<u>Coldwater</u>

The city of Coldwater rung in autumn with its annual Apple Fest on Saturday, September 21st. The Coldwater Friends of the Branch District Library capitalized on the event with their large book sale and "Chair-ity Etc." auction. All objects up for auction were painted and donated by local artists, and the auction and book sale brought in \$905 and \$331 respectively. The day was also unusually busy for the library. Kids' Place hosted Johnny "Appleseed" Chapman, who entertained attendees with his stories and humor as well as six different apple-themed crafts. Children also enjoyed fresh apples and were encouraged to save the seeds to plant when spring comes.

Like other BDL branches, we're making an ongoing effort to improve the collections we offer here at Coldwater and make them easier to use. We have deployed "pathfinder" signs around our adult, juvenile, and young adult fiction sections. These pathfinders, based on research conducted by our circulation staff using MeL databases and other resources, are a passive way to help patrons discover new authors. While our staff is always ready and willing to perform readers advisory and make recommendations, these small signs are placed to casually catch patrons' attention and direct them to authors similar to those they already enjoy. We are also very excited to share that we will soon be circulating "Binge Boxes," combo packs of DVDs that include four to six movies that share a theme, genre, or actor.

Coldwater programming for adults is now in full swing. Local artist/public service clerk Ben Lyon shared his artistic talent with patrons at two art tutorial programs. In September, he taught patrons to create galaxy art with spray paint, and in October, he led a group making Halloween-themed

tissue paper banners. We also hosted an informational session about home loans available through the USDA. This program is tailored to people living in rural areas (like Branch County!) and creates a path to homeownership for those who may be unable to buy a house with a traditional loan.

On Saturday, October 12th, frequent library guests Omni Paranormal Services will be leading patrons on a paranormal investigation of the Coldwater Branch Library. The following week, staff member Cheryl Graham-Machida will be sharing Japanese culture at her program celebrating Jugoya, the festival of the harvest moon, which was rescheduled from September. At the end of the month, expert otaku/public service clerk Cheryl Lawrence is starting a series of a Pokemon-themed tabletop roleplaying sessions for adults. In the past, Coldwater has had success with tabletop roleplaying games for both teens and adults, and several of our loyal patrons have looked forward to the return of Cheryl's Pokemon RPG for months now. RPGs encourage creativity and group storytelling and have great potential for patrons of all ages.

This November, we're having our first meeting of the Quiet Cocoa Club, a mostly-silent readingthemed meetup inspired by "Silent Book Club" programs held by other libraries. In addition, we will host Kim Osterholzer, author of A Midwife in Amish Country. We have also started promoting our newest book club, the Looking Forward Book Club, a discussion group concerned with current social issues. The first meeting of the Looking Forward Book Club is scheduled for January 2020 and will be a conversation about Born a Crime by Trevor Noah.

Teens of Coldwater had fun at the district-wide programs put on by Teen Services Coordinator Lindsay Villa. In addition to the ever-popular Anime Club, Lindsay and the teens celebrated Hispanic Heritage Month by creating papel picado, decorations cut from colorful tissue paper commonly hung during celebrations and holidays in Mexico. Coldwater teens will continue with this theme during October by creating ofendas, a traditional collection of objects displayed during the celebration of Día de Muertos honoring a loved one who has died.

Kids' Place Coordinator Linda Dull and the staff in Kids' Place have been busy enough with their daily regular programming for our littlest patrons. On top of that, Coldwater is hosting a spooky October Reading Challenge for children 12 and under. 46 children have already signed up for the program! Children who complete their reading bingo cards will be entered into a drawing to win a \$20 Amazon card. As a bonus, the top readers in each age group win another exciting prize! The child aged 3 to 12 who reads the most will win a \$30 Amazon card, and the winner of the 2 and younger category will receive a "Read" bib or t-shirt! Classroom Critters with Mr. Paul was wildly successful on Saturday, October 5th. Children and adults in attendance got up close and personal with an assortment of live creatures, including snakes, mice, and a chinchilla. Mr. Paul's presentations are always engaging and educational.

Kids' Place patrons will have many chances to create some spooky art this year, including frightful scenes (made from coffee filters!) and glowing alien jars. Tweens will be building their own scary stories when they blend together Legos and Mad Libs in an upcoming Lego Challenge. Speaking of Legos – anyone visiting Kids' Place this month has a chance to guess the number of Legos in a jar! The winner will receive a free Lego kit. In November, Kids' Place will see the continuation of the Traveling Tales series, a suet feeder craft, and a new Lego Challenge, "Off to the Races."

In an effort to diversify our programming, we at Coldwater have started to schedule some mixedage programs. On October 18th, teens and tweens will come together to play video games on the big screen using the projector in our meeting room. In addition, on October 19th, Coldwater will be hosting Family Fright Night, a spooky/scary night open to children and families from across the district. Director of Public Services Jessica Tefft has taken the lead on this ambitious event, and we look forward to seeing everyone there!
