## **Bronson Report**

The past month we have been working on coming up with ideas to promote and display our books more. We have some great ideas for the children's section but then decided our next problem is the kids aren't coming into the library as much during the school year. I contacted the principals at Ryan and Anderson Elementary Schools and asked if there was a way I could talk to the teachers to let them know about all the wonderful children's books we have sitting on our shelves.

Mr. Heifner sent out an email to his teachers and I had two teachers contact me. After a phone call and discussion regarding what books their students would be interested in and how many books they would like to borrow for their classrooms, arrangements were made and sixty-five books were out the door for the next month.

I asked Mr. Heifner if there was a bulletin board or showcase in the school where we could setup a display of books from our library and he had a bulletin board

showcase right next to the lunch room so that every child in the school would be walking by there at least once a day. I was able to put in a neat display of junior graphic novels and got lots of comments from the kids as I was working on it. A sign went in the case letting them know those books would be back in the library on February 22 for check out.

Mrs. McCrea invited me to come and speak at the next staff meeting on February 13 at Anderson. I will take a couple boxes of K-2 books along and see if any of the teachers would like to borrow for their classrooms also.

I will be contacting St. Mary's yet to see if we might work something out with them in the near future.

I spoke at the First Congregational Woman's Fellowship last week. It had been a couple years since I had been there and they just wanted an update on what was happening at the library in Bronson and also in the District.

Krystal Loughman has been hired as our second public services clerk. She will be starting her 21 hours on February 21. Looking forward to Krystal joining us. This will give us the opportunity to expand the after-school programs finally.

Saturday, February 4, we celebrated *Take Your Child to The Library Day*. Linda, Kimberly, Jessica and Pat came to help us and our Friends and volunteers were there too.

We had a giant T-Rex (Jessica Tefft) and then Clifford the Big Red Dog (Avery) walking through the library visiting with children and providing great photo opportunities.

Stan the Dinosaur Man was there with a fantastic display of dinosaurs and he was able to have fun discussions with kids of all ages about anything and everything regarding dinosaurs.

Hugh worked the dino coloring page table and watched over the Lego display that Elijah had created. (Elijah attends our Tween/Teen program) I told everyone you can tell how great a display is by how many fingerprints are on the glass by the end and boy were those showcases in need of a cleaning!

Kimberly was setup in the Media Center with a display of BDL materials and was ready with a multimedia Hoopla presentation.

Julia B demonstrated spinning with drop spindles, showing different fibers and products made from those fibers. Margaret and Julia both were spinning, crocheting and answering questions the entire time.

At the Lego, dinosaur and spinning tables we had books set out to further interest people on those subjects.

Fran and Linda greeted everyone coming in, handing out "I Love My Library" book bags, a schedule of events for the morning and directing them to the free books provided by Scholastic books. (each child got to pick one free book to take home) Fran worked the refreshment table serving cookies, crackers and water.

Downstairs Julie H. helped children make crafts at the duct tape table or directed them to the mural coloring table.

There was also the popular Lego cart and wall for kids to try and it was a major hit.

Steve Watson provided storytelling and his son Miles demonstrated scarves and beanbag juggling.

The Wii was setup for anyone wanting to play and a few gave Library Bingo a try. Kids and adults could enter door prize drawings for a small bike, duct tape kit, Lego starter kit, can of dinosaurs, youth coloring book, teen coloring book, denim comforter, crochet lap blanket, or a crochet lap throw.

Rosalie was there taking pictures of anyone who wanted to stand next to T-Rex or Clifford. She also covered the event for the Daily Reporter, Bronson Journal and Sturgis Journal.

Pat K came to work the desk so that Steve and I could be part of the program. I just pretty much ran around like a chicken with its head cut off. The day was a success!

Tween & Teen Club met and Steve presented a few classic animal stories. Misty of Chincoteague and Big Red, Rascal and Where the Red Fern Grows. These were books that hadn't been checked out lately so he wanted to present them to a new audience. As usual, along with a book discussion they got a pizza snack!

One of our teens is a champion Lego builder so we asked him to come to **the Kidz Crew** and show them how to build vehicles. We had fun (yes I did too) creating funtastic autos to race down a cardboard race track and then compete to see who could get theirs to land closest to a certain mark on the floor. Not to brag but I landed square on, boy were they impressed!

We had a second teen come to the next program and show us how to fold paper cranes after we talked about the book," **Sadako and the Thousand Paper Cranes**".

Our Home School program began 4 weeks ago and each week more families have come. We have had fourteen different children attend with 10 being the most present at one time. These children range from 4-14 so Steve has a variety of activities for them to do.

The first week they were given a string, a pencil and a square of paper and asked to create something. They have done drawing, water coloring, played with Legos and worked the marble run. During March is Reading Month Steve will be focusing on storytelling and puppetry.

BDL Teen Services Librarian, Jessica Tefft, brought the Anti-Valentine Scavenger Hunt over to us and the teens have had a blast searching the library to find the hidden cards. It has been fun to watch them work together with others they are meeting for the first time to find all 18 cards.

We feel that all the programs this month have been very successful and worthwhile. We have added new patrons, new Hoopla and Evergreen fans and brought life back to some books that have not seen the outside world for quite a while. Now, on to the next month!



# **Board Report February 2017**

Since hiring on January 17, I've been busy cultivating relationships with both teens and coworkers, planning programs, and meeting community members. I have created a Youth Advisory Council (YAC) and enticed 6 teens to join. Together with YAC, I spent 10 hours compiling a grant proposal from the Branch County Community Foundation that required teen participation in order to qualify. I've also presented to the Kiwanis club and am hopeful for that partnership. I've visited most branches twice and have had the opportunity to sit down with each of the branch managers. I also had the chance to work on developing the Young Adult book collection, ordering and weeding accordingly.

In January, I held a Grant Writing workshop in Coldwater and had 10 teens show up. Thus far in February, I've planned 2 passive programs for Coldwater and total teen attendance is at 71. That is up significantly from last month, and we're only halfway through February. I've also implemented a monthly passive program for teens for the other five branches.

The passive program for February was a LOVE STINKS! Scavenger hunt. It seems to be a big hit!



Judy was able to work some magic and Union City High School allowed me to come in and speak with their Interact club. I feel encouraged about the impact that we can have there. The teens were more than receptive to talking about library programs, what they'd like to see at the Union branch, how Summer Reading works, etc. Perhaps the most disheartening aspect to the visit was their shock at the programs that are offered at the library. They had no idea that the Summer Reading Club even existed.

I am also going to be in the English classes at Quincy High School on March 6-9. Bronson and Coldwater high schools have been unresponsive thus far, but I've no doubt that I'll be in there shortly.
