Coldwater

One Book One County: The Coldwater Branch wrapped up the county wide book talk with two great book discussions. First up was a Saturday talk lead by the Coldwater Friends of the Branch District Library president, Jeanne Berg. She did an amazing job not only leading a lively discussion but with decoration including green glowing light and jars of "radium paint" and paintbrushes. Shockingly no one wanted to participate in "Lip, Dip, Paint". Also on display, were copies of primary source materials that were collected by BDL staff member Keeley Briggs, who spent countless time contacting other libraries and tracking down materials from MeL to highlight the media sensation the Radium Girls produced. For the first time, we also offered a night book discussion, which I was able to facilitate to a smaller but no less lively group!

Adult Programs: At the beginning of the month our Coldwater Adult Programmer retired. She had been in the position for many years. She created a balance of craft and educational programs that the public received very well. She left us with several great programs scheduled for the rest of the 2019 and we are excited to evaluate and try some new adult programs that are showing great promise at other public libraries.

- Poetry Month and Contest: April is Poetry Month and an annual event is the Adult Poetry Contest. Aspiring poets (ages 18 and up) can submit an original poem and have it displayed at the library. Poems will be judged on by a panel of library staff and cash prizes will be awarded to the first and second place winner. This year is off to a great start with 12 entries. The poems are on display on the first floor in combination with several works of poetry and poetry how to books.
- Seed Saved Exchange Update: Donations still are arriving from the community and there is a
 healthy supply of seeds still available for people to start their gardens. The donated seed
 starting greenhouses have all been handed out and we again thank Biz-Aid Recycling for
 thinking of the library!
- Coming up is an author visit on Tuesday April 18 at 6:30pm. Susan Betz, master gardener, will have her book Neighboring with Nature: Native Herd for Pleasure & Purpose. The Morrison Financial Group will be back to repeat a Social Security and Medicare Workshop on April 25 and May 9. Also, from the comments received from patrons who are jealous of the Teens having all the fun, our first ever adult Pokemon table-top adventure will be held on April 30. Kids' Place:

 April blew in like a lion with Spring Break. Busy doesn't begin to describe the atmosphere in Kids'. With daily programs, we were kept hopping. The **Bunny Peep Cottages** (think gingerbread house only using graham crackers) were a total blast. We also made Bird feeders and had fun with a spring themed storytime. And while we had a great turn-out for the Red Cross Pillowcase Project, the Red Cross didn't show up! Staff improvised and our patrons seemed content. And let us not forget the great April Fool jokes that our young patrons shared!



- Our Money Smart program, "Library Loot" is popular with our young patron earning redeemable "loot" for attending programs, checking out materials, writing/drawing book reports and poems! The Earned It Store will open for business on Saturday, April 27 with all the loot to be redeemed by Saturday, May 4. The Honor Credit Union will be here for a special story-time using this year's give away book, "Earn It" by Cinders McLeod. This program is made possible through the Michigan Credit Union Foundation.
- We finished the Reading Incentive with a total enrollment of 102. Of these, only 44 turned in their completed logs to receive the prizes. The weekly scavenger hunts had a total participation of 85. We had four winners of \$25 Amazon gift cards drawn at random from completing the scavenger hunts. It was fun watching the children and parents working together to complete the weekly hunt. We plan to repeat something similar in May.
- Linda Dull did a total of 4 off-site preschool story-times and 3 in-house preschool visits as part of the March is Reading month. We gave copies of the Michigan Reads book "Touch the Brightest Star" provided by the Michigan State Library to each of the preschools. It was a great segue into promoting our Summer Reading!
- BDL staff member, Angela Richards, had as much fun as our youth during the "Gadget Busters" program. We plan to continue hosting this program throughout the year. It is so much fun watching and helping the youth dismantle the gadgets we provide. Think "I didn't know that's what's in there!" So if you have any small appliances that refuse to work, please remember we'd be happy to take them as long as they can be taken apart.

• And let's not leave out our super popular marshmallow catapult coordinated by BDL staff member LuAnn Watson. We're still finding marshmallows in the strangest places! I do think staff enjoyed "testing" this program as much as the library users who actually participated. This is defiantly another program we plan to repeat.

- We're excited to have the Branch County Community Theatre provide free tickets to their May production of "Mary Poppins". Ashley will be holding drawings for these at several of our Thursday pm events which tie in with Mary Poppins!
- We're also finalizing plans for our Kids' Place version of the NetFlix program, "Nailed It!". We'll be unveiling our version on Saturday, May 11 with the help of Larisa Vorce, Laurie VanDosen and the Coldwater Library Friends. We hope to hold a Friends fundraiser using this competition on Saturday, June 22.
- Summer Reading is just around the bend. Staff are happy to report that we're looking good for programs and sponsors! Linda and other staff have been working very hard to get all the details completed for the almost 9 weeks of programming that is planned!

Teen Services:

- March ended with the month of Harry Potter, from the Wand Making, Herbology (Seed Bombs), Harry Potter trivia, and kicked off Spring Break with the 24-hour movie marathon. The Teen Services Department did a great job coordinating the event and it ran so smooth. A huge thank you to the many staff who gave up their sleep to provide the needed supervision and constant restocking of snacks. I really enjoyed listening to the Teens talk and just be super excited about the library and Harry Potter. What was really great was that this event brought in a lot of new faces including Teens from Union City!
- During the month of April there is a display in Teen Space for Poetry Month. The Young Adult collection includes several great titles for the month all available for checkout.
- Upcoming programs for the month include Blackout Poetry, Dungeons and Dragons, Are you Smarter than a Librarian, and Custom Buttons.
- Met with the Teen Services Department to talk programming during the Summer. A lot of great ideas were presented, it will be hard for them to figure out what ones to pick!

March turned out to be a very busy month. Camri visited both the high school and middle school during their lunch hours to promote March is Reading month and the programs being held during the month for teens. Traci and I were available during the Elementary Showcase and we saw talked to over 250 parents and children. We had a raffle for the kids for 2 books and had 73 children sign up. I am very happy that we were able to participate with the schools.

Chip Chioda from *GreenSide Up Consulting* presented a program on landscaping and how to take care of our landscaping now that spring is here. He plans on returning each season to explain what needs to be done with our landscaping for that season.

I had five programs at the schools for the Ready to Read Michigan program. Over 100 students were able to hear the book Touch the Brightest Star by Christie Matheson and color a picture to go along with the book.

I also participated the 7th annual United We Read Program which is a program by Branch County United Way. Volunteers were able to read in classrooms across the county. Mrs. Sherwood's 2nd class was the lucky class I was chosen to read to. The kids were super and enjoyed the book.

As part of a Community Action program for seniors we had 2 days in which seniors came to the library to sign up for senior meal vouchers. The vouchers allow the seniors to go to specific restaurants and receive a breakfast, lunch, or dinner at the establishments. At this point only, the Broadway Grille is the restaurant in town that accepts the vouchers. Also, during the program, I have talked to the people who came in and am happy to report that I had 2 new patrons sign up for a library card. Our book discussion on Radium Girls only had 2 people attend but it was a good discussion. Eighteen adults completed our Spring into Reading program and each adult received a little notebook for completing the program.

I listened to a webinar on A Universe of Stories that pertained to the summer reading program this year.
