- Goal to increase circulation: After attending the March meeting highlighting statistics from BDL, the Coldwater Branch has made a concentered effort to take all opportunities to highlight the collection to our patrons. Adult Programs:

- We introduced a new recurring program titled "Pokemon Role Playing Game". We often

 grownup version. We had a small but passionate group that will be playing monthly. New
 people can join at any time.
- The Morrison Financial Group was back with two very popular presentations about Social Security and Medicare.

Community Action was at Coldwater and handed out vouchers for seniors, age 60 and older, for the Senior Restaurant Meal Voucher Program.

We also hosted staff from Census 2020, who set up on the first floor. Information about the new census process and how to apply for jobs was available. Several people took advantage of the public computers and applied on the spot with help from the Census representative. We will have them back several more times over the Summer to help keep spreading the word.
