Coldwater

At the Coldwater Branch, we've continued our weekly summer programs for kids at the pavilion in Heritage Park, courtesy of Coldwater Recreation. Our first guest was Xena the search-and-rescue dog and her handler Jackie Harris, followed by magician and balloon animal expert Mr. Jim, sponsored by the Friends of the Branch District Library. Our third weekly program, yoga with Kristin Steckbauer, was enjoyable despite being rescheduled due to rain. Finally, Emily from Mad Science Detroit, sponsored by Kiwanis, visited us with a hands-on presentation all about animals, their traits, and their tracks. We have also given away take-home activity kits for children of all ages every week of SRP, each themed around a different animal, originally planned by Linda Dull, coordinated by Angie Richards, and assembled by Angie and the rest of our circulation staff.



Teen Services Coordinator Lindsay Villa led teen patrons on a nature hike earlier this month in Rotatory Park, a one-and-a-half-hour program encouraging kids to share their knowledge and connect with nature. Teens also attended another writing club session, a program that features creative writing exercises and round-robin-style group activities. Lindsay also gave out cyanotype (sun activated photography) kits earlier this month, and her next kit for teens is a watercolor animal stencil craft.

For adults, we have an upcoming craft kit that's sure to be popular: getting started with resin bookmarks. Each kit includes ready-to-mix clear resin and an assortment of glitter, confetti, dried flowers, and other toppings to sprinkle in. We're also having our first in-person craft activity for adults this week as staff member Ben Lyon will be leading patrons in creating their own tie dye projects.

In-person programming at the Coldwater Branch is back with a wide variety of activities, including the second Loud Library program featuring the musical talents of Lindsay Villa and her family. Local artist Sara Porter showed patrons the basics of henna art. BDL's bookkeeper, Ashley McCall, gave us an introduction to keeping chickens with help from special feathery guest stars Bubblegum and Oreo. Before the month is over, we'll also be having a Pet Palooza (with a buffet of do-it-yourself dog treats and cat toys) and an Around the World Picnic. On July 21st, staff from the Branch-Hillsdale-St. Joseph Community Health Agency will also be returning to the Coldwater Branch for a second vaccine clinic for adults and for children ages 12 and up accompanied by a parent or guardian.



The Friends of the Library was able to hold their regular book sale during Strawberry Fest this June and raised over \$200!

Teens were offered a cup weaving kit and the Old Time Craft was rubber stamping with the recipients making their own rubber stamp.
