We have set up a couple different displays of books to draw attention to items not circulating as often as we would like them to. Cozy Mysteries, always a great read during cold winter months. Westerns, popular with men and teens. We have a shelf for Staff Picks and each week we display 3 books we have read. We have had some great discussions with patrons about the books and that shelf circulates all the time.

We purchased a book truck with money given in memory of Friends member Jeanne Unterkircher and now rotate picture books from the bottom shelves of the children's area. These are on the cart facing out so kids can see the covers of the books and it has helped more of those circulate too.

We are starting work with our tweens and teens to form an Advisory Board as a way for them to have a voice in what they would like to see happen at our branch. We have had some issues lately with large groups of teens getting loud and a bit unruly so rather than being the big mean library people we will work with them and try to give them a sense of responsibility of the library.

The last item is a Friends item: Our local book store, Ye Olde Book Shoppe, closed its doors this past summer and then in December the building sold. The McClish family donated their entire inventory of books to our Friends group. The new owners gave the ok for our group to hold the sale right there in the building instead of having to move over 15,000 books so for the past two weeks hundreds of books have been purchased by book addicts from all over the area. People have come from Calhoun, St Joseph, Hillsdale counties and Indiana. The McClish family have always been big time supporters of the library and we are very grateful for this wonderful donation.

The Coldwater Branch is forging ahead into 2020. We recently hosted several well-attended events for adults. Cheryl Lawrence, a clerk at this branch, held two sessions where she led patrons in creating Christmas cards with quilling, an art form that involves making shapes and patterns out of curled strips of paper. Cheryl's quilling programs have become so popular that she's inspired similar programs at the Burnside Center! Cheryl will be continuing with her quilling lessons in January with Valentine's cards. Meanwhile, public services clerk Cheryl Graham-Machida gave a presentation on the celebration of New Year's in Japan. Cheryl's program included an educational talk, a variety of authentic snacks, and a calligraphy lesson. We're glad that Cheryl is here to share her cultural knowledge and for all of our talented staff members.

Over the next few weeks, we'll have the next Quiet Cocoa Club as well as a family-friendly board game night and a "Speed Friending" event for adults. February will bring our month-long Adult Winter Reading Challenge, during which we'll give away weekly prizes in the form of gift cards to local businesses. Also in February, we will be showing The Public, a movie that invites conversation about the role of libraries in society today.

Teens at Coldwater were treated to two after-hours events this month. Cocoa, Coffee, and Cram! served as a fun break from studying for finals and included a variety of snacks plus a mix-it-yourself coffee and cocoa bar. Open Mic Night invited teens to share their songs, poetry, and comedy with their peers. This week, teens will compete at a Roblox-themed video game tournament while craftier teens will express themselves with a DIY scrunchie project.

In Kids' Place, patrons celebrated the winter holidays with multiple ornament crafts as well as lovely luminary jars. Fan-favorite Jonny Hawkins also visited to share his cartooning talent with all of us. Kids got a little messy this month with the shaving cream and ping pong relay, a fun competition that also encourages teamwork. Kids' Place staff helped kids ring in the "Noon Year"

at our fun, punny New Year's party. Everyone played New-Year's-themed Bingo and pin-thenumber-on-the-year, created 2020 vision boards, and released 20 balloons while they toasted each other with sparking juice during an exciting countdown to the "Noon Year."

The highlight of the winter season was our annual visit from Kris Kringle. Despite a malfunctioning elevator, Mr. and Mrs. Claus persevered, while Children's Services Coordinator Linda Dull held the floor with impromptu stories and caroling with the help of Julia Littley. One of our young patrons even brought his own home-made cookies to share with Santa Claus.

Coming soon to Kids' Place is a tool box building session with real hammers and nails as well as a hot cocoa mix take-home craft. We're also looking forward to a busy Winter Fest on January 25th. James Wallace will be back with a Lego Build-a-Yeti story, and we'll have Make-It-and-Take-It crafts every afternoon. February will see a 29-day reading challenge for the kids.

On February 1st, Coldwater will be participating in Take Your Child to the Library Day with the other BDL branches. Each of our floors will host a different family-friendly activity. We're planning to have a slime station, a staff member teaching drawing techniques, kid-accessible ancestry activities in the Holbrook Heritage Room, board games, and a movie on our projector. We want visitors to our branch to get a taste of all that we offer here.

In other district-related news, we're happy to report that our patrons are already buzzing about the 2020 One Book One County! In fact, almost all of the Coldwater copies of Shores Beyond Shores have already been checked out. 2020 is off to a successful start so far.




Quincy

There were 181 entries for the challenge with children, teens and adults involved. Prizes included several products from the vendors at Small Business Saturday as well as donations from the Friends of the Union Township Library. Candy treats were given out to the young people who found "Jingle" (an Elf on the Shelf doll) hidden around the library including within the branches of the bookmark Christmas tree and on various shelves.





We began the month with a Grinch Escape Room event for the teens with a lot of fun and success. Other teen programs for December included a jingle bell ornament and Pokemon stress balls. Over 100 teens enjoyed the teen activities as well as Creating STEAM where they created buildings out of cranberries and toothpicks.
