Thank goodness for the automatic date fill-in feature in Word because I keep writing 2018! It's a brand new year and it's been full so far.


- I've created a Marketing Team to oversee all publicity for BDL. The Team consists of Kimberly Feltner, Director of Public Services; Angie Clark, IT Assistant; and Keeley Briggs, Teen Services Clerk. Chances are if you have seen a flyer or Facebook post, you have seen Angie's and Keeley's artistic talents. The advantage for Branch Managers and others who plan programs is that they can ask the Marketing Team to help by sending them the pertinent information about an event and the Team will create not only a creative, eye-catching flyer but also post the information on FB and put it on the digital signs. If you have been in one of the branches, you have seen the screen with our events scrolling through. The Team is taking over the posting of FB items so that all publicity is uniform in information (times, dates, locations, registration information, BDL logo). Currently, the places to look for information about events is the calendar on the website or at the front desks, the digital sign, flyers, website scrolls, and Facebook.
- Planning for the Summer Reading Program (SRP)has begun in earnest. The theme is "A Universe of Stories" and will run from June 3rd to July 26th. We will have programs for children, teens, and adults. *There are cool t-shirts to wear and if you would like to order one, let me know (pictures on second page)*. The benefits of Summer Reading Programs are great and as an advocate for the library, you will need to tell people about those benefits. I'm listing a few for you and remember that early readers, like babies, benefit from SRPs:
 - Young children gain self-confidence and a love for reading, books, and the library
 - The library may become a community destination for more families during the summer
 - Children are motivated to read, especially when the whole family participates. Children learn by example, so let your kids see you reading!
 - Children develop positive attitudes about reading, books, and the library.
 - Children maintain their reading skills during summer vacation. Reading for pleasure is so fun!
 - Many teenagers find enjoyment in reading (did you know that teens prefer print books to online books?)
 - Having high levels of literacy are needed for higher education and **future employment** (very important for a vibrant, successful community).
 - Most standardized tests that teenagers will take include a reading comprehension portion.

• Children in Michigan must be able to read at grade level by the 3rd grade and reading for pleasure is a great way to help with this.
