## <u>Coldwater</u>

Between the weather and flu season, things have been very quiet at the Coldwater Branch.

Public Services Clerk Cheryl Lawrence has been busy with craft programs this month. Her weekly Charity Recycle Mats program is still ongoing and seeing regular attendance of around seven people. She also continued her successful series of quilling classes with Valentine's Day themed card-making. Cheryl's crafts have been so successful they've spawned a spin-off series run by one of our regulars! Upcoming adult programs include the final Book Tasting Coloring Club, an event that invites patrons to chill out with coloring while sampling an audiobook from our collection, and Speed Friending, a quirky take on speed dating that will help millennials make new friends.

Our newest recurring Kids' Place program, Movin' to the Groove, is a high-energy, music-based program that invites children to "Jump, Turn, Dance, and Learn!" with our staff. Linda Dull and Angie Richards lead this activity that builds coordination, cognition, and creativity in a fun, positive atmosphere. We also celebrated the season with snowy crafts during Winter Fest, bringing visitors a bit of warm, wintery fun. We're looking forward to rounding out our February with this month's Tween Club, during which Angie and the kids will be making Kiwi Company Robot Crawlers, plus "Happy Heart" programming generously sponsored by Coldwater Yoga and the MSU Extension. This program will help children explore healthy food and exercise in a fun, interactive way. The next Traveling Tales is also right around the corner – on March 7th, Gary Nettleman of Bronson will take us on a tour of Poland (and Polish cooking)!

All of BDL's branches celebrated Take Your Child to the Library Day on February 1st, and Coldwater was no exception. We had activities on each of our floors, giving patrons a taste of everything we have to offer. In the basement, clerk Julie Smith ran a Slime Station, which was so popular that Linda had to make a run for extra supplies! Clerk Ben Lyon taught drawing basics to children on our first floor, the second floor was devoted to introducing families and children to genealogy and history using materials curated by Heritage Room Coordinator Bonnie Sherman, and we had self-guided board games on the third floor. Finally, Kids' Place and the fourth floor hosted a yeti hunt and a showing of the movie Abominable. 60 people found their way to Coldwater Kids' Place during Take Your Child to the Library Day.

As planned, we're expanding our intergenerational programming options here at Coldwater. Our first board game night attracted patrons aged 7 to 20. Adult staff and attendees learned a new game, Pandemic, a cooperative strategy game, while others played Jenga as well as the less-

traditional card game Exploding Kittens. We are also beginning a series of monthly movies that should be fun for patrons of many ages and celebrating Leap Day with a Back to the Future party featuring a movie marathon, 50s music, a hula hoop competition, and a craft, as well as refreshments in the form of root beer floats (donated by Pepsi Co. and Dairy Queen) and pizza.

Starting in March, the Branch County Conservation District will be partnering with BDL to bring educational programming about the environment to patrons of all ages. The first BCCD/BDL crossover event will be a talk about conservation practices we can all put into practice in our own backyards on Wednesday, March 11th. Future events will include hands-on activities for teens and tweens as well as projects for the whole family. We're enthusiastic about working together and expect great things from these programs.

This February, we have reading challenges for both kids and adults. We're very excited to have 70 children already signed up for the Leap Year Reading Challenge! This bingo-esque event encourages children to try out 29 different themes this month. Those who complete the challenge will be entered into a drawing for one of three \$25 Amazon gift cards. For the Adult Winter Reading Challenge, meanwhile, we're having weekly drawings for four different \$20 gift cards to local businesses. We had 10 participants the first week and look forward to watching the challenge gain momentum.

- I met with Jennings Elementary Principal Ron Olmstead and school Interventionist Darcy Roach recently to discuss how the library and school can work together this June as the schools will again be offering a three week summer school session.
- The public seems to appreciate the new consistent 9:00 opening hour (aside from Monday's). Although they still seem to think we are closed on Thursday's from several years ago.
- Approximately 40 of 60 people visited specifically for Take Your Child to the Library Day on February 1. Four families began their journey at Quincy acquiring their passport and three families turned in their passports at our branch. Storyteller Larry Todak, retired from Quincy Schools, entertained children the whole morning, and families enjoyed an actual color sheet of our library, crafts and cupcakes as we celebrated our branches' 110th birthday!

- A good amount of children's books are on order in memory of Gary Karney, who passed in late November, husband of Quincy Library Advisory Board Treasurer Connie Karney. - Quincy will offer the first book discussion on March 14 for the One Book, One county selection. Jeanie Berg will facilitate our discussion and refreshment discussions are in the works, as always at Quincy.
