the Branch Manager Lynnell Eash led as the program wrapped up.

The next program is StarLab at 1 p.m. on July 26 at the Bronson Theater. The activity is open to all
