As summer approaches, we've been seeing increased traffic here at the Coldwater Branch. We kicked off in-person programming with Loud Library, an outdoor musical event featuring area artists Craig Brown, Casey Rowe, and Matt Biolchini that was organized by Public Services Clerk Ben Lyon. The diverse crowd included patrons of all ages, and over a hundred people attended this event! We will be following up with another instance of Loud Library on July 1st.

Teen Services Coordinator Lindsay Villa led local teens in the first of several writing club activities. The teens did individual writing exercises as well as a round-robin-style group activity. This weekend, Lindsay and the teens will be meeting in Rotary Park for a casual nature hike to take advantage of the great weather. We also have book page trinket dish craft kits available for teens, and, later this month, we'll be offering a cyanotype paper activity kit.

For children, Public Services Clerk Angie Richards and Kids' Place staff have put together exciting new grab-and-go kits for every week of the Summer Reading Program. Each week has a different animal theme that ties into the 2021 summer reading theme "Tales & Tails," kicking off with a set of bird-themed kits: feather sensory kits for young children, an owl craft for ages 2 to 6, and a bird feeder kit for ages 6 to 12. We are also offering cicada-themed activity kits for families to educate patrons about the emergence of the 17-year periodical cicadas this year.

We've coordinated with Coldwater Recreation to bring library programming to Heritage Park this summer. Every Tuesday from June 15th to July 13th, we will be joining a wide variety of presenters in the park near the rec center. Our first guest is Officer Zenia the bloodhound and her coworkers from the Branch County Sheriff's Department followed by the magical Mr. Jim and his Balloon Animal Kingdom.

On June 23rd and July 21st, the Coldwater Branch will be hosting the Branch-Hillsdale-St. Joseph Community Health Agency mobile vaccination clinic. BHSJ staff will be offering free COVID-19 vaccinations for adults as well as children age 12 and up who are accompanied by a parent or guardian.

We are closing in on the completion of RFID tagging at this branch! Tagging of the adult fiction is nearly finished, and juvenile nonfiction and the DVD collection are in progress.

The Union Township Branch has officially gone to the critters! As you saw at the May meeting, we have animals all around the building in anticipation of summer reading and all our programming

will be animal themed including story times, craft kits and passive programming.

Our SRP will consist of a new craft kit every week during the program with each week featuring a different geographical area such as forest, farm and desert. In addition, we will be offering monthly teen and Old Time Craft kits along with special occasion kits (ie Father's Day card). With the craft kits being our main focus, it was decided that each participant would receive an art supplies kit as their registration prize. Each bag contains a pair of scissors, ten crayons, two pencils, a pen, several bookmarks, an animal shaped eraser, a pencil sharpener, 6" ruler, and a glue stick. We are hoping they will appreciate their art supplies on our craft kits!

The reading program will start with the BDL game board through the Beanstack app with ten activities for the participants to do.



There are prizes for every completed activity including snacks, bracelets, and lots of books! After the participants have finished with the BDL reading program, the Union Township Branch has additional literary activities for them to do. The Summer Reading Challenges is a list of 13 different projects to do. The participants are asked to complete ten for a \$10 gift card to Union Station. If they do any more than the ten, they may select a new book from our collection of prize books. The activities feature different areas of the library with ways to appreciate them. For example, there is a prepared Animal Information Sheet for them to fill out using our new World Book 2020 Encyclopedia series. Magazines, poetry, and the nonfiction collections are also promoted. Other projects included in the Challenge are art, photography, poetry, Union's Grab 'n Go kits and writing. So we are ready to have fun this summer at Union!

Speaking of craft kits, we had several appreciated including a Mother's Day card, Paracord Keychain, Memorial Day puppets, and Hand Quilting was the Old Time Craft offering. The Lit Kit was Flat Stanley: The US Capital Commotion and the families received small American flags and parachute guys along with the patriotic activities. The Spice Club offerings were Paprika and

Parsley. We also joined the rest of the branches in promoting 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten for the littlest BDL patrons.

I am continuing to work with other organizations in Union City to provide programs and activities during the "Celebrate the St. Joseph River" Day. I will be demonstrating hand spinning and we will have a Storywalk along the sidewalk on the north edge of Heritage Park. To promote the celebration, we will be offering craft kits during the month that require water or are related to the river. I will share more details closer to the event!
