Coldwater

Here at the Coldwater Branch, we've seen a dramatic (relatively speaking) increase in foot traffic over the last few weeks. A lot of our patrons have come in needing computers, internet access, and printing services. We've also seen many regulars return now that MeLCat is back up and running.

Like the other branches, Coldwater is concentrating on creating virtual programming and take-home program kits. Recently, we featured Blackout Poetry kits for adults. This craft is an easy way to exercise your creativity and make good use of old and damaged books, magazines, and newspapers. Next month, we'll be giving out all-in-one crochet kits, complete with crochet hooks, that will teach patrons how to make their own reusable produce shopping bag. These kits were put together by crochet queen and public services clerk Cheryl Lawrence. In addition, we have several upcoming virtual craft programs left to us by the recently retired Loretta Sherfield.

Children's Services Coordinator Linda Dull has worked hard to line up kids' kits and programs for the remainder of the year. We have a series of "Once Upon a Time" fairy-tale-themed program kits beginning with Chicken Little and the Three Little Pigs. These kits invite families to retell classic stories in their own way using a variety of modes of storytelling, and the crafts are equally unique. They've proven to be quite popular and have been claimed quickly! We're encouraging patrons to share their versions of the fairy tales with us via email. Long-time library fan Julie Littley starred in a special program for Talk Like a Pirate Day. "Pirate 101" will be available on September 19th as will pirate stash kits with gold, jewels, and an eye patch. Other kits our staff have put together include suncatchers and a sensory streamer kit for ages 18 months to 3 years that accompanies our "Movin' and Groovin'" virtual program. Finally, the Kiwanis Club of Coldwater has graciously supported our annual Christmas book giveaway again this year despite the unusual circumstances.

Along with the other branches, we're looking forward to helping new voters as part of National Voter Registration Day on September 22nd. We also have a new passive program, "Binge Out on Binge Boxes." Binge Boxes are a relatively new addition to our collection, and each Binge Box contains four to six movies that share a theme. The "Binge Out on Binge Boxes" program lets patrons check out one surprise Binge Box with bonus popcorn and candy and is limited to one per household.

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• Grab 'n Go kits are all compiled and scheduled through January, so we are hopeful families will take advantage and enjoy them. We will offer kits for 12 and under, teens and adults.

- Five more stories for fall virtual programming were submitted to Marketing for their use.
- A recent MiYouth session covered the topic of "Your Surge Capacity is Depleted" These sessions
 are headed by Cathy Lancaster, Youth Services Coordinator at the Library of Michigan. Hundreds
 log into these Zoom meetings, which were weekly during the shutdown and are still taking place
 at least monthly. Speakers cover pertinent topics and information for youth and teen services.
 Librarians state-wide have the same mentality of working through all we need to in library-land
 during this time.
- This week I will be attending the re-scheduled Adaptive Umbrella event. This was to be held at the Bloomfield Township Public Library at the end of April. This day-long virtual workshop will cover topics of the Intersection of Race, Disability and Gender, Sensory-friendly programming, dementia-friendly programming and services, a tip sharing interactive discussion session and will also have a disability advocacy panel of caregivers.

Union Twp.

August was a little quieter for the Union Township branch as summer reading was complete and school plans had yet to be determined. We have prepared for the future by being flexible and looking outside the box as far as services offered to the public.

I have been continuing with training as I attended webinars on Digital Inclusion (8/6), MI Youth (8/12), Midwest Tape Introductory Zoom Meeting (8/17) and two listening sessions with the Collaborative Summer Library Program (8/20 & 8/25). Branch Manager Zoom meetings have been a consistent part of my Monday morning routine.

During the summer, a special teen program was created in order to interest the young people in libraries and the various offerings they have. This statewide initiative was called the MI Library Quest and encouraged the teens to explore various libraries' websites from around the state looking for "clues". Prizes were given out to those participants who logged clues from 23 libraries. The program is continuing with a winter edition and a summer edition. I am currently assisting with the planning of future Quests and attend brainstorming meetings with library personnel from across the state including our own Lindsay Villa. I also participated on a committee (8/7 meeting) that was creating ideas for sharing with families and small groups. Our work was presented at the MI Youth meeting.

We are continuing to offer Music with Munchkins on Thursdays and are determining future plans for the programs during the cold weather months. We are able to appreciate the Zoom meeting platform and will look into ways to encourage participation that way.

Union is presenting three "Grab & Go" craft kits currently with one for children, a Creating STEAM one leaning more toward the teenage population and an Old Time Craft Workshop one focusing on needlework and fiber arts. The Old Time Craft Workshops were a popular program I conducted at Colon Township Library for six years and am trying to present it again within a craft bag format. The intention is to reintroduce the programs at Union when we are allowed to have in-person programming again.

Collection development is continuing with an addition of several audio books, a full "NEW" shelf of adult fiction, a section featuring new children's materials and the newest VOX books. Speaking of the VOX books, I am including a request to the BDL board and Southern Michigan Bank & Trust for shelving that will be more conducive for displaying the VOX collection. The newest shelves will have a lip at the back of the shelf and a slight angle to the shelf. I have tested a few of the titles and believe that these new shelves will contain the books better than the current shelving arrangement. In addition, I would like two (2) more magazine display shelves for the magazine area.

Union's contribution to the Facebook content for August included a story time and a walk through my flower garden with library resources to appreciate included.
