Fall always seems to appear out of nowhere and activities keep us busy that the last few months of the year just fly by. One of the favorites at the Coldwater Branch is Halloween. - A very special event last month was the "Celebration of Literacy" night. This
 was a joint effort between the Coldwater Friends of the Branch District
 Library and the Branch County Literacy Council. Both organizations were

 Branch. A popular stop on the tour was the Teen Space. Several comments
 from the public appreciated the library giving Teens a space to call their

Adults:

• It has been a whirlwind of programs for Adults at the Coldwater Branch the last month. Patrons seem to be fond of craft and music programs. Both types were well represented in the last month and registration filled up quickly for these popular programs! Programs for the month included: Visit with Teddy Roosevelt, Pumpkin Floral Arrangement, Wine Cork Pumpkin, Singing the Good Old Songs Again, Lewis and Clark & the Michigan Connection, Bataan Death March Survivor, and the Native American Flute.

Kids' Place:

- Lots of activity could be found over the past month in Kids' Place. Young
 patrons decorated over 4 dozen pumpkins! Tweens participated in a special
 Saturday event and created glow in the dark jars. Our home school group
 continued to explore Native American history through student presentations,
 food, music, art, games and crafts. Saturday events were well attended and
 included some of the following: Creatures from the Crypt, Traveling Tales:
 Kenya & Winter Bird Feeders with Mr. Gene (built actual feeders).
- Our October "Tales from the Crypt" Reading Incentive had an enrollment of 94 children ages 2-12 yrs with 50 of the participants turning in their reading logs. It was interesting that we had several family groups win at the various levels. Each winner received a \$25 Amazon gift certificate with the family winners receiving \$50. All level readers read a minimum of 125% over our required numbers!
