April 2020:

Once again, Union Township Branch was informed that we would be receiving a grant for programming, this time from LSTA and the Library of Michigan. I am planning to start a "Music for Munchkins" program on alternate Thursdays opposite story time. I will be spending \$867 on musical equipment, recordings, playthings, games, and books to be appreciated for the upcoming

program. While the start date will not be for several months, there will be virtual programming using the various items purchased in order to fulfill the grant's requirements. Again, honored and excited for this opportunity!

Speaking of virtual programming, I contributed the reading of local author Patricia Polacco's *Rechenka's Eggs* to BDL's Facebook page on April 28.

I have become fairly familiar with Zoom as it is the meeting option of choice during this time of social distancing. Regular meetings with the other Branch Managers and Administration has become the norm on Mondays.

With this being the first year of having the seed library, I am interested in gaining any information concerning the project. I joined the One Seed, One State program and received emails concerning the statewide seed exchange. It was there where I learned of the nationwide seed library newsletter and website. They were conducting weekly meetings and networked with other seed saving organizations. Through the weekly meetings, I have heard from seed librarians from around the nation and the world about the struggles during the COVID-19 crisis. One meeting had participants from as far away as Australia, New Zealand, and Nova Scotia, so very interesting.

MSU has been having a program called Cabin Fever Conversations every Friday and the content has related to seed saving and gardening so have applied the knowledge to the Seed Library resources.

Another weekly Zoom meeting has been with Cathy Lancaster, Children's Services from Library of Michigan on Wednesdays at 10 am. The discussion has been about the various MEL.org services, virtual programming, and the Summer Reading Program.

In order to get to know some of the residents of Union City, I have joined a Ladies' Lunch Zoom meeting that meets on a weekly basis. We have discussed schooling at home, what the library can offer during the summer, and becoming familiar with the area.

Royal Oak Public Library offered a few virtual presentations in their schedule that is open to anyone. I attended the Bees in the Garden one and plan to attend the others in order to gain information and support Royal Oak in their efforts.

With the prospect of the music program at Union Township, I have attended a number of webinars concerning ideas to incorporate in the program. Singing Our Way and Moving and Grooving were two I attended. Ideas for the Creating STEAM program were encouraged in a Motion webinar through Library of Michigan. Another option during these times is the phone call-in programs with story times and the reading of poetry ideas and the webinar was offered through Colorado Public Libraries. I also attended a webinar on the Wandoo program to familiarize myself with BDL's SRP logging.

The month of May has been quiet as the COVID-19 pandemic continued to cause havoc with Stay Home, Stay Safe orders effective until May 28. Working from home has consisted of virtual meetings, exploring of library collections, and planning for the future.

I have continued to attend the MiYouth meetings through the Library of Michigan where the topics ranged from virtual programming to encouraging play to activity kits to go. These meetings have also provided an option to network with other librarians and support one another during this time.

I have also collected additional resources for the Seed Library collection by attending a Southern Seed School where Michigan native and seed saver Ben Cohen presented. Weekly meetings with the Rocky Mountain Seed Alliance introduced me, and others, to Seed Elders, those who have saved seeds for many years and share the stories of those seeds. Royal Oak Public Library had more presentations including one on Spring Beauties (native plants of Michigan) and seed saving. MSU's Cabin Fever Conversations are another regular feature with talks on gardening with children. The Thomas Jefferson Foundation offered a number of live stream events at Monticello with gardening and books being the focus of some. Slow Food USA was another group who offered excellent gardening, seed saving, and food videos.

Books were in the spotlight for the Feeding Minds Press Picture Book 101 webinar as well as the Lit All Day presentation by Jenifer Strauss. Incorporating puppets and crafts into story time was also offered by Jenifer in the DIY Puppets and Props webinar. I attended the excellent presentation by Irene Butters and appreciated her story.

STEM in the Kitchen was another offering from the Library of Michigan that I viewed and was encouraged by the information and resources shared.

The LSTA grant that the Union Township Branch received required me to watch a video about the grant, the process and what was needed from me to fulfill their requirements.

When not watching videos, I have looked into the various book collections and tried out the STEM kits.

As of May 1, I was allowed to order the items for the LSTA grant so made an order to Amazon and spent \$866.44 out of the \$867 we were given. The order included numerous musical instruments, a multi-media player, a keyboard, and several items for musical games. There were also twenty books and seventeen music CDs purchased that will be added to the collection at Union.
