January 2nd was the beginning of our district wide "Teen Reading Challenge." A Sherwood patron (Michelle), won the Kindle prize and was happy beyond words! (Pic included).

We've implemented a new program that we are hoping will help encourage our younger patrons to be more "Money Smart." This is a program where kids (between the ages of 3-18), are able to earn "Library Loot." There are several ways in which to earn loot:

- 1. Check out five books; \$1.00
- 2. Attending programs; \$1.00
- 3. Bring report cards in and share them with us; \$1.00
- 4. Encouraging and promoting positivity; \$1.00
- 5. Bringing friends to the library; \$1.00
- 6. After-school homework, 1/2 minimum; \$1.00

The kids each have their own envelope here to save their loot in until it's time to spend it. The first day of "Library Shopping" will be February 26th. We are encouraging them to save their loot so that they will be able to buy the bigger things, and while doing this, we hope to help teach them the value of money or even, (fake money), in this case. But nevertheless, we're

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hoping to play a small role in teaching them to be responsible and the types of behaviors necessary to earn these rewards. The items for sale are simply random things that we have purchased from the "Dollar Store." Thus far it's going great and the kids are very excited about this adventure.

Our juvenile and teen program attendance has been steady. For the Sherwood programs, we did "Sand art in a bottle", "Hats off to you", and "Glass bead sun-catchers." On top of 'our' programs, we also have the Coldwater Teen Service staff ladies who venture over every month to host our "District Wide Teen Programs."
