A highlight this last month was our Traveling Tales Program to Holland. A huge shout-out of thanks for the local Kiwanis Club and Johanna Hordik for helping us provide the children with a taste of the Netherlands on Saturday, May 5. She and Robyn Owens of Coldwater provided some Dutch treats for tasting, including black licorice, hagelslag or bread and butter with chocolate sprinkles and milk, and Gouda cheese. The winner of the Holland Michigan Windmill Village packet was Madilynn Persails of Coldwater. She received a pass for 4 adults and 4 children that was donated from the Holland Area Visitors Bureau. Kids Place hosted 3 events as a part of Money Smart Week. Held for a week in April, Kids' Place partnered with a local credit union, Honor Credit Union. Tweens learned about Coin Collecting from Eric Richards and then used coins to make batteries and other coin related experiments. There was also a preschool money themed story time. All story time attendees, and families throughout the month, received a free book, "Lots and Lots of Coins", by Margaret Reed, along with a Honor bag.

Wrapping up this week is the Homeschool Adventures for the school year. They have explored the culture, history, art and food of the nation's Native American tribes. During the year, many great projects and presentations occurred and most important learning and fun coincided.

Wow! We are coming up on the one-year anniversary of the Teen Space being moved to the basement in the Coldwater Branch. Reflecting upon this, I am proud

The space has been so well used that additional staff have been hired to keep it staffed during open hours. With the Summer and the end of school fast approaching, new Teen Programs are being rolled out. The calendar includes a Craft and How-To Series. BDL and teens will be taking over the courthouse parking lot to throw a Summer bash and only 80 teens from across the district will get to join in the fun!
